Sermon: "The Power of Repentance"

Text: Luke 13: 1-9, 31-35

13 At that very time there were some present who told him about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices. ²He asked them, "Do you think that because these Galileans suffered in this way they were worse sinners than all other Galileans? ³No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish as they did. ⁴Or those eighteen who were killed when the tower of Siloam fell on them—do you think that they were worse offenders than all the others living in Jerusalem? ⁵No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish just as they did."

The Parable of the Barren Fig Tree

⁶Then he told this parable: "A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard; and he came looking for fruit on it and found none. ⁷So he said to the gardener, 'See here! For three years I have come looking for fruit on this fig tree, and still I find none. Cut it down! Why should it be wasting the soil?' ⁸He replied, 'Sir, let it alone for one more year, until I dig around it and put manure on it. ⁹If it bears fruit next year, well and good; but if not, you can cut it down.'"

A LOOK AT THE PASSAGE

This Passage Occurs During The Last Year Of Jesus' Public Ministry -Year Of Controversy. Jewish leaders were seeking to silence Him. Here, He is teaching in Judea before a multitude. For them, bad things happen to good people because they sin. Pilate (Roman Governor) killed some Galileans (Jews from Jesus' region) and mingled their blood with their sacrifices. Tower in Siloam (Jerusalem) fell and killed 18 people. Were they worse sinners? Examples: Job, Hebrew Boys; Elizabeth & Zechariah; Tsunami killed 100,000+; Christians beheaded; tornadoes & flooding in South & Midwest; people sick, some lost loved ones, etc. Why does God allow such? The victims were worse sinners? For Jews, yes. For Jesus, No! God expects repentance. Then He gives a parable.

Repentance [N] [T] [B]

There are three Greek words used in the New Testament to denote repentance.

The verb **metamelomai** is used of a change of mind, such as to produce regret or even remorse on account of sin, but not necessarily a change of heart. This word is used with reference to the repentance of Judas (Matthew 27:3).

Metanoeo, meaning to change one's mind and purpose, as the result of after knowledge. This verb, with (3) the cognate noun

Metanoia, is used of true repentance, a change of mind and purpose and life, to which remission of sin is promised. Evangelical repentance consists of (1) a true sense of one's own guilt and sinfulness; (2) an apprehension of God's mercy in Christ; (3) an actual hatred of sin (Psalms 119:128; Job 42:5 Job 42:6; 2 co 7:10) and turning from it to God; and (4) a persistent endeavour after a holy life in a walking with God in the way of his commandments.

It is an intentional change or turning away from sin and turning to God; from wanting to sin to not wanting to sin. God is the one Who grants repentance (Acts 11:18; 2 Tim 2:25) and it must take this miracle of God because the unregenerate human loves their sin and we have an ongoing, constant battle with sin all our lives, even after conversion (Rom 7). Repentance is a heart change. A heart changed from the desire to sin to the desire to not sin and obey God. It is not remorse or guilt because we were caught in sin. That is a worldly sorrow and that only leads to death. Paul wrote in 2 Corinthians 7:10 that "godly grief (or sorrow) produces a repentance that leads to salvation without regret, whereas worldly grief produces death." If we break down the word "metanoia" it is "meta" which means to change like the change that occurs in a metamorphosis and "noeo" for "to exercise the mind, think," or "comprehend." It is not turning from sin but more "changing one's mind" and this change of mind is wrought by the Holy Spirit and not of human origin (John 6:44; Matt 16:17).

Repentance is a process in which we engage with God who journeys with us.

Acts 3:19 "Repent therefore, and turn back, that your sins may be blotted out."

Second Peter 3:9 "The Lord is not slow to fulfill his promise as some count slowness, but is patient toward you, not wishing that any should perish, but that all should reach repentance."

Peter shows that God is exceedingly patient because "with the Lord one day is as a thousand years, and a thousand years as one day" (2 Pet 3:8) but eventually, God will give us up to our own desires and our hearts can harden (Heb 3:15; Psalm 95:8; 2 Cor 6:2). We know that God takes no pleasure in the death of the wicked (Ezk 18:23, 32) and desires "that all should reach repentance."

Repentance and fruit bearing are synonymous as Jesus goes on to tell the parable about a fig tree planted in a vineyard.

On the repentance journey we are sure to meet many difficulties as we think of turning our lives around. It not always easy just to drop bad ways or turn away from sin but we are convinced at some point that our way of life need to change.

There will be those days when we get discouraged by the setbacks on the repentance journey and may fall down on our way.

The parable of the fig tree in the vineyard told by Jesus represents two important things for us.

- 1. We are God's vineyard beautifully planted and nurtured by God.
- 2. We are expected to flourish and this flourishing happens overtime.

As we journey with Jesus on this second Sunday of Lent we hear Jesus setting the record straight regarding repentance and its importance for our spiritual survival. Jesus pointed out that unless we repent we will all likewise perish. It is repentance that determines our survival and how well we bounce back from the tragedies we face in life.

Jesus also intended to teach that repentance is a process or journey that every human being must face. As we journey God is with us and will help us every time we fall or fail. Amen.
