LET'S DISCOVER THE GOSPEL OF MATTHEW TOGETHER

Do you ever wonder how the Scripture is chosen for a sermon? Many mainline Christian churches follow the lectionary. In the Presbyterian denomination we use the Revised Common Lectionary in the Presbyterian Book of Common Worship (Westminster John Knox Press, 2018) for guidance in choosing a text for preaching. It is a table of readings from Scripture which usually includes a reading from Psalms, a reading from the Old Testament, a reading from the New Testament and a Gospel reading. They are meant to be read at public worship each week and/or Holy day, and in keeping with festivals and seasons of the Christian Church. It provides for a three-year cycle of Sunday readings that takes us through the Scriptures in such a way as to help us see how the Scriptures are interwoven.

This is Year A in the three-year cycle and the Gospel of Matthew of the synoptic gospels is the one most used. Synoptic means 'seeing together' and the gospels referred to in this context are Matthew, Mark and Luke.

Matthew wrote for a community of believers struggling to understand their place within the traditional Jewish family of faith; 'hearing' was important, but it was 'understanding' what the Kingdom of God was like that was the key. The difference between 'knowing about' and 'believing in' changes one's response. Matthew's community was going through some very tough times; their traditional Jewish families regarded them as heretics and the Romans persecuted them. It was important for them to understand what it meant to follow Jesus so they wouldn't get discouraged in their faith; knowing the Kingdom of Heaven was already theirs in spite of the circumstances that seemed to say otherwise. The same holds true for us.

Matthew's Gospel has much to teach us about Jesus and the Kingdom of God and so I invite everyone to read the Gospel of Matthew from beginning to end as we journey through this year together.

Here is a suggestion on how we might begin. Before reading start with a 'prayer for understanding' as we do on Sunday morning when we read the Scriptures. It may be helpful to read at the same time each day so it becomes a habit. Pick a time that works for you, or if you do it as a family, mealtime may be best. Don't rush. Read as much or as little as you can keep your focus on. Perhaps questions will arise, and you will want to write them down for further discussion with family or friends or at church. In Jesus' day discussing Scripture was a way of developing understanding about God and the Kingdom of God.

May God bless our reading and understanding of the Word.

"That would be me," replied old Joe.




