About that time, she became sick and died, and her body was washed and placed in an upstairs room. The Meditation

We are ALL Valued in God's Family

Today is **Christian Family Sunday**, a special time when we pause to reflect on the beauty, strength, and value of family - not just our biological families, but our spiritual family in Christ. This morning, I want to take us to a powerful story in the book of Acts - one that does not involve a famous preacher, but a quiet servant named Tabitha, also known as Dorcas. Her story reminds us that **every member** of our faith family - young and old, loud or quiet, up front or behind-the-scenes - has immeasurable value in God's eyes. But too often, our societal "blinders" prevent us from seeing that value in each other.

As an example, I am using a famous quotation attributed to Mao Zedong that states, 'Women hold up half the sky,' This powerful quote emphasizes the importance of gender equality and acknowledges the intrinsic value of women in shaping the world. It serves as a reminder that women are not just passive entities but active participants in all spheres of life, from the family unit to the workforce and beyond. But too often, traditional beliefs and prejudices have relegated women and girls to secondary roles, limiting their potential and denying them opportunities to fully participate in society's development. Gender inequality and discrimination hurts whole societies, not just women, by allowing half a population's human resources to go untapped. There is extensive empirical evidence that educating girls, investing in maternal health care, and empowering female entrepreneurs helps to lift entire communities out of poverty.¹

Even Mao Zedong's China has not met the lofty aspirations of its founder – working women still make much less than men, their educational opportunities are limited, the "glass ceiling" prevents qualified women from moving up in management, and women still bear the majority of the burden of housework and childcare. It could also be said that women hold up half the church (or, in some cases, more than half the church!) Every church community I have called home has had a woman, or a group of women, whose work was so vital that

without them, the congregation would dissolve into complete disarray. This Sunday's lectionary passage from Acts describes one such woman.

Tabitha was a disciple devoted to good works. The Greek word for "disciple" that Luke uses here, $\mu\alpha\theta$ ήτρια ($math\bar{e}tria$) is the first and only use of the word in the feminine form. (Remember this the next time you hear someone say it is not "biblical" for women to be leaders in the church.) Tabitha was not preaching in the synagogue. She was not healing the sick or being a missionary overseas for the church. But Luke makes a point of referring to her as a "disciple". Her ministry was to make clothes, care for widows, and serve her community quietly. Luke calls her by her Aramaic name, Tabitha, which was how she was likely known to her faith community. But he also shares her Greek name, Dorcas, which suggests that her work and charity were known among the greater public.

When Tabitha dies, it is the community's widows who are most distressed, gathering around Peter to show him their clothes, made by this female disciple. Without the support of their faith community, these widows would perish. Tabitha's ministry to these vulnerable women was essential to their survival in a world that devalued and marginalized women, especially those without husbands. So, the widows, and the larger faith community, recognizing Tabitha's importance to so many, sent for Peter, and through the power of prayer, Peter raised Tabitha from the dead. The raising of Tabitha reminds us that sometimes God works because the community believes together. It is not always the power of one person's faith - but the faith of a family, a group, a church body, saying, "Lord, we believe."

The resurrection of Tabitha is a miracle story that Luke likely tells to solidify Peter's increasing power and send the message that the God who raised Jesus from the dead is still at work in the world. But the desperation of this community upon the loss of Tabitha speaks to another important theme in the book of Acts: valuing and using **all** of a community's resources for its health and wholeness, including those (the women) devalued by the culture and society at large.

Today, as we mark both Christian Family Sunday and Mother's Day, we join with many faith communities that will pause to recognize the women and caregivers essential to families. But, considering Tabitha's story, faith communities might also pause to reflect on **all** their God-given resources. Whose work, if lost, would we be desperate to resurrect? Who could contribute to the work of the community in ways we have not considered? Who does society devalue that could find a home among us?

On this Christian Family Sunday, the message is simple and powerful:

- Every person, in our own families, & in our faith family, has an important role to play.
- Every act of service and love matters.
- Every family can be a place where faith, legacy, and miracles happen.

God used a woman with a needle and thread to change lives. Imagine what God can do with your own family, and our faith family - our love, our prayers, our unity - when we recognize,

value, and use to the fullest for **all** its members. We are all, uniquely and distinctively, part of God's family! Amen.

"I could not get medical help in time because we did not have enough money," says 65-year-old Ruqaiya, who lives in Afghanistan. Ruqaiya's life took a challenging turn ten years ago when she fell on ice, resulting in partial paralysis. Despite her impairment, she helps care for her youngest son, who has a hand impairment, two daughters-in-law, and two young grandchildren while her two oldest sons work as porters in Kabul, struggling to earn enough. Before her injury, Ruqaiya was known for her skill in weaving and was able to earn a decent income. Now unable to weave, she faces significant financial hardship, made worse by the political and economic situation in the country. Relief came

when Ruqaiya received cash assistance through a PWS&D-supported project. She purchased essentials like oil, pulses, flour, rice and salt, meeting her family's food needs during the harsh winter.





Myanmar Earthquake Response

On March 28th, Myanmar and Thailand were struck by a devastating earthquake measuring 7.7 in magnitude. The current death toll is over 3,700 with thousands more injured or missing. Entire communities have been destroyed, leaving thousands of people

homeless. Exacerbating the issue in Myanmar, communities hit by the earthquake were already hosting over 1.6 million people displaced from elsewhere in the country. Priority needs include emergency shelters, food, clean water, medical care, and other non-food items. PWS&D is able to respond through our ecumenical networks and coalitions, including ACT Alliance and with matching funds at Canadian Foodgrains Bank. Voices from the Grassroots by Maria Carmona

Maria is PWS&D's Asia program coordinator. From March 10th to 21st, 2025, Maria attended the 69th Session of the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW69) at the United Nations. She attended as a representative of the Ontario Council for International Cooperation.

The General Assembly Hall of the United Nations was abuzz with voices as everyone waited in anticipation for Secretary-General Antonio Guterres to deliver his remarks. Speaking at the 69th session of the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW), Guterres stated, "We share a common vision: a world of equality, where the human rights of women and girls are realized in full. Let's keep working together to make this vision of gender equality a reality for all." At the opening of the session the day before, UN Member States adopted the Political Declaration which represents the commitment of governments to respect, protect, and uphold the rights, equality, and empowerment of every woman and girl. Unity in diversity

I felt privileged to walk the halls of the UN for the first time – a realization of a lifelong dream. As I attended various official meetings, and events organized by Member States and civil society organizations, I was inspired by the unity despite the diversity. I witnessed individuals from different countries, different sectors, with different genders, different faiths, different approaches all working together toward the same goal of gender equality.

It was the first time I heard of the Multi-faith Advisory Council (MFAC), which was established to provide advice and support to the UN Interagency Task Force on Religion and Sustainable Development. The MFAC is made up of 45 diverse religious leaders and



heads of faith-based organizations. It is co-chaired by Rudelmar Bueno de Faria of the **ACT Alliance**, of which PWS&D is a member.

Her voice

In the middle of all the activities, I paused to remember <u>Lilawati</u>, a 16-year old girl from Mudwa village in rural Bihar, India, who raised her voice against child marriage in her community. She said, "I want to study and achieve my dreams. I do not want to waste my life like this. I will be a role model to other girls." Lilawati is one of the participants of PWS&D's Karuna Project which aims to empower girls through raising awareness about the rights of girls and through livelihood opportunities to make them financially independent. While Lilawati may not have the chance to make it to the UN, I know that I have the responsibility to bring her message and amplify her voice in spaces I have the privilege of navigating.

After attending a session on gender apartheid in Afghanistan, I remembered the thousands of Afghan women and girls who are raising their voices to restore their right to education. Afghanistan is the only country in the world where girls are banned from attending secondary school and higher education.
