

"Lucky to be alive"

Have you been out for a stroll to see the beautiful fall colours of the trees yet?

I felt very thankful to walk out on a windy day, sun and clouds shapely clear in the sky – it was cool and crisp and invigorating. Colours all around were vibrant – a perfect fall day. And I remembered the words of a senior in long-term care who had the same answer every time I asked, "How are you today?" She replied, "Lucky to be alive!" Hearing that always made me smile – she was such a thankful person. Do you ever say that, or just thank the Lord you are alive?

This month, on November 11 th especially, we are invited to remember those who have given their lives in the hopes of making the world a better place. Without them, the world we live in would be very different today.

Remembrance Day is not about glorifying war. It's about recognizing all the brave men and women who have dedicated their lives to justice and freedom for humanity, some making the ultimate sacrifice; it's about remembering and honouring them, and the families they left behind. Who do you remember on this day?

As my friend Ron, a former fire fighter said at a Remembrance Day service during COVID, "everyone joined forces to fight the good fight, regardless of what they had to give: a life, time, skills or resources."

We may not personally know them all, but we certainly owe them all.

Lest we ever forget that.

History of the Largie Young People's Society cont'd

During this time period the Rev. John Elder, was minister who guided our Young Peoples Society, from 1962–1966. In October of 1966 Rev. Stanley Andrews was inducted to the charge of Duff Largie and Argyle Crinan and guided our Young Peoples Society until 1980 when he retired. Meetings continued monthly, with July and August as holiday months. Meetings consisted of call to worship, singing of hymns, worship paper, current topic paper, singsong and often a musical number by a member of the group.

During 1967 a discussion time was added to each meeting(contemporary topics) which was led by Rev. Andrews. The Y.P.S. also became a group for the young people of the congregation(those entering high school until their 20's or so)

In 1964 a Bowling Party was added as a social event in February, which was enjoyed by everyone. They continued with the annual Skating Party, Sunday School Picnic at Pinafore Park(The ladies group convened the table committee & Sunday School teachers often organized the games). Halloween Party was enjoyed in October. These activities often included the members of the congregation, community, and other Y.P.S from the area. Baseball team continued to play during the summer months.

The Y.P.S. also supported a Korean Orphan during the late 60's. February 3, 1967, a "Night with Robert Burns" was held in the church basement, with proceeds to help support a Korean Orphan.

Since, 1967 was the Centennial of Canada, the Y.P.S. decided to buy and plant trees as a Canada Centennial project for the society. John McCallum and David Bobier were to purchase and plant the trees. A schedule was set up of members from the group to look after the trees through July to end of September. From what I have been able to determine the 2 trees are planted along the lane ways into the Duff Church, off Largie Road. One along each lane way near the road (see pictures). If anyone can provide further information on these trees, it would be appreciated.

The group also sold All-Occasion and Christmas Cards to help support the orphan. A car wash was organized for the summer as a fund raiser. In December it was

decided that the congregation would go and sing carols at the Bobier Home under the name of the Y.P.S.

In 1968 another Scottish evening was help to help support the Korean Orphan. The group was invited to a dance held by Crinan Young Peoples Society in February. Bowling party, skating party, Sunday School Picnic, Halloween party continued. In May a pancake supper was held by the group.

The group decided to donate \$10 to the Dutton Dunwich Swimming Pool Fund at their June meeting. The group continued to lead a Church Service during the summer months. In December the Y.P.S. decided to hold an evening Church service.

As you can see, the Largie Y.P.S. continued to be a very active group during this time, supporting their congregation, community and their Orphan.
