And being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to death - even death on a cross! Therefore, God exalted him to the highest place and gave him the name that is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue acknowledge that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Idris: For the word of God in scripture, for the word of God within us, and for the word of God around us.

People: Thanks be to God.

The Meditation Having the Mindset of Christ

As we gather this Sunday to move ourselves into the holiest of weeks in the Christian calendar, I chose this text from Paul's letter to the church in Philippi because I believe, in this time and place, there is no better scripture for us to reflect upon on this Palm/Passion Sunday. Many scholars believe this passage from the letter to the church in Philippi may have been an early Christian hymn that unfolds the stages of Christ's whole being - from being in the form of God, to becoming human, to being obedient to humiliation and death, and then to ascension back into heaven.

Whether or not Paul composed or just quoted the famous "Christ hymn" in today's Epistle text, he is still telling the story of Jesus' passion and resurrection. While the Gospels provide all the details of Jesus' arrest, the sham trial, and the crucifixion, to **understand the mindset of Christ** - the attitude that determined his actions every day of his life, including the last - see this letter. In this passage, Paul records the coming to earth of Jesus Christ, his hitting "rock bottom" of his crucifixion and death, and God's raising him again so that all creation sees who he is (and has been all along).

The first half of the passage is full of verbs (Jesus <u>emptied</u> himself, <u>took</u> the form of a slave, <u>humbled</u> himself, became <u>obedient</u>). It is important to realize that these were not impulsive actions on Jesus' part. They all arose from the Christ-mind - the way Jesus saw himself in relationship to God and to the world. Jesus gave up his very self to serve God's mission to creation. In the second half of the passage, after his death, Jesus does nothing. The <u>verbs</u> in the second half of the passage all belong <u>to God</u>. This text, in Paul's eyes, is Jesus' birth, passion, ascension narrative all rolled into one. To Paul, Jesus' death is no more spontaneous than anything else that happens in his life. Jesus certainly saw it coming. As

horrible as the manner of his death turned out to be, it was an unsurprising end for one who invested no energy and effort to protect himself, but lived to serve others. Having emptied himself all his life, he emptied himself to the end.

Since "obedience" is of central importance in this passage, it is important that we understand the point Paul is making. There is a strand of theology (with several theories) called *atonement theology*. Atonement theology recognizes that we are alienated from God through our sin, and God is at work to bring us back into relationship with God. One of these theories, the "ritual" theory of atonement, takes the view that because of our iniquity, God was angry with us and Jesus died to appease God - that it was <u>God's will</u> that Jesus should die for our sins. I have never found this theory very persuasive. What kind of God demands the sacrifice of his Son? And what about the use of violence and suffering to achieve salvation? Does it not justify the suffering of all victims? I would not want to follow a God that inflicts pain like Jesus suffered to appease God's anger – that is **not** a God in which I would want to put my faith and build a relationship!

But Paul does not seem to suggest this was the reason for Jesus' death. Rather, it was Jesus' will to be subject to (to obey) the same kind of death that other people died. Rome had crucified thousands of other people, including many Jews, before the Empire got to Jesus, after all. In many ways, the New International Version translation of this text is preferable here: Jesus "became obedient to death." Since Jesus had already taken the form of a slave, he did not (and could not) ask for a "get out of jail free card" from God at the end. He submitted to death the same way he had submitted to everything else that made him fully human. This is why Paul encourages the Philippian church (and us) to "have the same mindset as Christ Jesus." The verbs, the actions, of our lives can flow from this same mindset, this same way of seeing ourselves in relationship to God and to the world.

Sooner or later, we all will be called to be obedient to death. In the meantime, we are as free as Jesus to decide how we will spend our resources and energy: on self-protection or self-donation, on saving ourselves (and our religious preconceptions, traditions and institutions) or giving them up and ourselves away? While we might look at this passage as it applies to our own individual lives, perhaps this Palm/Passion Sunday is a good time to ask—what it might look like for an entire congregation to embody the mindset of Jesus, to (as a whole) empty itself to take the form of a servant to others? What crosses are right in front of this congregation, just waiting to be picked up?

However, we as Christians decide to respond to this Christ hymn, either individually or communally, as I mentioned earlier, the "humanness" of Christ ends at verse 8. After that, God takes over. Jesus does not exalt himself, any more than Jesus raises himself from the dead. For many of us, "therefore" is the most interesting word on the page. If we imitate Christ, therefore we too will be exalted, right? If we humble ourselves, will we too share in the glory of God, right? But it is important to remember, as we journey through Holy Week, that on

Good Friday, when the stone was rolled in front of the tomb, Jesus lay, dead as dead could be - perfectly obedient to death - with no pulse, no thought, no will.

In his commentary on Philippians, the late American preacher and theologian Fred Craddock says, "The grave of Christ was a cave, not a tunnel. Christ acted on our behalf without view of gain. That is precisely what God has exalted and vindicated: self-denying service for others to the point of death with no claim of return, no eye upon a reward". Christ was not concerned with status or with a view to his own gain but humbled himself. On this Palm/Passion Sunday, we do not focus on what we believe about Jesus, and how we can exalt and glorify ourselves. Instead, we focus on what Jesus did, and what we are able to do because he did. Let us seek to have the mindset of Christ. Amen.

Blessing the Word in our Lives

Minister: As we hear the word read and preached today, let our minds be of one mind in Christ Jesus. Let us empty ourselves, and with humility and grace listen as the Spirit speaks to us this day. Amen.

People: Hear our prayer.

Minister: God of power and might, hear us as we pray for those who have not learned the lessons of humility yet: for those who live carelessly or drive recklessly, endangering themselves and others; for those who abuse the trust and power in their positions, betraying those whose interests are in their hands. We pray for those who mislead others for gain or indulge their fame with no thought for the example they set. Humble them in your mercy and humble us if we are tempted to ignore the consequences of our own actions. God of humility,

People: Hear our prayer.

Minister: We pray for those in government, whether local, provincial or federal, and for those running in the upcoming Canadian election. Give them wisdom to serve faithfully and be with us when we exercise our right to vote, being open to your guidance as we seek to do what is best for everyone in our nation, not just ourselves. Help us work to heal the divisiveness and polarization that has troubled our civic and political discourse, realizing that our society benefits when we all work together for the common good. God of humility,

People: Hear our prayer.

Minister: God of grace and transformation, hear us now as we speak to you of people and places near and dear to our hearts, whose comforts are few and struggles too many... and now we gather our prayers into one voice and pray as Jesus taught:

<u>All</u>: Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors. Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil, for thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever and ever. Amen.

You sent the prophets to waken our ears to your songs of grace, but we rejected them as adversaries to our desires. Yet you would not turn your face from us, and sent to us the One who is named Salvation. Therefore, we join our voices in thanksgiving, with those in this place, and in every place, with those in every moment, and in this moment, singing with all creation to your glory:

<u>All</u>: Holy, holy, God of palms and passion. All creation proclaims your coming towards us. Hosanna in the highest! Blessed is the One who comes in your name. Hosanna in the highest!

Minister: Holy are you, God of goodness, and blessed is Jesus Christ, who comes in your name. When he could have remained with you, he poured himself into the emptiness of our souls; casting aside his unity with you, he gathered up our brokenness to make us whole; proclaimed by the choirs of heaven, he humbled himself as a servant, so we might be raised to glory; faithful to the point of death, even to the shameful death on a cross, you exalted him to new life so we might stand with him in eternity with you. Remembering the One who came for us, remembering the words he taught, remembering his passion and his resurrection, we proclaim the One who is the Bread of Life:

<u>All</u>: Christ came in triumph, only to be rejected by us; Christ died in sorrow, only to be raised by you; Christ will come again, only to bring us to you.

Minister: Holy Spirit, as we come to this Table, bless the gifts of the bread and the cup that they might be the sustenance of grace. Sustain us with the Bread of life, so we would not turn our backs on those who hunger; nourish us with the Cup of hope, so we might encourage the

weary; so fill us with the good news, that we dare not remain silent, but must shout out God's desire of justice and peace for all people. And when days of triumph and tragedy are done, when we are gathered in your righteousness, we will join with all your people, of every time and place, who forever sing your praises for all eternity, God in Community, Holy in One.

Prayer after Communion

Minister: O God of Light and Love, we come before you, remembering him who was proclaimed king on that first Palm Sunday.

<u>All</u>: We would make him king of all things in our lives as we declare our loyalty to him by the receiving of the bread and cup. We renew our pledge to serve him by serving one another. May we not join the crowd which crowned him and then crucified him.

Minister: Let our lives be a constant confession of abiding allegiance to Jesus, the Christ, in whose name we pray. Amen.

An Inspiration for Change

In the quiet village of Chigwere in northern Malawi, 18-year-old Agnes Bambi found a sense of belonging and purpose as a member of the in-school youth club.

Supervised by two knowledgeable volunteer leaders trained by the "Every Youth Empowered Project" of the Livingstonia Synod AIDS Project, the youth club became a platform for empowerment and education. Working with both boys and girls, the club challenges social norms that favour men and boys and addresses the systemic marginalization of women and girls, which are especially challenging around issues of sexual and reproductive health.

Through the youth club, Agnes discovered the importance of staying in school and actively engaged in discussions about sexual reproductive health. Equipped with knowledge, she took it upon herself to become an agent of change in her community, teaching her friends about the critical aspects of staying in school and making informed decisions for their futures.

This Lenten season, faithfully respond to Christ's call to ensure youth are empowered with the knowledge they need to make informed choices.

Brockville Community – Wide Clean Up


