The Children's Message You Are Free? Now What?

So, last Thursday was the last week of school before the summer! How does it feel? When school ends, it feels like freedom, right? No more math tests, no more spelling, no more bells ringing! Just summer fun!

Let me show you something. (Hold up a backpack full of books, pencils, binders, lunch box, etc.) This is a school backpack. It is full of stuff you need for class. It is kind of heavy, right? (Then hold up an empty backpack.) And this one? It is empty. It is like your summer backpack. Light! Free! You do no thave to carry all that anymore!

In today's Bible reading, the apostle Paul writes: "Christ has set us free!" and "Do not use your freedom to do whatever you want - use it to serve one another in love." That is important. When we are free - like free from school or when we live in a free country like Canada - we get to choose what we will do. We could just do whatever we feel like: sit on the couch all summer, fight with our siblings, grab the last cookie every time...OR we could use our freedom to do something loving:

- Help your parents or a neighbour with gardening or mowing the yard.
- Share our things with others
- Send a text or email to a friend to let them know you are thinking of them.
- Volunteer at church or in the community,

This week is Canada Day. Canada is a country that values freedom - people can worship freely, go to school, be themselves. That is something to celebrate! But freedom is not just about

doing whatever we want. It is about doing what is right. The Holy Spirit helps us use our freedom well - with love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. That is called the fruit of the Spirit. Summer is a great time to grow those fruits!

<u>Let's pray together</u>: Dear God, thank you for the gift of freedom. Help us to use our freedom to love others and grow good fruit like kindness and joy. Thank you for summer fun and for your Spirit that helps us. Amen.

The Scripture Lesson

Galatians 5: 1 and 13-25 New International Version (NIV)

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Ian: Life by the Spirit

It is for freedom that Christ has set us free. Stand firm, then, and do not let yourselves be burdened again by a yoke of slavery.

You, my brothers and sisters, were called to be free. But do not use your freedom to indulge the flesh; rather, serve one another humbly in love. For the entire law is fulfilled in keeping this one command: "Love your neighbour as yourself." If you bite and devour each other, watch out or you will be destroyed by each other.

So I say, walk by the Spirit, and you will not gratify the desires of the flesh. For the flesh desires what is contrary to the Spirit, and the Spirit what is contrary to the flesh. They are in conflict with each other, so that you are not to do whatever you want. But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not under the law. The acts of the flesh are obvious: sexual immorality, impurity and debauchery; idolatry and witchcraft; hatred, discord, jealousy, fits of rage, selfish ambition, dissensions, factions and envy; drunkenness, orgies, and the like. I warn you, as I did before, that those who live like this will not inherit the kingdom of God.

But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Against such things there is no law. Those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. Since we live by the Spirit, let us keep in step with the Spirit. Let us not become conceited, provoking and envying each other.

Ian: For the word of God in scripture, for the word of God within us, and for the word of God around us.

People: Thanks be to God.

The Meditation

Freed From, Freed For

It is the first weekend of summer break for most of the students in our area. For children, teens, teachers and school staff, there is a new sound in the air: a deep breath, a sigh of relief. The final bell has rung, the last locker is emptied, and school is out. And the cry goes up: "We are free!"

We also celebrate Canada Day this coming week, brings its own celebration of freedom. We wave flags, wear red and white, start the barbecues, light the fireworks, and give thanks for the freedoms we enjoy: to speak, to gather, to worship, to live in relative safety.

And today, as a church, we are also celebrating **freedom in action** - volunteer service. The people who give of their time, their energy, their gifts - not because they must, but because they *can*. Because they *want to*. Because the love of Christ has taken root in their lives. So yes. It is a time full of freedom. But that raises an important question, one that Paul asks the Galatians, and one I will ask you today: **What are we free** *for*?

Paul begins Galatians 5 with a bold declaration: "For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery." Remember our story from last week, where Jesus drove out the impure spirits that had enslaved a man. We are told he is sitting at Jesus' feet, *clothed and in his right mind*. That is a picture of freedom: healed, restored, and ready to follow Jesus.

In our text today, Paul tells the Galatian Church - "You were called to freedom, brothers and sisters... only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become slaves to one another." Now just a minute, Paul. On the one hand, you are telling us not to "submit to a yoke of slavery", but in the next breath you are saying "become slaves to one another"? How can we do both?

Well, we **can** do both, when we reflect on what Paul is saying in light of last week's Gospel story. Remember, the man who was demon-possessed wanted to go with Jesus. But Jesus told him to stay where he was and share his story with those around him. And he did! Paul tells the Galatians that, just like Jesus set the Gerasene man free from the impure spirits, Christ set them free **from** what enslaves them - fear, sin, hatred, selfishness. But Paul also told them that they are freed **for** something: to love, to serve, to walk by the Spirit. The same applies to us - freedom in Christ is not about doing whatever **you** want. It is about being freed from **yourself**, so that you can love others well.

Let us go back to the kids for a moment. Imagine a 10-year-old finishing school for the summer and announcing, "I am free now. So, I am not brushing my teeth, not doing chores, not listening to anyone ever again!" Now technically, that is freedom. But it is also a recipe for chaos, cavities, and some very grumpy parents.

Paul knew that if freedom was misunderstood as "do whatever feels good," it would not lead to life. It would lead to brokenness, to being so focused on our own greedy desires that we never know the joy and freedom of being in relationship with each other and with God. Paul warns: "If you bite and devour one another, take care that you are not consumed by one another." (v.15)

Freedom without love turns into selfishness. And selfishness eventually turns into conflict, envy, division, a focus on "me first" - the very things that break communities apart. Paul offers a better way. He says, "live by the Spirit." Let the Spirit guide you, shape you, and bear fruit in you. Because when you let the Spirit lead, something beautiful happens: You do not just *talk* about love - you *live* it. And that is when he gives us the list so many of us know: "The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control."

These are not rules. They are the natural result of a life rooted in Christ, guided by the Spirit, and shaped by love. Think about fruit on a tree - it does not have to force itself to grow. It grows when the tree is healthy and well-rooted. It is the same with us. When we live in Christ, when we walk in step with the Spirit, these qualities grow in us - and they bless others.

This brings us to today: Giving thanks for our volunteers. What are volunteers doing, really? They are using their freedom in Christ not to serve themselves - but to serve others in love. They come early to get the coffee going for coffee hour. They bring the goodies which we all enjoy. They make sure the sanctuary is ready for worship – bulletins out, livestream and sound on, people greeted at the door as they come in. They sing songs, drive neighbours, call those who are sick. They maintain our church building, so it is safe and welcoming. And on and on! They could do something else with their time. But they choose this. And in that choosing, they become **signs of freedom**. They are not serving out of guilt or obligation. They are not trying to earn God's love. They are **free** - and they are **using their freedom to love**. This is what Paul is talking about in our text today. This is the fruit of the Spirit in action.

And what about Canada Day? We give thanks this coming week for freedoms people have fought to protect. But what good are our freedoms if we only use them to serve ourselves? We are free to speak - but what if we use that freedom to encourage others and to advocate for justice for those on the margins? We are free to worship, but what if we use that freedom to be the church, the Body of Christ, not just inside the building, but in the world? Our passage today reminds us that true freedom **is not** doing whatever we want. It is when we are freed by Christ **from** ourselves and freed **for** lives as the fruitful, spirit-filled people of God. Amen.

From Despair to Hope in Malawi Impact Stories, Malawi

Meet Peter Simon, a 56-year-old father of four from Kumbewe Village, in the Balaka district of Malawi. Like many families in Malawi's southern region, Peter's life took a difficult turn when El Niño-induced drought and floods struck the country.

"I watched almost all my fields get washed away. The little that was left did not survive," Peter shared. "Farming, which used to sustain my family, was no longer reliable."

As food became scarce and maize prices soared beyond his reach, Peter's once stable life began to spiral. He relied on his traditional mat weaving business to make ends meet, but even that became a challenge. The raw materials he used, usually sourced from nearby riverbanks, were washed away by floods. "Life was unbearable. I was living in fear, not knowing where the next meal for my children would come from," he recalls.

But then came a ray of hope, through the El Niño Emergency Response Program. With support from Presbyterian World Service & Development and Canadian Foodgrains Bank, Peter's family and 1,700 other vulnerable households received MK90,000 [about \$71] monthly, through cash transfers which were distributed between November 2024 to March 2025.

"The cash transfer changed everything," Peter said with a smile. "I was able to buy food for my family, pay my children's school fees and slowly rebuild my life. Just look at me

now-so healthy!"

As a wheelchair user, Peter also took a moment to appreciate CARD's commitment to inclusivity. "I am especially grateful that CARD did not leave behind people with disabilities," he said. "Life is already hard for us and finding food is even harder. This help came at the right time."

Peter's story is one of many, but it stands as a powerful reminder that timely humanitarian support can restore dignity, hope and health to those hit hardest by climate shocks. Thanks to the cash transfer program, Peter is living with a renewed sense of purpose for his family's future.
