"Christ Our Reigning King" Hebrews 1:1-4

One of the cornerstones of Reformed theology is that Jesus Christ is our Prophet, Priest and King. A most important cornerstone of the Christian life is that Jesus Christ is our Prophet, Priest and King. Last week we saw that even early in his ministry, Jesus was recognized as a prophet. 16 "A great prophet has appeared among us," they said. (Luke 7) We saw that the function of a prophet was to bring a Word from God to his people. Hebrews 1 tells us that: 1 In the past God spoke to our ancestors through the prophets at many times and in various ways, 2 but in these last days he has spoken to us by his Son... Jesus was not just a prophet. Jesus was the Prophet from God for he himself was the Word of God. Jesus is the Prophet that we need to speak God's truth into our lives.

Last week we saw that we all need a priest. A priest is one who offers sacrifices to God to cleanse his people of their sins. Jesus is <u>the</u> Priest we need because he offered the ultimate Sacrifice that cleanses us from sin for all time. Jesus is the only Priest who can purify us and wash us clean. We learned from a little Scotsman named Terry McCutcheon that: "You know, if something is going to get clean,

something else has to get dirty." Christ dirtied himself – Christ filthied himself – with our sin in order that we might be cleansed by the power of his blood. Jesus is our great High Priest who filthied himself in order that we might be reconciled to God.

Today, we will focus on Jesus as our reigning King. At Christmas time, when we read the narratives of the birth of Jesus, we were made aware that this Baby born in a manger in a stable in Bethlehem was a king. For instance in Matthew we read of the narrative of the Wise Men.

1 After Jesus was born in Bethlehem in Judea, during the time of King Herod, Magi from the east came to Jerusalem 2 and asked, "Where is the one who has been born king of the Jews? We saw his star when it rose and have come to worship him." (Matthew 2)

But today, we are not going to focus on this assertion, but we are going to follow a


trail through John's Gospel and see where it leads us.



Most of us are familiar with the term "paper trail". If you want to get a passport, you can't just can't walk into Service Canada and ask for a passport. No, you need supporting documents. You need a birth certificate, a recent passport photo of an exact size and signed by a person who can guarantee that you are who you say you are. You need proof of Canadian citizenship and proof of identity. In other words, Service Canada requires a "paper trail" of specific documents and only on submitting those documents will you receive a passport.

Let's look at the paper trail in John's Gospel to see what it tells us of Jesus. In John 1 we read of the calling of the first disciples. 43 The next day Jesus decided to leave for Galilee. Finding Philip, he said to him, "Follow me." Philip went and found Nathanael. When he told Nathanael that they had found the Messiah and that he came from Nazareth, Nathanael replied sarcastically: 46 "Nazareth! Can anything good come from there?" Here is the exchange that followed.

47 When Jesus saw Nathanael approaching, he said of him, "Here truly is an Israelite in whom there is no deceit." 48



"How do you know me?" Nathanael asked. Jesus answered, "I saw you while you were still under the fig tree before Philip called you." 49 Then Nathanael declared, "Rabbi, you are the Son of God; you are the king of Israel."

The very first time that this sarcastic Jew met Jesus, he declared that he was not only the Son of God, but the king of Israel. This is the first piece of evidence on our paper trail in John's Gospel.

The second piece of evidence is weak, but it is evidence nevertheless. The occasion was what we know as the feeding of the 5,000. At the end of this incident, we read:

14 After the people saw the sign Jesus performed, they began to say, "Surely this is the Prophet who is to come into the world."

15 Jesus, knowing that they intended to come and make him king by force, withdrew again to a mountain by himself. (John 6) I say the evidence is weak, not because this is a poorly attested portion of Scripture in the earliest manuscripts we have, but because it only alludes to what a misguided mob of people intended to do. Anyone who could provide an abundance of food from only five small barley loaves and two small fishes would obviously make a great king.

The next piece of evidence is found in John 12 and what is known as the Triumphal Entry of Jesus into Jerusalem.

12 The next day the great crowd that had come for the festival heard that Jesus was on his way to Jerusalem. 13 They took palm branches and went out to meet him, shouting,

"Hosanna!"

"Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!"

"Blessed is the king of Israel!"

- 14 Jesus found a young donkey and sat on it, as it is written:
- "Do not be afraid, Daughter Zion; see, your <u>king</u> is coming, seated on a donkey's colt."

Jesus appears here as a King like no other. The atmosphere is a festive one. The people are waving their palm branches. They said of Jesus that he is **the king of Israel!** For many of us, this is the picture of kingship that we most associate with



Jesus – a kingship that was prophesied hundreds of years before by the prophet Zechariah.

However, for me, the kingship of Jesus stands out even clearer when he was in the presence of Pilate. In John 18, Pilate is faced with a grim dilemma. He really doesn't want anything to do with Jesus. He wants the Jewish religious authorities to deal with Jesus according to their own laws. This they don't want, because there is a restriction on what they can do. They don't have the power to put Jesus to death and they want him dead! That's why they turned him over to Pilate in the first place. After



the stalemate on the front steps, Pilate goes back into his palace and summons Jesus in order to talk with him. Of all the questions he could have asked Jesus, he chose this one: 33 ... "Are you the king of the Jews?" I wonder what Pilate was expecting when he came face to face with Jesus? The man before him certainly did not look like a pretender to the vacant throne of Judaism. He was not a sullen or belligerent rebel like the others who had led insurrections. No, the man who quietly stood before him was a man like no other man he had ever met. This man was


charged with treason yet he was dressed like a common peasant. He stood before a Roman of great power and authority, yet he was calm and confident in his presence. He feels no need to speak, but when he does he doesn't stammer and stutter. He speaks quietly, confidently and with a greater authority than Pilate. Can you hear Pilate's question echoing around the palace: "Are you the king of the Jews?"

Jesus replied: 34 "Is that your own idea, or did others talk to you about me?" His question irritates Pilate. 36 Jesus said, "My kingdom is not of this world. If it were, my servants would fight to prevent my arrest by the Jewish leaders. But now my kingdom is from another place." You see, Jesus was – and is – a King like no other. Pilate could understand a King like Herod. He had no problem with men who were hungry for power, position and wealth. He understood people who were ruthless in getting what they wanted. That was the way of the world. He didn't understand the Jews, but then no one understood the Jews. However, he understood what the Jewish leaders wanted. Underneath their robes they were no different than he was underneath his uniform with its symbols of authority. But Jesus utterly defied any notion of conventional kingship. It was obvious to Pilate that Jesus

was not just from another part of Judea. He was from another planet! He was an alien!

Although Pilate did not understand Jesus, he was both judge and jury in the trial of the Nazarene. Under Roman law, a man was guilty until proven innocent. Yes, I said that right. A defendant was guilty until proven innocent. Jesus refused to defend himself, but Pilate, nevertheless, came to a verdict. 38 "I find no basis for a charge against him." Or "I find no guilt in him." Jesus was simply "not guilty" in Pilates mind.

But then the Governor does something that defied Roman law. 1 Then Pilate took Jesus and flogged him. (John 19) This was no mere whipping with a willow branch. By the time they were finished with their 39 lashes, Jesus' body was a bloody mess. Now we have a hard time understanding why a man who was declared "not quilty" would be treated in this way. I very much doubt that anyone reading this would have treated Jesus this way. But it was what came next that I have difficulty with. 2 And the soldiers twisted together a crown of thorns and put it on his head and arrayed him in a purple robe. 3 They came up to him, saying, "Hail, King of the Jews!" and struck him with their hands. Mark tells us that they spat upon him. I ask you, have



your ever treated King Jesus like this? Have you ever dressed him in a purple robe so as to make him look ridiculous? Have you ever pressed a crown of thorns on his head and made him bleed? Have you ever mocked him and made fun of him? Have you spit in his face out of contempt? I doubt that there is a man or woman reading this that has not treated Jesus in this manner by our lifestyle, our actions and our attitudes. Rarely do we ever fall at his feet in complete surrender. In our rebelliousness, thinking that we know what is best for our lives, we mock him as we strike out on our own. We spit on him by failing to lift up his name to others and refuse to declare our allegiance to him as our King by only choosing safe paths.

Now we come to our fourth piece of evidence. They took Jesus and hung him on a cross and nailed an inscription above his head: "Jesus of Nazareth, the <u>King</u> of the Jews." This angered the religious authorities and they put pressure on Pilate to change the inscription. Pilate was not an honourable man, but I have to give him

credit for his response. 22 Pilate answered, "What I have written I have written." Jesus died with that inscription nailed to his cross.

Today is Easter, the day we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus from the dead. Today we celebrate the miracle upon which the Christian faith rises or falls. But there were other resurrections. Jesus himself raised a number of people from the dead, including Lazarus. The disciples were given authority to heal and they too raised the dead. Peter raised from the dead a widow named Tabitha. What was so different or special about the resurrection of Jesus? Eventually, all the people that Jesus or the disciples raised from the dead died again, including Lazarus and Tabitha. Jesus, in his resurrection, defeated death and he is alive forevermore. Jesus later said: 17 ... "Fear not, I am the first and the last, 18 and the living one. I died, and behold I am alive forevermore, and I have the keys of Death and Hades. (Revelation 1)

Is Jesus a king? The apostolic preachers and writers John and Paul declared his Kingship. As we move beyond the record of John's Gospel, we have other evidence of his kingship that moves past an individual or group of people declaring him to be a king. I want to return first of all to our text from last week in which we saw the declaration of Jesus to be both Prophet and Priest. Hebrews 1 verses 1 and 2 speak



of Jesus as the ultimate prophet.
Verse 3 speaks of Jesus as the ultimate Priest. Let us read it again.
Notice the way Jesus is describe. 3
The Son is the radiance of God's glory and the exact representation of his being, sustaining all things by his powerful word. After he had provided purification for sins...
Jesus is the radiance of God's

glory. It is difficult to put into words what is being described here. We know the radiance of a sunrise or a sunset. The word translated here as "radiance" is used only once in the New Testament. It means "a shining forth because of brightness within". It can also mean "reflection, a shining forth because of brightness from without". (NIV NT Commentary, p. 3) In his being, from within and without, Jesus both outshines and reflects the brightness of God's glory, a glory which you and I cannot even remotely comprehend. That word "glory" – *doxa* in Greek, from which we get our English word "doxology" – is associated with the radiance of God and of heavenly beings in general. Glory indicates the presence of God. That presence we

are able to understand. But in regard to the next thing it represents, we are limited in our understanding. To the extent that we as finite human beings are able to apprehend it, glory represents the revelation of God's majesty. Think of the most majestic thing you have ever witnessed in your lifetime, multiply it by a factor of 1,000 and you will not even be able to come close to appreciating, let alone



apprehending, the Majesty of God. The Majesty of Jesus is no less than the Majesty of God, for he is **the exact representation of (God's) being.** Today, as we think of Jesus as King, we behold him in all of his Majesty, Glory and Splendor. Read this paragraph again so that you will be able to comprehend, as close as it is humanly possible, the Glory and Majesty of the Resurrected Christ.

After he had provided purification for sins, – that is, after Jesus had completed his work as our great High Priest – he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty in heaven. To sit indicates a posture of rest. One can only sit down and truly rest when the work is completed. Thus we can speak of the finished work of Christ on the Cross. The right hand position is the place of honour. Sitting at God's right hand was the writer's way of saying that Christ's saving work was done and that he is now given the place of highest honour. "Majesty" means greatness. Here it is a title for God himself. Jesus, having completed the work that the Father sent him to earth to perform, now enters into the ultimate rest and takes the place of highest honour next to the Majesty of God in heaven.


In Philippians 2 we find the greatest statement in Scripture on the humiliation and exaltation of Jesus Christ. Paul, in highly poetical form, writes:

- 6 Who, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be used to his own advantage;
- 7 rather, he made himself nothing by taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness.
- 8 And being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to death—even death on a cross!

To read this passage can be likened to standing at the top of a stairway and beginning to descend. Almost every line in verses 6 to 8 is like taking a step downward until we reach the bottom of the stairway. There, by becoming obedient to death — **even death on a cross!** — Jesus comes to the point of ultimate humiliation. He becomes the lowest of the low.

As we reach verse 9, the process reverses and Jesus begins to ascend the stairway of exaltation, ending up in the place he began.

9 Therefore God exalted him to the highest place and gave him the name that is above every name,
10 that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth,
11 and every tongue



acknowledge that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Nowhere here is the word "king" used of Jesus, but it is implied. He is the one at whose Name every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth. Truly this is the King of all creation.

There is one final passage that I want us to look at. It is found in Revelation 19.

11 I saw heaven standing open and there before me was a white horse, whose rider is called Faithful and True. With justice he judges and wages war. 12 His eyes are like blazing fire, and on his head are many crowns. He has a name written on him that no one knows but he himself. 13 He is dressed in a robe dipped in blood, and his name is the Word of God. 14 The armies of heaven were following him, riding on white horses and dressed in fine linen, white and clean. 15 Coming out of his mouth is a sharp sword with which to strike down the nations. "He will rule them with an iron scepter." He treads the winepress of the fury of the wrath of God Almighty. 16 On his robe and on his thigh he has this name written:

KING OF KINGS AND LORD OF LORDS.



How majestic is this picture. Here is the Ultimate King, riding at the head of the armies of heaven. He is King above all other kings and Lord above all other lords. The Man who died on a Roman cross on Good Friday and rose victorious over the grave on Easter morning is King by Birth. As to his earthly life, he was a descendant of David, Israel's greatest king.

He demonstrated that he was the true Son of God by his resurrection from the dead. The Scriptures proclaim him to be Jesus Christ our Lord. (Romans 1:3,4) He is our Prophet, Priest and King. Jesus came as a Prophet revealing God, as a Priest reconciling us to God and as a King who reigns as God. The only question that remains is this: "Is he The King who rules and reigns in your heart?" Only if he is will you ever behold him in all his glory and majesty seated at the right hand of God the Father in heaven.
