#### **GOD SPEAKS, WE LISTEN**

Story Time -

Our Call to Worship this morning was Psalm 150. It's a psalm calling us to praise God with all sorts of instruments. If I could, I would have given everyone in the sanctuary a rhythm instrument to shake as we read together. Wouldn't that be a wonderful way to start worship? Lots of happy noise!

Music is a wonderful part of worship. In the songs we sing, God speaks to us and we speak to God. It's altogether glorious. Music has a way of going straight to our hearts. Today we are singing more songs than usual. I'm going to reflect on the Scriptures that connect to the hymns we are singing and I am going to share with you what the people told when they chose their hymns. I asked their permission to share their comments. Sharing our stories is another way we encourage each other in the faith.

**Prayer –** Hear us O Lord as we praise your name. Amen.

**Visual Arts:** God's people praise God around the world and across time. Draw a picture of God's People singing to God.

Reading Genesis 17. 1-8
Reflection Almighty God

To address God as Almighty God is to refer to God's power, particularly God's creative power. God spoke and made our beautiful world. Here in BC, nestled among the mountains, we see the grandeur of what God has done. No wonder we feel close to God when we are outside, when we can see the trees, hear the birds and feel the wind. And science does not undercut or compete with our awareness or pleasure in God's power: it enriches it. Sit with God in silence and feel the blood circulating through your veins and remember the wonder of what is happening in our bodies all the time. God breathed his life into Adam and our bodies are the result. Our bodies are amazing. Sit with your grandchildren and watch the dew glittering on a spider web. Who taught the spider to weave a cord of such strength? God Almighty reminds us of the power of God at work among us.

So it is interesting that the first time God is called "Almighty God" is not in the stories of creation; it is in our text today. "El Shaddai" literally means, "God of the Mountain" and this God who created the mountains and all that we see, chooses to come down to Abraham and start making promises. By the end of the chapter, everyone, God, Abram and Sarai will have new names and a new hope.

In the words of Karl Barth, "Reconciliation is the restitution, the resumption of a fellowship which once existed but was then threatened by dissolution" (Karl Barth, Church Dogmatics, IV/1, 22). God promises not only to restore God's relationship with Israel, through Abraham and his descendants, but with the nations. The scope of God's redemptive work is global, planted in the midst of a very specific people.

This is all God's doing. notice verse 8 where it says,

"The whole land of Canaan, where you now reside as a foreigner, I will give as an everlasting possession to you and your descendants after you; and I will be their God." (Genesis 17. 8)

Did your mind finish that phrase? "I will be their God and they will be my people." The Scriptures often put those two phrases together but not here. In this text, the emphasis is completely on God and God's grace and mercy reaching out to the nations.

"I will be your God." This everlasting covenant extends to Israel through Abraham, and through Israel to the church, and through the church to each of one of us.

In this text, God is given a new name: El Shaddai, God of the mountain, God Almighty. Abram is renamed, "Ancestor of multitudes." Sarai is renamed, "Princess." These names reveal their identity. As God did for Abraham and Sarah, God names each of us for who we truly are for in your baptism you have been given a new name, "disciple of Jesus Christ," "beloved child of God."

One of our members suggested the song, El Shaddai as the song that encouraged her faith. She wrote,

I really like the song - El Shaddai. When I sing it, it is as if I am worshipping God with the Israelite people when they praised God. It reminds me of how faithful God has been and continues to be to us, of how much He loves us and that we can rely on Him - He never changes.

We will be singing three phrases in Hebrew. We can do this!

El Shaddai (God Almighty)

El Elyon na Adonai (the Most High God, O Lord) "We beseech Thee" is understood Er kam ka na Adonai (We will love you O Lord)

Singing El Shaddai Eternal Father, strong to save 325 vss 1,4 O Lord my God/How Great Thou Art 332 vss 1,3

# Reading 1 Peter 1. 3-9 Reflection God of hope

The opening of this reading is the gospel in a nutshell. The first word is praise because God acts toward us in mercy, and thus we are enabled to act in joy. 1 Peter 1 overflows with joy and praise for what God has done, what God is doing and what God promises for the future.

Three times in seven verses, the author uses the word, "faith." What is the faith of which he speaks?

John Calvin and the early reformers of the 16<sup>th</sup> century emphasized that faith consists of both knowledge and deep trust in God's goodness. According to the Heidelberg Confession of 1563 true faith "is not only a certain *knowledge* by which I accept as true all that God has revealed...but also a wholehearted *trust* which the Holy creates in me through the gospel, that, not only others, but to me also God has given the forgiveness of sins, everlasting righteousness and salvation, out of sheer grace solely for the sake of Christ's saving work.' (Heidelberg Confession, question 21). Faith is more than just intellectual assent to what the church teaches. It includes personal reliance on God's grace.

In the 20<sup>th</sup> century, Karl Barth expanded our discussion of the nature of faith by focusing on the *object* of faith, our triune God. Beyond our personal trust, Barth taught us to focus on the object, or the person that we trust. Faith focuses on what God has done for us in Jesus Christ.

In the words of a member of our community, "My Story" is the song that has had a significant impact on my walk in faith with Christ." Listen to how this song describes what God has done for us: hope that wouldn't let go, love that never gave up, grace that is greater than all my sin, victory over the enemy, freedom that was won for me, life overcoming the grave.

No wonder we sing, "Praising our Saviour all the day long."

Reading Psalm 40. 1-5
Reflection Faithful God

The heart of Psalm 40 is the truth that God hears our cries and delivers us from times of trouble. We are not told the precise nature of the psalmist's troubles. He experienced them

as a slimy pit, as mud and mire. Whatever the details, the psalmist ultimately sings a song of joy, a new song of praise to our God.

Only it isn't just a song to God. Verses 9-10 make it cleat that this is more than a private pondering of the faithfulness of God:

I proclaim your saving acts in the great assembly;
I do not seal my lips, Lord,
as you know.
I do not hide your righteousness in my heart;
I speak of your faithfulness and your saving help.
I do not conceal your love and your faithfulness
from the great assembly. Psalm 40. 9-10

Psalm 40 is the psalmist's testimony. It is his story of what the Lord has done for him.

The word, 'testimony' makes some people nervous. We associate it with aggressive evangelism and we have no desire to be offensive. And yet... this psalmist shows us another way. He simply declares, "Here is what happened to me."

This Psalmist is not the only one who has a story of God's rescue, of God's faithfulness. This sanctuary holds a living catalogue of redemption songs. And as we hear each other's story of rescue, each one of us takes hope that we too will sing a new song of praise.

Hear the testimony of two of our members.

One piece that I have appreciated is "He will hold me fast." In my own life I have had dry periods where I had trouble feeling God's presence with me, but I knew that I just needed to hang on and God would be there to help me through this temporary difficulty. I have also appreciated the fact that God does not let our children go, especially those who have made genuine commitments to follow Him, even if they aren't living for Him at present. There is hope for the future if we are always praying.

The song in my head all this past summer has been Love Lifted Me. I don't even know if this is a hymn. I can't recall ever hearing it in church but it's there in my head. I know it's about sinking deep in sin and the words are lovely but there are other things I sink into, like fear and despair. I have been so sick this year, so much pain, so unsteady on my feet. I never knew what was next, so afraid of falling again. I've had to force myself to do simple tasks I always took for granted. I would sit at the bus stop fairly confident my legs would get me home and then panic! How am I going to get up the stairs? Love Lifted Me: that's how. I would sing my way up the stairs. It's like God Himself lifted me one step at a time. "When nothing else could help, love lifted me" the song says, and I believe it! God's love keeps me going and holds me close. That song says it all!

Reading Philippians 2. 5-11
Reflection God Crucified

So which is more important, Christmas or Easter? Christmas celebrates the Incarnation, God entering human history to reclaim the world as God's own. Easter celebrates the resurrection. Jesus Christ has been raised from the dead! Hallelujah! These are both seasons of joy, with many traditions associated with them. We spend our whole lives deepening our understanding of what God has done and what it means for us personally, for the Church, indeed for the whole world. Our liturgical life is built around these seasons: God's coming to us; Christ's resurrection; life with the Holy Spirit.

Christmas and Easter are the anchors for our lives together as God's people.

Yet without Easter, there would be no Christmas. Jesus would have lived a good life as a faithful Jewish rabbi, but then he would have died, an example to us but nothing more. No, the event that changes everything is that empty tomb on Easter morning.

Easter is not a stand-alone event. Without Good Friday, there would be no Easter. Without Christ's death, Christ cannot be resurrected.

Good Friday, God's Friday is a hard day for us. The stories of Holy Week are ominous, full of betrayal and treachery, overwhelming grief and loss. It's tempting to just jump over the Friday. We'd like it if we could sing "Hosanna, Glad Hosanna" followed by "Jesus Christ is risen today" and leave "O Sacred head, sore wounded" out altogether.

The truth is sometimes our lives have more in common with Good Friday than with Easter Sunday. We too can be lost and grieving. We have been betrayed by those we trusted and sometimes our bodies are wracked with pain.

At those times, we need to hear the truth of Philippians 2, that Jesus Christ humbled himself as human being, humbled himself even to death on the cross.

God chose to align himself so completely with the limitations of humanity that He became one of us, experiencing all that we know as humans; yes, the joy and laughter and pleasures of this life but also its sorrow, weeping and pain. Jesus Christ is with you in your suffering.

Shadrach Meshach Lockridge was a prominent African-American Baptist minister in San Diego, California, very active in the civil rights movement. He was renowned for his powerful preaching. You can find him on YouTube. His Good Friday sermon, and I'm sorry I

was not able to find the date when he preached it, had the following refrain: "It's Friday, but Sunday's coming."

The person who requested that we sing *Because He lives* commented, "when I am trying to convince myself that life is worth living."
