FROM THE PULPIT – Pastor Wilma Boyce

Stories to tell ourselves

In the February newsletter I talked about how songs have the ability to lift our spirits and give encouragement. Here's another one: [The Stories I Tell Myself - YouTube Music](#) by Matt Maher.

The reason I share this one with you is because it reminds me of another form that gives encouragement and hope and can also strengthen our faith. The stories we tell ourselves have the ability to motivate us or to make us 'stuck' – we choose which ones we hold most tightly.

On good days gratitude comes; good times come to mind and hopes and dreams energize us. On bad days it's hard to find a story in our past to see any possibilities. Our minds can tell us stories to help us explain or process where we are at. Those stories may come from experience, or they may come from things we've heard, read or seen. So, it follows that the stories we put in our minds should be good or helpful. In the Bible God has given us stories just like that.

In the song I left the link for above, Matt Maher lists a whole string of stories about people God gave a story for us to hear: Abraham, Jacob, Joshua, Noah, Moses and Joseph, each one teaches something good. But he especially mentions Jesus, whose stories we need to tell ourselves again and again because it's our story too. (I hope you listen to the song.)

Here are two of the many 'fish' stories involving Jesus, where we see God bring the miraculous into the common place events of human lives, just like he did in the other Bible stories mentioned, and many others as well.

In *Matt 17:24-27* Jesus tells Peter to go and do what he knows best – go fishing – and experience the miraculous – 'take the first fish you catch, open its mouth and you will find a coin. That coin, amounting to a shekel, will be exactly sufficient for the temple tax required for Jesus *and* Peter.

I always thought the miracle was that the fish had money in its mouth. But it's not that– the fish was doing what it was created to do – Peter's fish, or *paterfamilias*, like the tilapia, keeps it's young in its mouth; When the little fish grow too big to be held, the fish expels them and takes a pebble in their place, or a coin it finds, instead of a stone. The miraculous sign is that the money it had was the exact amount required and the exact fish Jesus said it would be. The fish was obedient to the will of the Lord. And is a reminder to us that God provides what is needed because it all belongs to God. Even *fishes* do their part to provide something as mundane as the temple tax.

In *John 21: 1-11* the disciples have gone back to the occupation they had left to follow Jesus. They just couldn't wait for Jesus to tell them what came next..., and now they don't seem to be good at their old job, ... the fish net is empty after a whole night. Then

along comes Jesus, early in the morning and calls out to them, “Friends, haven’t you any fish?” “No” they call back.

“Throw your net on the right side of the boat and you will find some,” Jesus says, and they obey the direction not really knowing who he is yet. Still they did cast their net “on the right side of the ship,” and caught so many that “they were not able to draw it for the multitude of fishes.” 153 large fish – an abundance – more than enough... more than enough to help with expenses for the care of their families while they are away.

Once again, Jesus performs the miraculous in the midst of a mundane experience, Jesus transforms the fishing event and equips them for his purposes. This story also reminds us of Luke’s account when the disciples were first called to be fishers of men.

Both stories remind us that God is a God of details: everything that is needed is supplied and the outcome is lined up with God’s perfect plan. And so the early Christians have a ‘fish’ story as well.

The ICHTHUS fish was a symbol developed by the early Christians during their persecution by the Roman Empire in the first few centuries after Christ. Because of the fish stories from the disciples, the fish symbol was used to mark meeting places and tombs, or to distinguish friends from foes. An ancient story tells us that when a follower of Christ met a stranger in the road, they would draw one arc of the simple fish outline in the dirt. If the stranger drew the other arc, both believers knew they were in good company.

ICHTHUS is the English transliteration for the Greek letters that spell “fish” and this is how they translate:

I = Jesus
CH = Christ
TH = (of)God
U = (the)Son
S = (our) Saviour



Sometimes I see the fish on a car in front of me when I am driving, and it reminds me that God is present and knows just what is needed. It reminds me of the faithfulness of God. What are the stories you tell yourself that remind you of the faithfulness of God?



MISSION MOMENT

June 30, 2024



After participating in the New Beginnings program that guides congregations through a renewal process to discern God's call for their future, St. James (North Yarmouth, ON) began a ministry to help address the social isolation of seniors and older adults, both within the congregation and the surrounding community. St. James adapted its service to become an interactive, conference-call worship model that allows people at home or in care facilities to participate more fully through prayer, reading scripture or singing. Community programming for seniors is also centred around encouraging greater social inclusion, through delivering hot meals and care packages, a weekly home visit program with the minister and elders, and even chartering a bus to sing carols and bring Christmas cheer to doorsteps during Advent. St. James receives support from Presbyterians Sharing.

APPLESAUCE COOKIES

Submitted by Isabel Reid

1 $\frac{3}{4}$ c. flour

1 tsp. cinnamon

$\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. salt

$\frac{1}{2}$ c. shortening

1 egg

1 c. applesauce

1 tsp. baking soda

1 c. rolled oats (prefer large rolled oats)

$\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. cloves

1 c. raisins



Combine flour, salt and spices. Cream sugar, shortening and egg thoroughly. Combine applesauce and soda. Add to cream mixture alternating with dry ingredients. Stir in oats and raisins. Drop by teaspoon on greased cookie sheet. Bake at 350 for 15 to 20 minutes.

HISTORY CORNER

History of the Largie Young People's Society continued

(Taken from "Station By the River" By Norman McWilliam)

Duff Presbyterian Church Largie will celebrate 169 years this fall.

In the following Newsletters for 2024, we will share the history of the Young People's Society, which was founded 125 years ago. This is the second in the series.

In 1912, when Rev. Walter Nichol was pastor, The Young People's Home Missionary Society was re-organized as the Young People's Guild. Its constitution required the President to be a member in full communion with the church. Its programs were divided into three departments: Devotions, Missionary, and Social Service. There were usually 3 papers or addresses given each meeting as well as two or three musical numbers. These activities involved the young people in the missionary commitment of the church, and served as an important training-ground for those who would be the future leaders in the church. Each year the Society raised a considerable amount of money to support the work of the church. In 1930 the society contributed \$50 to the church treasury and \$40 to the Mission Board Budget of the church. This contribution was substantial and represented 25% of the total raised by the congregation for the Missionary Budget purposes.
