

Gold: A gift given to royalty. For us, gold reminds us that Jesus is the King of kings, Lord of lords and more precious than anything.



It's nice to give and receive gifts. I am sure Mary and Joseph were happy that people wanted to bless Jesus with gifts. However, if you read the passage on the left more closely, you'll see something that some people overlook during the Christmas season. THEY BOWED DOWN AND WORSHIPED JESUS BEFORE THEY GAVE HIM THE PRESENTS!



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They entered the house and same the child with his mother, Mary, and they bowed down and worshiped him. Then they opened their treasure chests and gave him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. (Matthew 2:11)
