# **Prayer of Confession**

<u>All</u>: We know that you cherish all your children and call us to love and care for them. But we confess that our ways are too often not your ways; that our societies are unequal and unjust; and our policies too often cause pain and suffering. As a church, we have participated in the harms of colonization and racism with the result that generations of Indigenous children have been forced from families and communities.

Minister: Forgive us. Stir in us a dedication to the conviction that racism can be eliminated.

<u>All</u>: Give us the will to work for the end of inequity and injustice that harms Indigenous children. Let us work for healing and reconciliation in our nation and our world. Amen

Minister: We confess our brokenness, God. We come before you with all that we are - and all that we fail to be. With all we have done, and all we have failed to do, God of mercy, in you we know we can find healing and wholeness. Amen.

#### Children's Message:

#### Different, but the same!

Minister: Hello, children of God! Do you like to eat fruit? I sure do. What are your favorite kinds of fruit to eat? Well, I have here some fruits to show you. What is this? (*Hold up one kind of apple*) That's right, it's an apple! How about this one? Yes! It is also an apple! Now, they do not quite look the same on the outside, do they? But if I cut them open, what would I find inside? They are both apples and have seeds and flesh inside them. They might not be exactly alike, but they are the same fruit. How about this one? (*Hold up a banana, an orange and a strawberry.*). Right! They look different, but they are all fruit and are good for us.

How are people like this? Well, we do not all look the same on the outside, do we? Some people are different sizes, have different body types, and different colours of hair, eyes, and skin. We do not all sound the same or say the same things. But on the inside, we are **all** human. Do you know what is extra special about humans? The Bible tells us that God made us in God's image. God loves us and values us, so much that God sent Jesus to show us that love. And Jesus did not love just people from a certain country or people who look a certain way. He loved all people!! And when other people are in God's family, they are like our brothers and sisters. Even if you are an only child, you can have a whole bunch of brothers and sisters in God's family.

This Sunday is called **Healing and Reconciliation Sunday**, where we remember how Indigenous children in Canada, children that were about your age, were taken away from their parents and sent to residential schools so they looked and acted and sounded more like white European people, rather than keeping their own culture and language. Can you imagine what it would be like to be taken away from your parents and sent to school far away, how afraid you would have been? It was terrible, and that fear has continued to affect them and their families.

Sadly, the Presbyterian Church in Canada, our church, ran some of those residential schools. We as a church have said we are sorry for this, but there is more that we can do to build loving relationships with the Indigenous people of Canada. Today we remember what happened to those children, and we learn at school and in church about how to care for them and help them to know that God loves them! Come and pray with me, and ask God to help us care for them, and for one another?

# Children's Prayer:

Dear God, please help us to love and serve others. Sometimes it's hard. Sometimes people seem different from us. But we know that you love everyone and want them to know that! Help us to share that good news with everyone. In Jesus, name. Amen!

#### The Meditation:

# Winning the Lottery

Imagine, for a moment, that you bought a ticket for Lotto Max or one of those US Powerball lotteries and you found out, when you checked your numbers, that you were suddenly a multimillionaire?? Then imagine, after you picked yourself up off the floor, what would you do differently in your life? And here I do not mean what would you run out and buy – though I am sure that most of us would treat ourselves to something (or **MORE** than something!!) – but I am thinking more along the lines of, what would be different about your day-to-day attitudes, practices, habits, and outlook? How would knowing that your future is secure change your present?

I ask because it is just this scenario that Paul is describing in our scripture text for today. According to Romans, vv. 15-17, we are not only God's children, but also heirs, and not just

heirs, but co-heirs with Christ. Now, stop here for just a moment and think about what Paul is really saying. That God considers us co-heirs – that is, equal inheritors of all God has to give – with Christ, God's only begotten Son. When you think about it, we HAVE won the lottery! And winning this lottery means more than just lots of money (although that would be rather cool, too!). Rather than being afraid – of the future, of what people may think of us, of our status, of our standing with God – Paul invites us to imagine a life of courage, the courage of those who have been adopted by God and invited into the full measure of God's blessings and riches.

All of which brings me to the Trinity, the Father-Son-Holy Spirit "three-in-one" about which much ink has been spilled over the centuries and about which theologians and scholars continue to wrestle. But at the heart of our understanding of God as somehow three-in-one is the concept that you cannot fully or finally understand God without talking about relationship. That God is so full of love that there must be some way of talking about that loved shared in and through profound relationships.

God's essential being has always been a giving and receiving and sharing of love that spills out into the whole of the universe and invites all of us into it. First through creation and God's series of covenants, then ultimately in the way that God's Son came into the world to demonstrate in word and deed just how much God loves us, and now as the Spirit bears witness to God's ongoing love for us and all creation. Which means, I think, that when we talk about the Trinity as God being three-in-one, we really have not captured it fully unless we recognize that God is three-in-one in order always to add one more — and that is us, an infinite "plus one" through which God's love is made complete in relationship with all of God's children. Paul tells us of the profound love that draws us into relationship with God, with each other, and with the whole of creation.

I think about the idea of the Trinity, this relationship with God and with each other, in connection with *Healing and Reconciliation Sunday*, which also falls on this Sunday. Healing and Reconciliation Sunday was designated by the 2006 General Assembly, recognizing the need for healing and relationship building between Indigenous and non-Indigenous people in Canada. Our Indigenous siblings are part of the infinite "three-in-one plus one", but Christian Europeans, as the "colonizers", refused to acknowledge that, trying to assimilate Indigenous people into their culture, especially by forcing Indigenous children to attend residential schools. Sadly, the Presbyterian Church was complicit in this racist attitude, running 12 residential schools for over a century.

June 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2024, will mark thirty years since the Church adopted its 1994 confession, which acknowledges the church's complicity in a deadly assimilation effort that targeted Indigenous children. Now, you might ask yourself, "well is not an apology enough?" But, as I mentioned above, this Trinity Sunday reminds us that God's love is made complete in relationship with **all** of God's children.

If we have wronged a friend or family member, we do more than just say "Im sorry", right? We reach out to the friend or family member, learning more about how they are feeling, acknowledging what we did, and learning from our mistakes. While the relationship will not necessarily be the same as it was before, in some ways, it can be made stronger and closer. The same applies to us as the Church as we work to eliminate racism and discrimination, so that God's love is completed in the infinite "three-in-one plus one" which is the fulfillment of God's will for us. As we look at the violence in Gaza, in Ukraine, in Sudan, at the polarization and division within our own society, to the racism, sexism and the other "isms" inflicted on so many, it is easy to fall into a spirit of fear and despair, to feel overwhelmed and believe that we cannot do anything in the face of it all.

But Paul reminds us that *the Spirit you received does not make you slaves, so that you live in fear again.* Fear is the basis of so much of the polarization in our society, the "scapegoating" of people who "do not look like us"; "do not talk like us"; "do not think like us". But there is a saying from Jewish tradition that you might have heard: "*You are not obligated to complete the task, but neither are you free to desist from it*". It is a call to action and a rejection of apathy and inertia, even when the task at hand seems overwhelming. As people who believe in the Triune God, that God that is "three-in-one plus one", we have power that is greater than anything – we have the power of the Spirit, the power of love which always has room for one more! So, going back to my question at the beginning of this message, if you won a Lotto Max or Powerball lottery, would be different about your day-to-day life, knowing your future is financially secure? Then think about this - what decisions might you make knowing you have God's unconditional love? What kind of risks might they take in your relationships or careers knowing that you have the security of knowing that the creator and sustainer of the universe has your back? Friends, as beloved children of God, we have won the lottery – the one that REALLY matters! Go out and live like it! Amen.

#### Responding in love with thanksgiving

#### Prayers of the People, the Lord's Prayer and Choral Amen

Minister: God of Truth, because we are imperfect, so too are the societies, communities, and relationships we build. Selfishness and arrogance in our relationships do not reflect your love, and have too often hurt your creation, and your beloved people therein. We know that wounds inflicted because of false beliefs about the superiority of people of a particular race, class or gender do not reflect your love for all people, nor your commandment to love you, and to love our neighbours. We acknowledge that even if we did not directly inflict these wounds, we have inherited wounded relationships, and that diminishing, ignoring, or denying this continues our complicity in a cycle of harm. We pray for those who are hurt and hurting because of false beliefs about the superiority of a particular race, class, or gender.

# <u>People</u>: God, let equity and justice bring healing.

Minister: We hold in our hearts.....those who are sick or have loved ones that are struggling with physical or mental illness and substance use caused by trauma. Let them know they are not alone.

# People: Jesus, bring your comfort, justice, and peace.

Minister: .....people who face violence in their relationships, in their home, workplace, community or country, and for those who have been displaced by war, unjust economic systems, the climate crisis, and ongoing impacts of colonization around the world, praying especially for the people of Gaza, Ukraine, Afghanistan, Syria, Sudan, and Somalia.

People: Spirit, bring your comfort, justice, and peace.

Minister: .....people who are living with housing insecurity; where home is inadequate for the needs of the people it must shelter, is unsafe, unaffordable, or inaccessible.

<u>People</u>: Creator, bring your comfort, justice, and peace.

Minister: .....people who are struggling with economic insecurity: where there are barriers to education or employment or where there is injustice in policies, practices and societal power structures.

People: Redeemer, bring your comfort, justice, and peace.

Minister: .....people at the frontlines that daily face the evidence of systemic racism and continue to strive for the safety and dignity of people and work to care for creation in the face of human-caused climate change and global warming.

<u>People</u>: Holy Fire, bring your comfort, justice, and peace.

Minister: Triune God, whose multi-faceted love passes all human understanding, but for which we give thanks, in your mercy, hear the prayers of your people. Now, as the Body of Christ, we pray as Christ taught us.

<u>All</u>: Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors. Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil, for thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever and ever. Amen.

In response to the disaster, a local partner, with support from PWS&D and Canadian Foodgrains Bank, began a cash assistance project to ensure families could meet their basic food needs. Aziza used the funds

wisely, allocating them for immediate needs like wheat flour and groceries.





# The Path to Healing Native Ministries - Hope at Hummingbird

Mary Fontaine had been preparing for her Hummingbird Ministries since she was a little girl. Growing up on the Mistawasis reserve in Saskatchewan, her late parents instilled in her a love for the church, as well as respect for traditional native ways. "My passion for the political and social healing of my people came from my dad who told me about the oppression and suffering of our people," said Fontaine. "He believed in me and my God-given ability to learn. He said I could

become educated and travel so that one day, I could help my people in some way. Hummingbird Ministries has become the way."

It was her mother, a devoted Presbyterian (the Mistawasis reserve was first visited by Reverend John MacKay back in 1879), who taught Fontaine about the church. "My passion for spiritual and emotional healing comes from my mother, who loved Jesus but who also honored the culture to which the Lord had sent her to," she began. "For my mother, the Lord was as present at the Sun dance as he was at the church she loved."

Fontaine fulfilled her father's wishes when she received her Master of Divinity from the Vancouver School of Theology, and began Hummingbird in 2004, thanks to a group from the Women's Missionary Society who believed her work was "too important not to do." The ministry was formalized by the PCC in 2005, when it was first funded for a six-month pilot project through Canada Ministries, the Synod of British Columbia and the Presbytery of Westminster. The goal of the ministry is to encourage healing, build bridges between aboriginal and non-aboriginal people, and to instill sacred values of the First Nations culture in the hearts and minds of all people.

"The PCC has an opportunity to demonstrate genuine love, trust and acceptance of aboriginal people," said Fontaine. "The various healing circle ministries offer aboriginals an opportunity to identify their own healing needs, and the church has an opportunity to respond to those needs." Fontaine conducts healing circles on various First Nations reserves, in churches and with community organizations. She hopes to work more closely with young people, and is currently on the Pathways Advisory Committee in Richmond, B.C., which is seeking out aboriginal athletes for the Native American Indigenous Games in Duncan, B.C. in 2008. She hopes to encourage young people to rediscover and reclaim their cultural heritage as well as be open to the church.

Sharing

"I can tell people are being helped by the things that are shared at circles, and what people say that the circle is doing for them," she said. "It's also the tears that are shed and the joy that is shared. "I hope the fear and confusion about aboriginal cultures will diminish for both the church and aboriginal people."
