Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, left the Jordan and was led by the Spirit into the wilderness, where, for forty days, he was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing during those days, and at the end of them he was hungry. The devil said to him, “If you are the Son of God, tell this stone to become bread.” Jesus answered, “It is written: ‘Man shall not live on

bread alone.” The devil led him up to a high place and showed him in an instant all the kingdoms of the world. And he said to him, “I will give you all their authority and splendor; it has been given to me, and I can give it to anyone I want to. If you worship me, it will all be yours.” Jesus answered, “It is written: ‘Worship the Lord your God and serve him only.’”

The devil led him to Jerusalem and had him stand on the highest point of the temple. “If you are the Son of God,” he said, “throw yourself down from here. For it is written: “He will command his angels concerning you to guard you carefully; they will lift you up in their hands, so that you will not strike your foot against a stone.” Jesus answered, “It is said: ‘Do not put the Lord your God to the test.’”

The Meditation

Fill In The Blank_____

Minister: I think you and I would agree that there is no question that life right now is turbulent, filled with stress, anxiety, fear, (fill in the blank _____). Our way forward seems to be so uncertain and ominous.

One of my favourite books (actually a series of three books) is “*The Lord of the Rings*”. In the first book, “*The Fellowship of the Ring*”, the hobbit Frodo Baggins and the wizard Gandalf, along with others, are staring at the increasing menace of Sauron, the evil force that inhabits the kingdom of Mordor and is threatening to take over the rest of Middle-earth.

Frodo and Gandalf are talking to each other just before the Fellowship of the Ring, a group of hobbits, humans, elves and dwarves are getting ready to take the path to Mordor, facing the near-impossible task of bringing Sauron down by destroying the Ring of Power, of which Frodo has possession. In this conversation, we hear the following:

“I wish it need not have happened in my time,” said Frodo. “So do I,” said Gandalf, “and so do all who live to see such times. But that is not for them to decide. All we have to decide is what to do with the time that is given us.”¹

If given a choice, it is safe to say that most of us would not intentionally choose difficult times or thorny paths in life. Now, it may be that our prior choices may cause us to stumble onto these paths. Or perhaps the choices of others around us have create harsh and hostile circumstances that force us onto this path. However they happen, we often are faced with difficult, challenging, anxious (fill in the _____) times in both our temporal and our spiritual lives.

As you may know, the forty days of Lent (not including Sundays), recall Jesus' experiences when he was "*led by the Spirit in the wilderness, where for forty days he was tempted by the devil*" (Luke 4: vv. 1–2). Now, the Spirit does not just drop Jesus off in the wilderness to fend for himself. The Spirit continues to be with him, enabling him to grow stronger through this season of testing. Right before Jesus begins his wilderness sojourn, he is baptized by his cousin John and by the Holy Spirit. It is both the Spirit's anointing of Jesus in baptism, **plus** Jesus' faithfulness to God amid testing that help to prepare him for his mission. It is not an either/or option – both baptism and testing were necessary for Jesus to fulfill God's intention for him. Likewise, simply being chosen and baptized is not sufficient preparation for us to fulfill the mission to which we are called as the people of God. We must be tested, often by being led to places of hunger, despair, suffering, (fill in the blank_____). Only then do we learn dependence on God, who graciously provides for all our needs in all of life's seasons.

A popular notion of the season of Lent is that we must "give up something." We are often asked, "What are you giving up for Lent?" Various responses are expected: red meat, sweets, alcoholic beverages, (fill in the blank _____). Perhaps we need to give up this simplistic notion of Lent. Instead of giving something up, perhaps we need to take something on, to fill in the blank with something new. Might I suggest that we fill in the blank with "intentionality" and "receptivity to God's grace" as two things to take upon ourselves during Lent? When I mean "intentionality", I mean that we intentionally and thoughtfully undertake practices of fellowship, prayer, Scripture meditation, generosity, and justice. These are just a few examples of how we might "fill in the blank" as activities to "take upon ourselves" this Lent.

Jesus also shows us, during those forty days in the wilderness, how to be receptive to God's grace. Jesus did not ask for trials and temptations; he accepted that they could not be avoided if he would do God's will. Jesus' season of testing was not just for a day or two. His season of forty days of temptation suggests to us that we may also have to faithfully endure seasons of long and protracted difficulty. As you reflect on your own faith journey, where have you experienced God's faithfulness in the wilderness? How were you receptive to God's grace? (Fill in the blank_____). Jesus' example of intentionality and receptivity to God's grace shows us the way to turn toward God, rather than away from God, during our trials and temptations. If we see the Lenten season as a time to deliberately look for and be receptive to the grace of God, we will meet a faithful God who leads us not only into the wilderness but also through the wilderness.

I am sure we all are like Frodo Baggins when facing difficult times, where we think "*I wish it need not have happened in my time.*" But the wizard Gandalf reminded Frodo (and us) that we do have choices in how we respond to hardships. Jesus chose not to be overwhelmed by the devil's temptations and the struggles in the wilderness, but to respond to them with the power of the Holy Spirit. By deciding to respond faithfully to the

hardships/fears/anxiety (_____fill in the blank) that we face, in this Lenten season, and in all our seasons, God is with us and seeks to draw us into a deeper relationship. We as people of faith know what to do when we need to fill in the blank in our lives. Amen.

Minister: We have heard the word of God - the word of love. We have heard the word of God - the word of grace. We have heard the word of God - the word of service and ministry. Let us be inspired by this word and go out to serve God and each other.

Lord, in your mercy.

People: hear our prayer.

Minister: We pray for relationships tested by conflicts and the lack of mutual understanding. Where families are tempted to nurse grudges and harbour complaints, where friendships have been wounded by misunderstanding or neglect, where workplace tensions have arisen over clashing opinions or exhausting demands, send your reconciling and restoring mercy. Lord, in your mercy.

People: hear our prayer.

Minister: We pray for the world, filled with increasing threats and conflicts. Where countries are torn by unrest and persecution, where communities are diminished by prejudice and discrimination, where those with power and authority degrade or dismiss their critics,

empower those who work for just solutions and advocate for the powerless. We especially pray for the people of Ukraine, Gaza, Afghanistan, Sudan, Yemen and Haiti. Lord, in your mercy.

People: hear our prayer.

Minister: We pray for all who are troubled and find it hard to face uncertain times, we pray for those who face illness or loss of any kind, for those challenged by economic hardship, and for those faced with the reality of death, their own or of someone dear. In silence, we name those on our hearts this day. Embrace each one with your compassion and courage. Lord, in your mercy.

People: hear our prayer.

Minister: Even as we remember the many challenges around us, we give you thanks for the blessings we know, for moments of pleasure, for laughter shared, for conversations that brightened a day. Thank you for your steadfast love and the comfort we draw from your presence with us in all things. And now we offer together the prayer Jesus taught:

All: Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors. Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil, for thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever and ever. Amen.

Invitation to the Table

Minister: Like a tent in the wilderness, the table of God stands open and ready as a place of sanctuary and safety, of hospitality and healing. So come, all you who are tired and travel-stained, footsore and famished; come with your fellow travelers and find companionship and comfort; for here, Jesus – who knows what it is to wander, watch and wrestle in desert places – waits to meet us and welcome us in, offering us rest and restoration, solace and strength, for the journey still to come.

Great Prayer of Thanksgiving

Minister: The Lord be with you.

People: And with you also.

Minister: Lift up your hearts.

People: We lift them up to the Lord.

Minister: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

People: It is right to give God thanks and praise.

Minister: Creator God, out of that barrenness called chaos you called into life all that is good and true, your face shining in the starlight, your voice echoing in the crashing waves, your heart, your hopes, your love poured into those created in your image. But setting their minds on all the desires which temptation revealed to them, they began to rebuke you, denying your dreams for them, thinking only of themselves. You continued to speak of your promises, through the prophets, but they did not listen to the love which formed them. So, you asked the One called Blameless to leave your side and walk before you, coming to share your faith in us. commitment to deny himself; when he could have remained silent, he declared your salvation to all, when he could have hidden his face in fear, he turned towards Jerusalem, going to his death and into the grave, that you might give life to all who had died to sin. As we come to the Table he has prepared, we declare that in his crucifixion and resurrection we find that mystery we call faith:

All: Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

Minister: Here, at this table, where the gifts of the bread and the cup are offered to us all, pour out your Spirit of healing and hope. Feed us with the bread of heaven and the cup of life which can make us whole once more, so we can go to serve as your faithful people, and when we are brought home to you, when we are gathered with our sisters and brothers from all the ends of the earth, we will sing your glory and grace forever, God in Community, Holy in One. Amen.

Words of Institution

Minister: Before going out into the wilderness of the Garden, Jesus sat down to eat and drink with his friends. To show them the challenge of the way ahead, and offer them gifts for that journey, he took bread – sustaining and wholesome – and poured wine – earthy and warming – sharing these as signs of his continuing presence with them throughout time to come. And now, remembering that moment, and recognising that its promise is also for us in this time and place, we too break bread and share the cup with each other. And in that action, we recognise and affirm with joy that Christ is present with us now, and throughout time to come.

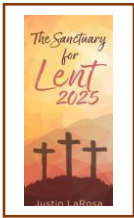

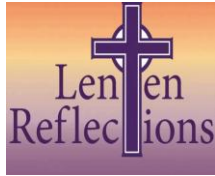

Lilawati Stands Against Child Marriage in India

In Bihar, India, an alarming 80 per cent of girls are forced into early marriages. Not only does this reduce the likelihood that they will complete school, but it makes young girls - married as early

as 12 years old - more susceptible to trafficking for child labour and sexual exploitation. Bihar region also ranks among the states with the highest rates of domestic violence, with 58 per cent of married women reporting instances of violence. The Karuna Project at the Duncan Hospital aims to empower and protect girls through raising awareness about their rights among decision-makers in households and villages, and local government workers. Since poverty is one of the root causes of neglect for girls' rights, the project also provides livelihood and income-generating opportunities for marginalized families.

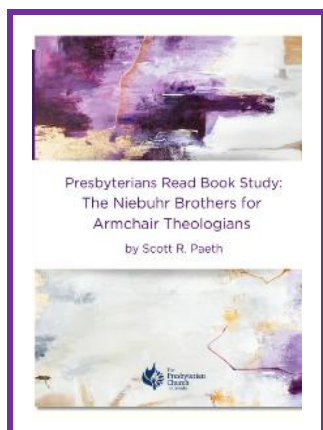
"I will be a role model to other girls." Lilawati uses what she has learned to speak out against child marriage in the community and in her home.

Lilawati Kumari is a 16-year-old from Mudwa village who participates in the Karuna Project. In one of the classes she attended, she learned about the negative effects of early marriage, as well as how to advocate against it. Lilawati decided that she would raise her voice against child marriage - both in the community and in her home. Lilawati's two sisters had both been married at a young age, and her parents were planning the same for her. However, she told her parents that she had other plans: "I want to study and achieve my dreams. I do not want to waste my life like this." Lilawati reasoned with them that if they did not stop the marriage, she would call the child helpline and make a report. Despite her stunned parents' continued efforts to persuade her, Lilawati stood her ground and eventually convinced them to stop trying to force the marriage. Through continued conversations with her parents about child marriage, the laws against it, and its effects on girls, Lilawati helped them understand the negative impact of early marriage on a child's life, and on the broader society. They are now supportive of Lilawati as she pursues her education.



Lilawati is excited to bring what she has learned about the rights of women and girls to others in her community. She says, "I have taken the first step in my family and will be a role model to other girls so that they can take a stand against child marriage in their homes and work towards fulfilling their dreams. I will encourage them to pursue higher studies. Seeing me shine, many people in the community will allow their girls to study and stop early marriages. I thank the Karuna Project for the valuable lessons they are teaching us through these adolescent classes."

Cuba: Call for Increasing Humanitarian Aid and Development Assistance

Canadian churches, trade unions and other non-governmental organizations are working together to encourage the Government of Canada to increase aid to Cuba in this time of exceptional need, and to ensure humanitarian aid and development assistance is not restricted by U.S. sanctions and other measures.

Cubans describe their living conditions as the worst they have experienced before the 1959 revolution. Cuba is still suffering an economic slump provoked by the COVID-19 pandemic. The effects of the downturn are magnified by the decades-long imposition of sanctions (sometimes referred to as the "embargo") by the United States. Between 2007 and 2022, Cuba has dropped 30 places in the Human Development Index (from 53 in 2007 to 83 in 2022). In 2024, UNICEF placed Cuba - for the first time - as a country where a third of the country's children are living in poverty. This year, also for the first time, Cuba requested support from the World Food Program for powdered milk for children under seven.
