GOD SPEAKS TO US

Time for the Young and the Young at Heart

- † Items: piece of paper and pen
- † Humour me... and try this... ©
- † On the paper, write your name in the middle near the top of the page (you can make it fancy or decorate it if you want)
- † Think about your name is there a story of why your parents gave you that name?
- † Think about how important a person's name is
- † Think about how it is said or how it is used makes a difference (tone of voice; sentences of praise or rebuke)
- † When Jesus was Baptised, the heavens opened, and God's Spirit came down on Him like a dove. Then a voice said: "You are my Son, whom I love; with you I am well pleased."
- † How do you think Jesus felt when He heard those words?
- † How do you feel when people tell you they love you? That they are proud of you?
- † When our spouse, siblings, or friends tell us how special we are, maybe we can feel a little bit like Jesus felt when God told Jesus He was well pleased with Jesus.

- † How does it feel when you read your name in this sentence? Do you believe that God does call you His beloved son or daughter, and that He is very pleased with you?
- † It is very important for us to remember that God loves us, He knows each of us by name
- † Parents and others, we need to remember how important it is to tell our children and grandchildren (all children... everyone) how special they are and how much God loves them. When we do, God speaks His message of love through our words.
- † Let's pray: Dear God. It is such good news that You love us so much. When things are hard and it seems like we aren't special to anyone, help us to remember that You love us so much you gave your only Son, Jesus, for us. Thank You for loving us that much. In the name of your Son, Jesus we pray. Amen.

Sermon: Baptism with "the Holy Spirit and with Fire"

Thirty years have passed since the birth of Jesus, and now we hear His cousin, John, preaching to a crowd of people who have gathered around him on the banks of the Jordan. Some of the people talk quietly among themselves: 'Is John the Christ?' 'Is he the one?' John, hearing the rumblings, answers: "I am not the Christ, I baptise you with water; but there is another who is coming that is so powerful that I'm not even worthy enough to be His lowest servant, who would untie His sandals! And He, He is so powerful that He will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and with fire."

"He [Jesus] will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and with fire!" Do we usually think of our baptism as being this – a baptism with the Holy Spirit and with fire?

In the Living Faith, the statement of Christian belief of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, Baptism is explained this way in section "7.6: Baptism

7.6.1 Baptism is a sign and seal of our union with Christ and with his church.

Through it we share in the death and resurrection of Christ and are commissioned to his service.

7.6.2 In Baptism, water is administered in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. The water signifies the washing away of sin, the start of new life in Christ, and the gift of the Holy Spirit.

7.6.3 By the power of the Holy Spirit God acts through Baptism. It is the sacrament not of what we do but of what God has done for us in Christ. God's grace and our response to it are not tied to the moment of Baptism. but continue and deepen throughout life. It is a sacrament meant

for those who profess their faith and for their children. Together we are the family of God.

7.6.4 Baptism is also an act of discipleship

that requires commitment and looks towards growth in Christ. Those baptised in infancy are called in later years to make personal profession of Christ. What is born may die. What is grafted may wither.

Congregations and those baptised must strive to nurture life in Christ.

7.6.5 Baptism assures us that we belong to God. In life and in death our greatest comfort is that we belong

to our faithful Saviour Jesus Christ."

Well, it mentions the Holy Spirit – that we are baptised in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit as commissioned by Jesus in Matthew 28:18; that baptism signifies the gift of the Holy Spirit. And that it is by the power of the Holy Spirit that God acts through baptism.

One thing this statement of faith doesn't mention is the 'fire' that John mentioned – where's the fire? He said Jesus would baptise with the Spirit and with fire! Well, I must admit, I had never really paid much attention to the whole story before when we think of Jesus baptism, we think of the importance of God's voice announcing Jesus as His Son, which is very important! But because He is God's Son, He is able to baptise with the Spirit and with fire.

Dr. Craig Evans, wrote in his commentary on this, the following: "John is saying that those prepared and ready to receive the Messiah will experience a baptism of the Holy Spirit but those who refuse him will undergo a baptism of fire." If they refuse Jesus, or don't have a right heart, then it seems they will go to the place of eternal fire (hell). I can see how he comes to this idea, since Luke 3:17 states: "His [Jesus] winnowing fork is in His hand to clear His threshing floor and to gather the wheat

into His barn, but He will burn up the chaff with unquenchable fire." This definitely sounds like John is connecting the baptising Jesus will do with judgment. The winnowing fork was like a great flat wooden rake or hay fork with the tines close together; as one scooped up the grain and shook it or sifted it, the heads of grain would fall through and onto the floor; and the chaff was left on the fork to be thrown into a fire. So just as the chaff was separated from the grain; so Jesus would separate the good and the bad.

This is what Peter was warning Simon about in Acts 8:14-25. Simon (not Simon Peter, but Simon the sorcerer) had believed the preaching of Phillip about the Kingdom of God and about Jesus Christ, and had been baptised with the others in the name of Jesus; but they had not yet received the Holy Spirit. When Peter and John came along, they prayed and laid hands on them and they received the Holy Spirit.

Simon was so excited that he wanted to be able to do the same, so he offered Peter money to give him the ability to lay hands on people and have them receive the Holy Spirit – wrong thing to do Simon! The Holy Spirit is a gift, it can't be bought – If we think we can buy it or earn it, then we are not "receiving" it from God, are we? And so like Simon, we have to realise this and change our ways before it is too late. Peter warns Simon that he had better repent and pray to the Lord, and perhaps then he will be forgiven; because Peter could tell Simon believed with his head and not with his heart. Perhaps Simon was thinking about the power and prestige that would come to him if he could lay hands on people and they would receive the Holy Spirit. Perhaps he could see a way to make money by doing this, just as he did with his sorcery practices. Whatever he was thinking, Peter points out because of it, Simon's heart was not right before God. Something was causing a blockage between him and God, and Simon would have to get rid of it, to set things right.

Even though Simon "believed" and was baptised, he still had a lapse. Simon shows us that no one is safe from going the wrong way. There will be times when each one of us is tested, to make sure that we are true believers, that we adhere to the

promises, the vows we made or will make at our baptisms, or our children's baptisms:

- ⊕ Do you turn away from sin, and turn to Jesus Christ, accepting and confessing Him as your Lord and Saviour, trusting in His grace and love?
- → Do you promise, in dependence on the Holy Spirit, to mature
 as a Christian in the church, to seek the guidance of Christ
 as you listen for His Word, to celebrate His death and life at
 the Table He provides, and to engage in His mission to the
 world?
- → Do you as the parent (or parents) promise, in dependence on Divine Grace, to raise your child(ren) in the love and knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ within the home and the fellowship of the church?
- ♣ Or as a congregation:

Do you, as members of the church of Jesus Christ, promise to guide and nurture _____, _____ by word and deed, with love and in prayer, encouraging him/her (them) to follow the way of Christ and to be (a) faithful member(s) of His Church?

- → Then there is the affirmation of our beliefs by reciting The Apostle's Creed.
- ⊕ (Do you remember making these vows at your Baptism, or at your child's Baptism; or maybe when you made your Affirmation of Faith?)
- ⊕ (If you would like to talk about baptism, please just let me know!)

These are important vows, made in the presence of, and with the help of God's Holy Spirit.

We need to acknowledge that the Holy Spirit with us all the time, to strengthen us, to empower us; to keep us in God's way; and to help us discern the Scriptures.

Perhaps like Simon though, we also need to feel the heat of the fire sometimes, to make us realise that if we get too close, we will get burned. The winnowing fork for us is the trials that we go through, to see if we are truly believers in Christ. We may come close to the fire on the fork but can also be saved by the One who holds the fork, pulled back from the flames at the last

moment if we hold on; if we change our ways. The fork is also what separates us from those who do evil, and from the eternal fire. And if we don't change our ways to follow God's, then we will be like those who end up on the fork and thrown into the fire.

However, as you know, there is HOPE! Hearts can be changed, made right with God. Simon shows us this when he asks Peter to pray for him. Now we're not told what happens to Simon in the end; but we do know that God desires no one to be lost; He gives us as many chances as possible. And that is why He gives others to pray for us, to help us. And when we don't know what or how to pray, God gives us the Holy Spirit who will also pray for us with such deep signs that we cannot even understand (Romans 8:26), and who will help us to get right with God. There is the transforming and energizing power of the Holy Spirit!

This leads us to another meaning of "fire" in the Luke passage. The idea of 'fire' could also mean that when we are baptised with the Holy Spirit we will also be baptised with fire – we will be lit on fire by the Holy Spirit – receiving the Holy Spirit and the spark to proclaim Jesus with a right heart and with the passion to change other hearts.

At first, I thought these were two conflicting ideas of the 'fire' Luke spoke of, but now I feel they are not. Jesus does baptise us with the Holy Spirit and with fire. The Holy Spirit gives us the power and the fire to go out and proclaim the good news; and to baptise others. However, if we do not accept Jesus' baptism with the Holy Spirit, then we are destined, like the chaff, for the fire.

We see this in the apostles, as mentioned earlier, after the Resurrection, Jesus commissions the disciples to go and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. The disciples had to first receive the gift of the Holy Spirit, which they do on the day of Pentecost. Then once they received the Holy Spirit, they are sparked to go teach and preach, and baptise others. They have received so then they can in turn give.

It is a gift we can all receive and can pass on: through our baptism and by prayer, our personal concern and care for others – like Peter and John did. There are many who believe, like those in Samaria, but who do not realise the fire in them, or have let the fire go down or out completely. We can help them ignite or re-kindle that fire. If we don't reach out to help others to believe, not only with their heads but also with their hearts that God's Holy Spirit is in them, then we are helping to throw them into the fire – this is tough to think about! So don't let others struggle without the knowledge of the presence of God in their lives – pray for them – reach out to them – and together give praise and thanks to God and to Jesus Christ His Son for the gift of the Holy Spirit!

Grace, we pray, each one of us with Your healing touch, Your peace and comfort. Grant us the gift of discernment and the willingness to reach out and to bring the wholeness You promise to those around us. Lord we hold before You those who suffer alone this day; those who ache and throb with pain or hunger; those awaiting tests or diagnosis; those who tremble in fear and anxiety; and those who feel empty and unfulfilled. We pray for them and for those whom we name... (take time to pray for those whose names and situations God brings to you mind and heart)

We pray for Your Church in every place, around the world and in our Presbytery. We thank You for their dedication in the ministries, and their desire to share Your love with individuals and groups of all sizes. We rejoice that their vision is to faithfully serve You in the communities around them. And we pray for You to give them strength and hope as they continue and grow in sharing Your Good News with others.

All these things and so many more we pray through Jesus the Christ, who taught us to pray together...

Our Father who art in heaven hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil, for Thine is the kingdom, the power, and the glory for ever and ever. Amen.
