<u>Jesus prays – for Us!</u>

We as elders (or clergy) are probably used to praying for others, especially if we are praying for someone before surgery or treatment, in times of trial, or in the wake of someone's passing.

You are praying to help give them comfort, to remind them that God is with them, as are their faith family. But have you ever experienced a moment when someone prayed **with** you and **for** you?

This is what is happening in our Gospel text for today. I will set the scene for you. It is Maundy Thursday evening, the night on which Jesus will be betrayed, handed over to his enemies, deserted by his friends, tried, convicted, and ultimately crucified. Jesus <u>knows</u> all this is going to happen. You would think he would be asking his friends to pray for him, to give him their comfort, their support, their love.

But Jesus is Jesus. And the disciples, human as they are, are not! Knowing all that is to come, Jesus gathers with his closest friends, his disciples, for food and fellowship. He shares with them words of comfort, of encouragement, of hope and then - Jesus prays for them. He prays that they may endure the challenges that come their way. He prays that they may discover strength in their unity. He prays that they will be drawn together as one, as Jesus and the heavenly Father are one. And then he prays not only for them, but for all for who will believe in Jesus because of their testimony.

And that is where we come in. Because we are now in church because someone told us about Jesus. Whether it was a parent, friend, grandparent, pastor or whomever, someone told us about the Good News - that in Jesus, we know that God loves us all and, inspired by this promise and empowered by the Holy Spirit, we came to believe. But here is the thing: someone else told the person who told us. And someone else told that person. And someone told that person as well...and so on and so on, all the way back to the testimony of these disciples who, despite their fear – both on that fateful evening and on Easter morning – nevertheless went out, trusting in the promise of resurrection, and began to share the good news of Jesus with others.

And so, when Jesus prays not only for these disciples but for those who believe because of them, he is praying for the writer of the Gospel of John's original audience and for all Christians ever since, **all the way** up to you and me. Here and now. In this text, we hear how Jesus, on this significant night, took time from everything else he was doing, all that he was facing, and prayed FOR US.

All too often, I think that Scripture can seem like a story told about people living so long ago that we may wonder what it has to say to us today. But this passage can be one of those scriptures that opens our eyes, and our hearts, to just how relevant the biblical text is to us today. In this scripture, and indeed in all of John Chapter 17, the disciples, at the end of the longest discourse in scripture, hear themselves being prayed for, and in the process hear prayers for those who were not there yet, but who will follow them in the future, as the message of the Good News is shared with others.

This passage affirms that whatever the disciples faced, they would not face it alone, because Jesus was praying for them and promises to be with them through the Holy Spirit. It

affirms that prayer is not something that happens in a moment in time but has its roots in past prayers and will blossom and grow in future prayers. We who live over 2,000 years later are a part of this prayer, and ought to hear Jesus praying this scripture for us. We are one. We are one with each other, with the faithful who have gone before us, and with those who will hear the Good News in generations to come. Jesus continues to pray for us now, even as we pray to Jesus.

So how will knowing that Jesus is praying for you impact your life as you deal with challenges at work, home or school; as you face setbacks in your professional or personal lives, or as you cope with stress and illness? What difference does it make, knowing Jesus is praying for us, when we look at our world, so full of discord, polarization, and anger, and wonder – what does the future look like for me? For our children? For our world?

I encourage you, as you reflect on this scripture, to hear Jesus praying not only for his disciples, not only for us here on this Sunday morning, but with - and for - the communion of saints in all times and in all places. Prayer is not a lonely activity occurring in a moment, but the activity of the Spirit all times and places, before creation, and after the fulfillment of history. On eve of his crucifixion, Jesus prayed for his disciples, and they heard him praying for them. In that prayer, Jesus affirmed that he would continue to walk with them, to accompany them through all that may come, to hold onto them through the highs and lows of life, even through death to new life. This is the promise of The Resurrection, and it is not just for those first disciples centuries ago. It is for us. Jesus prays – for us!!

At 23, Tamala developed a passion for banana farming, inspired by the small plot of banana plants behind her family's home in Malawi. However, her lack of knowledge and resources limited her efforts, making it difficult to expand beyond subsistence farming. Her circumstances changed when she was invited to join a training session on modern farming practices and how to work with banana seedlings. Motivated and equipped with new techniques, Tamala began expanding her farm, applying the practices she had learned to improve her yields. Reflecting on her journey with this project supported by PWS&D, Tamala explained, "The training opened my eyes to my potential as a banana

farmer. It is now my pathway to securing a better life for me and my son. I will scale up my banana farming business to increase my income".


