The next day, when they came down from the mountain, a large crowd met Jesus. A man in the crowd called out, "Teacher, I beg you to look at my son, for he is my only child. The Meditation

Don't Hide! But Seek!

Minister: Do you remember playing hide-and-seek as a kid? Was it fun? 10...9...8... I remember bolting off to hide, fretfully searching for the perfect spot while the seeker counted down. In the bathtub behind the shower curtain? The corner of the musty closet? Or the narrow, dust-bunnied space under the bed? I could hear my heart beating wildly while I tried to control my nervous breathing so as not to make a sound. And then the anticipation of waiting for the seeker to find and root me out felt like I was in that uncomfortable location forever. Why is this fun?

Psalm 27 has been called a "*Triumphant Song of Confidence*," but its references to hiding might make us doubt this title. In the first six verses, the psalmist speaks of a trust and confidence in the God who is his "light" and "salvation." But the **writer** is not confident in the current circumstances, asking God to hide him (v. 5) from evildoers and enemies and the trouble being faced. In verse 7, the psalm shifts: the speaker has lost confidence in God, believing God has gone missing, crying out, "Do not hide your face from me" (v. 9).

The Psalms honestly portray our full spectrum of human emotions, the way we lurch between faith and doubt depending on the day, the hour or the minute! The ways we hide in

anxiety and fear and the ways we fail to trust God, are particularly relevant in Lent, in this season of "self-examination and penitence" — because following Jesus is particularly difficult if you are cowering behind the shower curtain in your empty bathtub or under the bed with the dust bunnies! How and why do we hide?

- * We hide to protect ourselves from difficult people, difficult emotions, difficult situations.
- * We hide from hard things gloomy truths, complicated problems, people or concepts or cultures that are difficult to understand, anything requiring more energy, more commitment, or more self-awareness than we might be willing to give.
- * We hide from opportunities from God's call to step forward on the stage of life, to be and become more, to risk speaking up for the voiceless, to accept new challenges and responsibilities.
- * We hide and we pray like the psalmist, "Conceal me, O God. Hide me under the cover of your tent." And then we wonder why God, too, feels lost from our lives.

Psalm 27 is a breathtaking affirmation of faith and trust in God, even in the face of dangerous enemies. But the questions of "Whom shall I fear?" and "Of whom shall I be afraid?" are not just hypothetical. Verse 2 names "evildoers," "adversaries," and "foes," while verse 3 identifies entire armies or groups of people arrayed against the psalmist, ready to fight. By verse 7, the bravado of these initial verses is gone, and the psalmist pleads with God: "Hear me... when I cry aloud" (v. 7). The psalmist implores God: "answer me!" (v. 7), "Do not hide your face from me. Do not turn your servant away in anger.... Do not cast me off, do not forsake me" (v. 9), and "Do not give me up" (v. 12). The tension between verses 1 and 12 feels palpable. Real fear lives alongside honest faith.

But a visible shift occurs at the end of Psalm 27. The psalmist has once again changed tune, lurching from fearful hiding to faithful courage. Perhaps a good night's sleep brought about renewed faith and energy. Or there was a recognition of how small life is under the bed with all those dust bunnies. Whatever the inspiration, here the psalmist is at the end, now seeking out the rest of us still in hiding, singing "Come out, come out, wherever you are!," encouraging us to step out, together, and professing faith in the God who steps out with us; the God whose "goodness" is seen in the "land of the living," **not** the land of the hiding. Even in times of trouble, God is worth the wait.

Bona fide doubt and fear, the desire to hide from trouble, holds hands with genuine trust. In this psalm, as in life, both are unavoidable. Perhaps unexpectedly, both are also essential. Vigorous faith and animated doubt both insist that we take God seriously, ask God real questions, and depend upon God in tangible ways. We are also encouraged NOT to hide from or ignore our real doubts and fears but bring them to God in prayer. Faith is not simply about believing or not believing. It is about the truth of what we have known. Our life of faith is grounded in our lived experience; it is about the **real** mystery, awe, pain, and grace that we know, often seen and realized after times of trial, pain, and discouragement.

Last week, I talked about filling in the blank with intentionality and receptivity to God's grace during Lent as a way of drawing closer to God. The author of Psalm 27 is encouraging us to do the same: intentionally looking for and then sharing our experience of God (vv. 1–6, 13–14) and praying raw, sometimes gut-wrenching prayer that may not seem respectful or theologically correct, but is honest (vv. 7–12) and opens us up to God's grace in times of fear, when we would really rather be hiding.

I am not saying that this is an easy or quick process. Learning to hold doubt and faith in together, takes patience, which is why the last verse of the psalm - "Wait for the Lord" - holds all fourteen verses together. Patient seeking, patient searching, patient development of spiritual practices that make both faith and doubt meaningful - these give us the time and skills we need to navigate pain, learn lessons, gain perspective, and perhaps even experience the world differently, rather than hiding from it. Be strong. Take courage. Wait for the Lord. Do not hide! Rather, seek and be receptive to God's grace and faithfulness. Amen.








Lenten Noon Hour Mid-Week Services 2025 at Wall Street United Church



Both brothers were committed to applying Christian faith and ethics to such topics as war, pride, democracy, fascism, economy, greed, the relationship between rights and freedom, social justice, and race. These topics are significant themes for our age, and their wisdom has something to say about our times. They write from an American perspective but speak to Canadians, as our culture and politics are deeply influenced by American politics and religious expression. The study guide will include prayers, background, questions and suggestions for

broader reading to support those who engage with the book. In addition, it will contain an introduction, four study modules and a conclusion.
