Most user groups have also suspended activities at the church, so we are taking the opportunity for our custodians to use their time in cleaning and disinfecting surfaces and anything that people usually touch when they are in the building.

We have been asked about how people can continue to support the church financially while we are not meeting regularly. Please remember that if you are on PAR your donations will continue as usual. Those who contribute with cheques can mail them to the church or keep them until we are together again. The mail will be checked regularly. Many of you make your donations in cash – PLEASE DO NOT MAIL CASH! Set your offering aside as you would normally do and we will all catch up in due time. The treasurer assures me that our cash flow is not compromised but our expenses will continue so we do hope to get back on budget by the end of April.

## John 14: 25-27

"I have said these things to you while I am still with you. But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you. Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid.

**Peace:** I believe that the peace Jesus offers us is not to be equated with happiness or with passive resignation to what is. But instead it is a peace with both the quality of reconciliation with present reality and the quality of hope for the future. It is not the peace found in the termination or absence of conflict, but the peace that is found in courageously facing hard truths. Jesus' peace gives us comfort when nothing is comfortable. It restores hope in us even in the face of great adversity. With the peace of Jesus in us, we can get up each day to face whatever may lie ahead. (Emily Bisset)

The church is called to be a messenger to the world of God's peace. We do this as we reach out to each other and beyond ourselves to provide safe, welcoming space for everyone and anyone. When we judge, distort and refuse to see others as God sees them – as beloved creatures made in the image of God – barriers and divisions are created.

In this safe space, we protect vulnerability and guard each other from shame. God provides the clothes for us to put on: compassion, kindness, humility, meekness and patience – with love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. Even as we remain physically separated, may we be the church that God is calling us to be – as safe space with a welcoming heart.
