



This month's recipe is submitted by Evelyn Poisson. Pastor Wilma brought this coffee cake to Evelyn and she enjoyed it so good, that she wanted to share the recipe. The recipe is actually, Audrey's (Pastor Wilma's mother). Thanks Evelyn, Audrey, and Pastor Wilma.

Sour Cream Coffee Cake

Blend together:

3/4 c. white sugar

1/2 c. butter or margarine

Then blend in:

2 eggs beaten

1 tsp. vanilla

Add and blend in:

1 1/3 c. flour

1 tsp. baking soda

2 tsp. baking powder

Add and blend in:

1 c. sour cream

Topping:

 $\frac{1}{2}$ c. brown sugar

1 tsp. cinnamon

2 tbsp. chopped nuts (walnuts or pecans)

Grease you pan(s) or line with wax paper. Pour (or spoon) in $\frac{1}{2}$ of batter and sprinkle topping and then add other half and sprinkle again with topping.

Bake in 350 or 325 F oven for 40-50 minutes.

This recipe makes one regular loaf, but I always double it to make 4 small loaves or 1 small loaf and a two-layer cake. This recipe makes a great birthday cake—just leave off the topping and use icing.

Note—things always turn out better if you carefully monitor the cooking time according to your own oven. Test for doneness with a skewer in the thickest part of the cake (usually the centre—it should come out clean if it's done.

and thinks that since he is just as good a hopper as his
friend the Easter Bunny, he should hand out some of his
own Easter eggs! He hipped and he hopped, but his

friends just didn't think he could replace the Easter Bunny! It was a cute story, and I think the adults enjoyed it just as much as the children! The children then made Easter finger puppets.

On April 25, we read the story, <u>How Bear Lost his Tail</u>. Bear didn't like his fluffy tail as it always got in the way and sometimes caused him to sneeze. Fox was very sly and tricked bear into sitting over an ice fishing hole. Bear didn't realize that his tail would freeze if he left it in the freezing cold water. You can guess what happened! DUFF CHURCH LARGIE HISTORY CORNER

History of the Largie Young People's Society continued

(Taken from "Station By the River" By Norman McWilliam, Secretary's books 1980-1983, and personal remembrances of Young People's Society Members)

This will be the last instalment of the Duff Largie Young People's Society History. If minutes or records are found for the group after 1983, I would be glad to add that to a future newsletter. If you have been following along you will realize that the Young People's Society of Duff was an important part of church life in Largie. "It was the connecting link for the youth of the congregation as they progressed from children in the Sunday School to full adulthood. Through the years, an active and vibrant young people's organization has been a useful training-ground in Christian witness and service. It has also provided leadership in innovative and progressive thinking that has always been the trade-mark of young people." (quote from "Station by the River" Norman McWilliam).

Some important firsts by the Y.P.S. group through the years – The group was the first to use the organ in their meetings in the basement of the church. One year later the congregation agreed to the introduction of the organ for use in its regular worship. The influence of the young People in this decision was considerable. Again in 1922 a piano was purchased by the Young People's Society to be used in the basement, an innovation not fully approved by older members. In the seventies the guitar was introduced and first used in divine worship by the young people, another innovation met with some disapproval by some of their elders. (on a personal note I vividly remember my grandmother, being one who fully supported the young people and the use of the guitar in worship)


Many of the Y.P.S. members have gone on to become strong leaders in their church and community, wherever their life's path has taken them. The ties are strong to the home church that gave them the foundation and roots of their faith. In fact, several who had been a part of the Y.P.S at any of their singing events, through the seventies and eighties reunited to sing once again at the Corner Stone opening of Duff Church in 1995. (Celebrating the 100th Anniversary of the church building) The music and the beat was still strong! It is our hope that as we see more children in our Sunday School and congregation, that the Young People's Society will be reactivated, and resume its vital role in the life of the church!
