A Message for our Children & Youth Giving Our Best

Minister: The week before Jesus was crucified, he had a meal with some of his friends. After they had eaten, his friend Mary did something that the others thought was very strange. (Show them a bottle of perfume.) Mary took out a bottle of very expensive perfume and began to rub it on Jesus' feet. Back then, it was a sign of great honour for people to have their feet bathed or perfumed. People walked a great deal, and most of the people only had sandals for shoes. Their feet became very dirty from the travel, so having them cleaned and perfumed was a great luxury.

But some of the people at the dinner were concerned. Not by the fact that Mary was caring for Jesus' feet, but more by the fact that she was using such an expensive perfume to do it. They thought that it was wasteful to use such valuable perfume for such a dirty task.

Jesus told them that they were wrong to think this. Mary loved Jesus enough to give him the best that she had, no matter how much it cost. Jesus was pleased that Mary honoured him so much. Mary knew that Jesus was special, and she wanted to give him her best.

I wonder if we always give Jesus our best. Do we love him enough to make sacrifices for him and for other people? It is not easy to put others first, but Mary did. She shows us that giving Jesus your best is the best thing to do. So, as you look forward to this week, can you think of something you could do to put others first? Maybe let someone else have a bigger piece of cake or more candy? Go out of your way to make friends with someone who is lonely? Or donate some of your allowance to the Food Bank or to the church to help people who are in need? Whatever you think you can do, just remember that, like Mary, we should always try to give our best to Jesus.

Prayer following the Message:

Minister: Thank you, God, for your son, Jesus. Teach us to honour him with our lives and to give him the very best of who we are and what we have. Amen.

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Mark: Jesus Anointed at Bethany

Six days before the Passover, Jesus came to Bethany, where Lazarus lived, whom Jesus had raised from the dead. Here a dinner was given in Jesus' honour. Martha served, while Lazarus was among those reclining at the table with him. Then Mary took about a pint of pure nard, an expensive perfume. She poured it on Jesus' feet and wiped his feet with her hair. And the house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume.

But one of his disciples, Judas Iscariot, who was later to betray him, objected, "Why was not this perfume sold, and the money given to the poor? It was worth a year's wages." Judas did not say this because he cared about the poor but because he was a thief; as keeper of the money bag, he used to help himself to what was put into it.

"Leave her alone," Jesus replied. "It was intended that she should save this perfume for the day of my burial. You will always have the poor among you, but you will not always have me."

The Meditation

Extravagant Love

Love is such a pervasive motif in our society, is it not? Think of all the love songs, the books about love, the rom-com movies, and so on! Usually, they focus on romantic love between two people, but there are also ones that focus on the love for friends and family as well. There are so many words for "love" as well – in fact, the Greek language used in the Bible has four words for love:

Eros (ἔρως): romantic or passionate love between two people. While it is not explicitly used in the Bible, the concept of "eros" or romantic love is reflected in the Bible, such as in the Song of Solomon.

Storge (στοργή): refers to familial love, the natural affection between parents and children, as well as between siblings. Again, while the specific term is not used in the New Testament, the concept is evident in passages that emphasize family relationships and responsibilities.

Philia (φιλία): refers to the affectionate regard or friendship between individuals. This type of love refers to the relationships between believers and is what Jesus was referring to when he said ""Greater love has no one than this, that he lay down his life for his friends." (John 15:13).

Agapē (ἀγάπη): Agapē is the most frequently used term for 'love' in the New Testament and is often associated with the selfless, sacrificial love that God has for humanity. This form of love is unconditional and is characterized by a commitment to the well-being of others, regardless of circumstances. This is the love that is described in John 3:16: "For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son, that everyone who believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life."

So, languages have different words for love. Movies, books and songs portray many visual and "aural" images of love. But have you ever thought about how love might smell? I bet that is not a question you have been asked very often! So how do you think love might smell? Maybe the fragrance of that morning cup of coffee, or fresh bread just out of the oven, made with love? A fragrant bouquet of your favourite flowers? Or...how about a house filled with the fragrance of a very expensive perfume? So much so that it settles into every nook and cranny, infusing the carpets with the scent, permeating the curtains and the fabric of every couch and every chair. Maybe too much? Too extravagant?

In our text today, we can see Mary's act as being an act of extravagant love - and it is all in the details. A pound or pint of perfume. Ok, when was the last time you bought that much perfume? That is like half a liter of perfume! Like, I have never bought that much! If you go to your local store, the most you can get in a bottle at a time is like what, 100 ml? And given how many places are scent-free these days, I do not know that I would ever get through that much perfume in my lifetime. And this is costly perfume. No knockoffs from Wal-Mart or Shoppers Drug Mart. This is the expensive stuff. The kind you ask for as a birthday gift, a

Christmas present. The kind you would never buy for yourself. Made of pure nard - meaning, that it was not spliced with something cheaper to make it go farther!

The house was filled with the fragrance. There WAS nowhere you could go without smelling it. It seeps into your clothing, even into your skin. And the perfume costs 300 denarii - almost a year's salary. This is extravagant love. The kind of love that must be shown, not just said. Because too much of our love lands in empty words. If you cannot feel it, smell it, taste it, hear it, and see it, well, then it is not discipleship love. This is what Mary teaches us. This is what we need to know about discipleship today – pure, extravagant love. But be ready. When you start going around and acting out this kind of extravagant love, a love without words, but love that is heard louder than ever - well, expect resistance. Expect suspicion. Expect rejection. Because most people do not know what to do with this kind of love. And Judas proves that theory right.

It is interesting how Judas shows up in the middle of this display of abundant love? It is as if he just cannot stand it. It is as if there is only so much unselfish, agapē love he can take, and I do not think Judas was alone in that feeling at that supper. This is what we do with extravagant love. We think it is untrue. We do not imagine ourselves worthy of such love, and we make excuses that deem us unlovable. Because we think we are unlovable, we then allow ourselves to think that others do not deserve God's love, either. We put boundaries around love. We control and limit love. Confine, contain, and detain love.

What would Jesus do when one of his friends wants to say, "I love you"? What would Jesus do if one of his disciples said, "Jesus, you have shown me so much love, please let me love you." Look at Jesus in this story. What does he do? He does not say, "No, really Mary. You should not." He does not stop her. He receives her love. Because he loves her. This is what true, mutual love looks like. And Jesus received her love because maybe, just maybe, he needed it. Think about the context in which this is taking place. Next Sunday is Palm Sunday. We are coming to Holy Week, to the end of Jesus' life. The hour is coming - the Last Supper and then his arrest in the garden. If there was ever a time Jesus needed to know he was loved, it was right then and there.

He rebukes Judas for his stingy response to Mary's extravagant love when he says "It was intended that she should save this perfume for the day of my burial. You will always have the poor among you, but you will not always have me". Jesus knows what is coming. And I think Jesus' gratitude for Mary's love likely matches the fragrance that filled the room. And Jesus' gratitude and love will then be the same for his disciples. Because in the very next chapter, he washes his disciples' feet, showing them the kind of love that Mary showed him. This is what happens when extravagant love is let loose. This is what happens when you experience a kind of love, an amount of love that you could never have imagined. You cannot not do the same.

Mary's extravagant act of love does not make sense to the disciples. It is outlandish and out of the norm. But on a human level, Mary expressed what is paramount in this life: to hold onto what is life-giving and true and beautiful, and let go of the rest.

Many of you will be familiar with the 1970s hit "What the world needs now". The first line of the chorus goes like this "What the world needs now is love, sweet love, it's the only thing that there's just too little of." In today's world, it seems like there is less and less love. Less love for the poor and marginalized. Less love for BIPOC people, for refugees, for LGBTQ2S+people, for the elderly, the sick, those struggling with addictions and mental health, for children. There seems to be a lot of love for billionaires, for people who already have so much and, like Judas, want to control love. To confine, contain, detain, and deport love, to stoke fear and hatred instead. There seems to be a lot of that around right now! But we are Jesus' people. We are different, because our example, our Way-shower is different. We are called to an extravagant love that lays down one's life for one's friends. An abundant love expressed in nothing less than the taste of the best wine. The smell of the bread of life. Seeing for the very first time the world God created for us. Hearing your name called when no one else seems to care. Because we are Jesus' people. And we know that Jesus' extravagant love for us wins. Love always wins. Amen.



Lilawati Stands Against Child Marriage

Sixteen-year-old Lilawati Kumari is an active participant in the Adolescent Girls Group classes in her village. Facilitated by the Duncan Hospital in northern India, these sessions explore crucial gender justice issues. In one class, Lilawati learned about early marriage, its effects, prevention, and the helpline number people could call for help. At the same time, her parents were considering arranging her marriage. When Lilawati found out, she stood her ground, "I aspire to pursue my education and fulfill my dreams, not to have my life predetermined in this way." Through

conversations with her parents about child marriage, the laws against it, and its effects on girls, Lilawati helped them understand the negative impact of early marriage on a child's life, and on the broader society. They are now supportive of Lilawati as she pursues her education. "I have taken the first step in my family and will be a role model to other girls so that they can take a stand against child marriage in their homes and work towards fulfilling their dreams," she shares.

This Lenten season, faithfully respond to Christ's call to raise awareness on gender issues and create a more equitable and just world for girls.
