Sermon: "God's Loving Presence with all People"

Text: Matthew 1: 21-25

21 She will bear a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." 22 All this took place to fulfill what had been spoken by the Lord through the prophet:

23 "Look, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel,"

which means, "God is with us." 24 When Joseph awoke from sleep, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded him; he took her as his wife, 25 but had no marital relations with her until she had borne a son;[j] and he named him Jesus.

- The Jews were looking waiting for a deliver; one who would come to change their lives and establish an order that would give every person a sense of fulfillment.
- They were also at a juncture in their lives were many things within the system of governance needed adjustment.
- The pronouncement made by the Angel of the Lord to Joseph spoke to the fact that the one who was to come would bring about some change in their lives. One this 4th Sunday of Advent let us consider three important things from this text.
- Firstly, the Angel of the Lord said to him, "the son that will be born of Mary should be named Jesus, which means salvation or the one who save people from their sins.

This was a very powerful pronouncement as it would guarantee that those who felt estranged from Yahweh and otherwise lost would now have a chance to be saved. Before this time of Jesus' pending birth salvation was not a rite, it was a privilege. People were saved largely through their different religious beliefs which helped some but hindered others. Furthermore, there was a disconnect for many as they were somewhat cut off from the God of their forefathers. Many



could not meet the strict requirements in order to be saved because there were clear lines that divided rich from poor, those who belonged and those who did not. Salvation for many was an ideal that could not be achieved as many were thought not to have what it required to be saved; many were not considered to have the Jewish pedigree or be of the Jewish bloodline to deserve salvation.

 Secondly, the Messiah, who was to be called Jesus was coming as a fulfillment of the Lord's word through the Prophets. That divine word stated that, "his name will be Emmanuel which means, God with us."

This Divine word also inspired much hope for those who were disenfranchised and disconnected from community or the promise of salvation. The coming Messiah was, Emmanuel, would dwell with people. The beauty of this is that there was no stratification or identifying who he would dwell with as all people could now own and claim this promise.

• The third point I want to make is, people could now look forward to being saved, they no longer had to think of who they were or to which culture they belong. They could also look forward to a messiah who was coming to dwell with them wherever they were in their lives. Friends, this was all made possible by a God who loves us unconditionally and would look beyond who we were, what nation we belong to and also look beyond the systems of that day and age. God's unconditional love was about to reach humanity in a personal way through the person of Jesus Christ.

Today we live in a world where so many questions linger about the divisions that exist among nations and peoples. Some see it as a norm as with so many different races and cultures but others would love to see much more equality in a world where God's reign is unquestionable.

Here is a word from the Lord on this fourth Sunday of Advent that assures humanity that all can be saved. The commemoration of Jesus' entry into our lives gives renewed hope to all cultures, races, classes and persuasions that salvation is not only for a select few but for all who wait for the return of the Kings of Kings. We await the wonderful counsellor, the mighty God, the everlasting father and the Prince of peace; we await Emmanuel who is coming to dwell with us in all our lives situations. Whether we are kings or paupers, young or old, sick or healthy, in a mess or doing ok, Christ comes to dwell with us and the overwhelming pronouncement is that he comes to save us.



How do we find ourselves in this very blessed position, this position of privilege and prestige? God's never ending love toward us guarantees our salvation and our standing in this life where many are so often marginalized. Today we can remind ourselves of John 3:16, "For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have everlasting life." We may not be perfect, our meet the requirements of others around us; we may have made mistakes and fallen short of made up human standards. Today we can experience joy, hope and peace because we live and believe in a God who sends his only son to extend that undying love towards us.

American song writer and actress Jennifer Hudson puts it beautifully in this song:

I'm not perfect but he loves me anyway. Wasn't an angel in my younger days. We all have done things, that's between us and God.

There's no better comfort than being in his arms.

He loves me still.

He loves us still.

I'm not perfect but he loves me anyway.

This loneliness fills every inch of every open but his grace and mercy gives me strength when I am weak and carries me when I can't stand on my own feet. He loves me still.

So glad he loves me still.

And when I'm down he lifts me up.

He sees beyond what I've become.

Lord lift me up I feel so down.

Yet he loves me still.

So glad he loves me still.

As we move one week close toward Christmas know that God's love is overflowing for all humanity and Jesus comes to dwell with us wherever we are. **Amen.**
