

The Gift of Love

13 If I speak in the tongues of mortals and of angels, but do not have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. ² And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries

and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. ³ If I give away all my possessions, and if I hand over my body so that I may boast, ^[a] but do not have love, I gain nothing.

⁴Love is patient; love is kind; love is not envious or boastful or arrogant ⁵ or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; ⁶ it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. ⁷ It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things.

*Love never ends. But as for prophecies, they will come to an end; as for tongues, they will cease; as for knowledge, it will come to an end. For we know only in part, and we prophesy only in part; but when the complete comes, the partial will come to an end. When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child; when I became an adult, I put an end to childish ways. For now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face. Now I know only in part; then I will know fully, even as I have been fully known. And now faith, hope, and love abide, these three; and the greatest of these is love.

1 Corinthians 13: 1-13 seems appropriate for the month that holds Valentines's Day, doesn't it.

Paul penned these wonderful words about Love to the church in Corinth not because everything was going smoothly, but because everything wasn't. That church had so many diverse 'parts' - married and unmarried members, widows and children, Gentiles and Jews, powerful and rich alongside lower class and poor, slaves and free people, different age groups, they even had different theological perspectives – imagine that.

The problem was they began to create a hierarchy; who was better, who was more gifted, who had the better way..., all looking to keep their own interests alive and well. They were fragmented and fighting for their 'rights' when their purpose was to combine their gifts in love.

Chapter 12 of 1 Corinthians tells us all about Spiritual gifts, gifts that go beyond our normal capabilities because they are given to us by the Holy Spirit. Paul mentions wisdom, knowledge, faith, healing, miracles, prophecy, discernment,

speaking in tongues and interpreting tongues. There are varieties of gifts, services, activities – everyone has a part to play, everyone has a spiritual gift, but it is God who activates them, for the common good.

Paul compares those various gifts and their operation together to the operation of our own physical body. Each one of them is important to the whole. One gift is not better than the other. The church is often called the body of Christ because the church is the visible representation of Christ on earth now. So that body needs to work as a unit, not as separate parts trying to be in control.

Just imagine waking up one day and suddenly the mouth/tongue decides it is more important than every other part of the body – what would happen? So it decides it likes to sample every sort of breakfast because it enjoys taste – it tells the hand to keep putting food into it because it is in charge, so it keeps eating and eating and eating. This is great the mouth says – but the stomach replies, "uh-oh, wrong combination", or "I can't hold any more"... and it all comes back. We could pick any number of scenarios where different parts of the body work for themselves instead of for the common good and see how it affects the body in an adverse way.

Now faith, hope, and love abide. But the greatest of these is love because it enhances and gives meaning to every other spiritual gift. Not just any love, not emotional love, God's love; love in action. Because love like that is for the common good. Operating without love makes the outcome all about the person(s), not about the body of Christ, not about the glory of God. History and current affairs show us how damaging giftedness apart from love can be. If the gifts of the Spirit are used without the gift of love it creates division rather than community.

To love someone is to act in certain ways toward that person; to think of them as one of God's own; to act, work or pray for their wellbeing; to forgive. We may not share the same perspectives, we may not even like them; but we are to love them and God calls us to work for their wellbeing....because God so loved the whole world that he gave his only son to bring it back into right relationship with him. We are all on level ground at the foot of the cross.

Thanks be to God for the Gift of Love.

White Chocolate Chip Raspberry Scones

Submitted by Emily McWilliam

Prep Time: 15 minutes Cook Time: 20 minutes Total Time: 35 minutes Yield: 8 scones

INGREDIENTS

2 ½ c. all purpose flour	2/3 c. heavy cream, plus more for topping							
½ tsp. salt	2 large eggs							
¼ c. sugar	2 tsp. vanilla extract							
2 ¼ tsp. baking powder	1 c. raspberries							
6 tbsp. cold unsalted butter, cubed	3/4 c. white chocolate chips							
	Sanding sugar, optional							

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Preheat oven to 400°F. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper or a Silpat.
- 2. In a medium bowl, whisk together the flour, salt, sugar anad baking powder. Add the cubed butter, and using your fingers, work it into the flour until the mixture resembles wet sand.
- 3. In a separate medium bowl, whisk together the heavy cream, eggs and vanilla. Add the wet ingredients and stir the mixture several times then add the raspberries and chocolate chips, and mix until it forms a moist dough. (The raspberries will break apart slightly, but the less you stir the mixture, the more light and tender your scones will be. (**See note below)
- 4. Transfer the dough onto a generously floured work surface and gather it into a 8-inch circle that's about 3/4-inch thick. Cut the circle into 8 wedges. Space the scones out at least 2 inches apart on the lined baking sheet then place the baking sheet in the freezer for 20 minutes.
- 5. Remove the scones from the freezer. Brush the tops with heavy cream then sprinkle them with the sanding sugar. Bake the scones for about 20 minutes until pale golden and they're baked through. Remove from the oven and serve immediately.
- **Note The more smashed the raspberries are, the wetter the dough will be. If needed, sprinkle the top of the dough with flour while gathering it onto your work surface. Do not knead the dough, but rather loosely gather it. The less touching, the better.

History of the Largie Young People's Society

(Taken from "Station By the River" By Norman McWilliam, Secretary's books 1963-1968, and personal remembrances of Young People's Society Members) Submitted by Lynda Drummelsmith

Under the continuing guidance of Rev. Stanley Andrews monthly meetings continued to be held, with July and August as possible holiday months. Meetings consisted of call to worship, singing of hymn, short worship paper, and singing accompanied by guitar. Some meetings we had a guest speaker. Several meetings other Y.P. groups were invited to join us. Crinan Y.P. and Rodney Y.P. were two of the groups who often joined with us. Our group had 16 members with an average attendance of 11, during these years.

Regular activities for the years included – Card parties (at Cowal Hall and Crinan Hall), skating parties @ West Lorne arena (followed by hot dogs, hot chocolate and dessert at the church), tobogganing on local hills, (one year at Simpsons- followed by a weiner roast), bowling party, baseball games, annual Halloween party. In 1973 we held a Strawberry social in June (this continued for many years). Selling of Christmas cards continued to be a big fundraiser.

The Y.P.S supported the following groups – Missions, Compassion, Duff Church, Daffodil Society, Cancer Society, Salvation Army Children's Village, with money raised from their yearly activities. In 1973 when new hymn books were purchased for the Church, the Y.P. purchased 3 books to donate. (I actually found one of them, and will have it placed in our display cabinet at the church).

- -In 1974 our group made stuffed toys (17) to be donated to the Daffodil Society to have for Christmas.
- -In 1975 began to support an Orphan from Haiti (Geoffrey). This continued for many years. Members from the group would write to him monthly. (Unfortunately, I haven't found any of the letters or pictures he sent to the group)

Members of the group would sometimes provide the children's story for our church services.

Members from the group, took part in Presbytery of London sponsored Ralleys. Every second year the Y.P. would lead the Easter Sunrise service, followed by a Pancake Breakfast (usually cooked by our Church Session members), led Christmas Eve Candlelight, midnight service. The group also organized and conducted a Church service during the summer months.

Singing accompanied by guitar was well received by our congregation and we would sing at various services during the year, including church anniversary, Christmas, Easter, Mother's Day, summer services. In 1975 we sang at -Belmont Church Anniversary, & Elgin Manor. Through the years Bruce McWilliam, Brenda Webber (McWilliam), & Alex

Henderson were the guitarists. During these years we often joined Rodney Y.P.S. for Christmas caroling in Rodney.

1975 was the Centennial Celebration of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. In 1974 our group (with Brenda as lead) made a banner which was entered in a competition and went on tour during 1975. This banner still hangs in our church. In June of 1975 we took part in the Centennial Celebration service at our church.

As you can see this group was very active and were involved in many church and community events. I remember this as a very exciting and wonderful time for our group. An active group which loved to be included in all aspects of church life.
