Amazed and perplexed, they asked one another, "What does this mean?" Some, however, made fun of them and said, "They have had too much wine."

Then Peter stood up with the Eleven, raised his voice and addressed the crowd: "Fellow Jews and all of you who live in Jerusalem, let me explain this to you. Listen carefully to what I say. These people are not drunk, as you suppose. It is only nine in the morning! No, this is what was spoken by the prophet Joel: "In the last days, God says, I will pour out my Spirit on all people. Your sons and daughters will prophesy, your young men will see visions, your old men will dream dreams. Even on my servants, both men and women, I will pour out my Spirit in those days, and they will prophesy. I will show wonders in the heavens above and signs on the earth below, blood and fire and billows of smoke. The sun will be turned to darkness and the moon to blood before the coming of the great and glorious day of the Lord. And everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved."

The Meditation

"In-Spirit-ation"

I am asked from time to time how I find ideas for the messages I preach every Sunday. It is intimidating, from time to time, to have to come up with a 1000+ word essay each week, and hope that I am doing justice to your trust in me! But first, I start with the Scripture texts for the week from the Lectionary. I read through the passage, pray about it, and then let it "percolate", as I seek inspiration for what God is looking for me to share with all of you.

Sometimes I find that inspiration in nature, perhaps when I am out for a run or a walk. Sometimes I find inspiration in a conversation I have with one of you, a neighbour, or a colleague. I do have lots of resources – commentaries, articles, books, websites, and the like, which I will browse through for inspiration. And then there are times, like today, where I find inspiration in a word - "inspiration" or "inspire"!

I did a dictionary "dive" into the "definition of "inspire", which is the verb form of "inspiration". *Thesauras.com* defines "inspire" as: *to fill with an animating, quickening, or exalting influence: or to animate, as an influence, feeling, thought, or the like.*¹ Looking at the root, or etymology of "inspire", it does not take much for you and me to figure out, as we hear from the Merriam-Webster dictionary, that:

This moving little word may be traced back to the Latin inspirare ("to breathe or blow into"), which itself is from the word spirare, meaning "to breathe." It did not take long to establish itself in a figurative sense, as our earliest written English uses of 'inspire' give it the meaning "to influence, move, or guide (as to speech or action) through divine or supernatural agency or power." Many of the early figurative senses of inspire are religious in nature, so it is not surprising to learn that the word shares a connection with <u>spirit</u> (which comes from the Latin word for "breath," <u>spiritus</u>, which is also from spirare).²

You will recall that a few weeks ago, we marked Ascension Sunday, and I shared with you the story of the disciples after Jesus left them and returned to his heavenly Father. That was 40 days after Jesus' resurrection. Think of everything they had been through in the interim! - they would barely have had time to catch their breath! And now, as they gathered in that room on that Pentecost morning, I am sure they were thinking and worrying about how they were going to fulfill Jesus' direction to carry on his ministry. What would they do? Where would they find the inspiration?

But before the disciples knew what was happening, out of the blue, they heard a mighty wind heading their way. The wind, the breath, imbued them with a power they did not understand. This power, this breath, this inspiration, swooped into the room and permeated them in a way they could have **never** imagined. They came face to face, lung to lung, with the gift of God's Holy Spirit, God's holy breath.

Once the disciples realized they could breathe again, they found themselves speaking of God's deeds in their lives. They all burst out in languages they did not even know they could speak-telling the story of how they once were no people, but now they were **God's people**. They once had no name, no faith, and no future, but now, they were God's own children, given the breath of faith, glimpsing a future in which they were received back to God's own self. These timid, stressed-out disciples breathed in, were "in-spirit-ed", and found themselves

preaching, testifying, to who God was and what God had done in their lives. And the people listened!

God's Spirit still works this way. The Holy Spirit, the breath of God, is at work, here and now. Through Scripture and prayers, through music and proclamation, through experience and relationships, God's holy breath challenges us, comforts us, scares us, and inspires us. The story of Pentecost tells us if we are open to breathing it in, if we dare to pray "Come Holy Spirit," we will find our own lungs filled with a courage, a reserve of strength, a passion of faith we did not even know we had. As people of Pentecost, God invites us to experience the fullness of life which God intends with God's holy breath. We are invited to breathe deeply and consciously in every moment of our lives. Breathing, expecting to be filled with God's Spirit, God's holy breath. Expecting to be changed by it as it fills our lungs. Expecting that we might be "in-spirit-ed" to imagine seeing or speaking things we did not think we had the courage to say.

Now, we all are not going to be "in-spirit-ed" by the Holy Spirit in the same way as the disciples were in our text for today! I can tell you that I have never been "in-spirit-ed" in that way! My inspiration comes in much smaller ways. But our story in Acts promises that, like those disciples, each of us are Pentecost people, and God's Spirit, God's breath is still at work around, among, and in us. It is a breath of life, of courage, and of proclamation that can fill our lungs to overflowing, "in-spirit-ing" us to live each day, to share our faith, to reach out in love to others, to make a difference where we are, right here and now. We do not have to go out and preach in different languages, of course! Our work can be done in ways big and small, through the "in-spirit-ation" of the Holy Breath in each of us.

I know this is a long answer to the question of where I find the inspiration for my weekly messages! Like the disciples on that Pentecost Sunday so long ago, I find the "breath" of the Holy Spirit guides me, helping me to see biblical texts, our church, and our world in a new light. This same Holy Spirit is in each of you, too. So, take a deep breath and find the "inspirit-ation" to do the ministry Christ calls each of us and this congregation to do here and now! Amen.

Minister: God of Love, do not let us grow weary of living our lives according to the example of your child, Jesus. Pour out upon us your Spirit, who reminds us that we bear Jesus' love and life within our very being - a powerful gift for our world. Out of this gift, may we bear the fruit of love. Amen.

On the night on which his friends betrayed him, Jesus came to the table with those very friends. He took bread and blessed it, broke the bread and said: "Take this, all of you, and eat it. This is my body given for you. Do this to remember me." When the supper was ended, he took a cup of wine and passed it among his friends and said: "This is the cup of the new covenant, sealed in my blood for the forgiveness of sin. Do this to remember me."

So now we do as Jesus did, as we take this bread and this wine. In these, Jesus has promised to be present. Through these, Christ can make us whole. And as Jesus offered thanks for the gifts of the earth, let us also bless God for what we are about to receive.

Minister: Spirit of God, blow through this world and our lives like the wind, to surround us with your presence and give us the energy to go where you need us to be. Push us to move like the wind and make a difference in the lives we touch. 

PENTECOST

(Pentecost from Greek pentecoste, "50th day"), is celebrated on the Sunday that falls on the 50th day of Easter. It commemorates the descent the Holy Spirit on the Apostles and other disciples following the crucifixion, resurrection. and ascension of Jesus Christ (Acts:2), and it marks the beginning of the Christian church's mission to the world. The Jewish feast of Pentecost (Shavuot) primarily a thanksgiving for firstfruits of the wheat harvest, but it later associated with was remembrance of the Law given by God to Moses on Mount Sinai. The church's transformation of the Jewish feast to a Christian festival was thus related to the belief that the gift of the Holy Spirit to

the followers of Jesus was the firstfruits of a new dispensation that fulfilled and succeeded the old dispensation of the Law. When the festival was first celebrated in the Christian church is not known, but it was mentioned in a work from the Eastern church, the *Epistola Apostolorum*, in the 2nd century. In the 3rd century it was mentioned by Origen, theologian and head of the catechetical school in Alexandria, and by Tertullian, Christian priest and writer of Carthage.

In the early church, Christians often referred to the entire 50-day period beginning with Easter as Pentecost. Baptism was administered both at the beginning (Easter) and end (the day of Pentecost) of the Paschal season. Eventually, Pentecost became a more popular time for baptism than Easter in northern Europe, and in England the feast was commonly called White Sunday (Whitsunday) for the special white garments worn by the newly baptized. In *The First Prayer Book of Edward VI* (1549), the feast was officially called Whitsunday, and this name has continued in Anglican churches. In Catholic and other Western churches, clergy often wear red vestments during Pentecost to symbolize the "tongues of fire" that descended on the disciples from the Holy Spirit; members of the congregation also wear red in some traditions, and the altar/communion table is commonly dressed in a red covering.



Fleeing Home: Am Salama's Journey

Am Salama fondly reminisces about the life she and her family led before the war struck. Earlier in 2023, a political crisis unfolded in Sudan, and tensions flared, triggering a widespread exodus of people toward South

Sudan and neighbouring countries. Many families were forced to abandon their once-thriving lives in pursuit of safety. At 35 years old, Am Salama and her husband were thriving as farmers who also owned a small restaurant in Fudain, East Darfur. In their bustling town, the restaurant generated enough income to support their six children.

However, when the war erupted, their lives took a drastic turn. Fearing for the safety of herself and her children, Am Salama made the difficult decision to flee to South Sudan. Her husband had to remain behind to care for his blind mother, resulting in the separation of the entire family.

The journey to safety was full of challenges for Am Salama. Along the way, she was robbed of the little money and clothing she had managed to take during their escape. Additionally, she encountered numerous hardships, including frequent illness, making the already strenuous journey even more overwhelming. Am Salama and her children found safety at the Wedwil Refugee Camp,

where the family received food assistance, provided by Canadian Foodgrains Bank members, with support from PWS&D. She shares that her family would not have survived without the food assistance. In addition to food assistance, shelter, education, and health care, there remain pressing needs in the camps. Your support



is ensuring that the many people who call the camps home will be able to access these essential resources.
