

A VIEW FROM THE WEST WINDOW:

Ephesians 4:11-16 The New Living Translation

¹¹ Now these are the gifts Christ gave to the church: the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, and the pastors and teachers. ¹² Their responsibility is to equip God's people to do his work and build up the church, the body of Christ. ¹³ This will continue until we all come to such unity in our faith and knowledge of God's Son that we will be mature in the Lord, measuring up to the full and complete standard of Christ.

¹⁴ Then we will no longer be immature like children. We won't be tossed and blown about by every wind of new teaching. We will not be influenced when people try to trick us with lies so clever they sound like the truth. ¹⁵ Instead, we will speak the truth in love, growing in every way more and more like Christ, who is the head of his body, the church. ¹⁶ He makes the whole body fit together perfectly. As each part does its own special work, it helps the other parts grow, so that the whole body is healthy and growing and full of love.

Skip Heitzig, from Albuquerque, New Mexico, described something fascinating about icebergs. In the icy waters off the coast of Greenland are innumerable icebergs of varying size. Even casual observation reveals that the small ice floes move in one direction while the massive icebergs flow in another. The reason is simple. Surface winds drive the little bergs while deep ocean currents move the larger ice masses along their routes.

The Christian Church is called into being by God to fulfill the purpose of making disciples of all people. This is done through introducing people to Jesus and journeying with them in growing in our faith in the risen Lord Jesus. At the end of a year and the beginning of a new one, we do well to reflect back upon 2024 to see how we have followed Jesus and our purpose as a congregation to make disciples/followers of Jesus. We also do well to look forward to how we may more fully follow Jesus in this year 2025 before us.

2024 was a challenging but also good year for us as a congregation! I do not need to remind you of the significant challenges our world faced in 2024, nor about the reality facing all Canadian denominations as our world and our country rely less and less upon our Christian faith. We have been grateful that our Presbytery's General Presbyter Rev. Dr. Jeffrey Crawford has been able to speak with our elders and our congregation here in 2024. In 2024 our elders participated in conversations with Doon PC about what would joint ventures of ministry look like (and this summer Doon will be joining our VBS), as well as conversations with Joonim Korean PC in Waterloo about sharing our space together, but they realized our space was too small for their needs. In our own Presbytery of Waterloo-Wellington we are seeing more congregations unable to continue in the traditional form of ministry. We have 12 full-time called ministers in congregations, while another 16 congregations have temporary and part-time ministers. Conversations have begun in our Presbytery between congregations that just cannot afford a

minister, conversations to see what and where God might be leading our Presbytery and what congregational ministry might look like in the near future. As an example, Knox in Preston and St. Andrew's in Hespeler just amalgamated.

I cannot begin to tell you how much you all have done for my heart as together we strive to follow in the way of Jesus!! Thankyou to each person who welcomed me during visits throughout the year! This was also a year of dealing with the deaths of several people who have been part of our faith community for decades. I am excited about this next year together because God is leading us, challenging us, transforming us, and of course loving us into the future He dreams for us to live in!

Through conversations about Baptism and what does it mean to be a follower of Jesus to conversations about faith and grief and most aspects of life, through Bible studies, prayer times, worship services, Vacation Bible School, meetings and fellowship opportunities, and the start of PD Day camps, we have sought to worship and follow the God Who loves us with a perfect and a forever love, and to grow in our faith. We also have been blessed to welcome several new people to our community of faith. Some have been searching for a place to help them find God. Some have come with the desire to reconnect with God and to have a spiritual faith community to help lovingly teach children our faith in Jesus. And some have stayed as you welcomed them with the open arms of Jesus. Ultimately, we are all here seeking to grow in grace, love and faith as followers and sharers of Jesus our Lord! We are on the journey of living together in the way of Jesus!

Back to the icebergs for a moment. I do not have all the answers to life's difficulties. None of us does. But I do know that God knows everything and He is in charge, and that as you and I and KEPC together seek to become more like Jesus even just a little bit every day, we will become more like the larger icebergs: a people carried by a deepening awareness of God's love and His will for our lives who then are pulled by a deeper current than the surface winds of trends or societal pressures. What direction are you traveling? What's the purpose of your life? If you're like most people, you long to know that your life counts for something, that you have a purpose for being on earth. Believe me you do! Everyone whom God has created has a purpose. There's a part of His plan on earth that only you can fulfill. Life's greatest pursuit is to discover what that purpose is and to live within its flow. God made us in love, and He sends us out in the power of His love!!

We here at Kitchener East have much to be thankful for as we anticipate an exciting and fulfilling year together as we seek to follow Jesus more closely! I thank the Lord daily for each of you and I thank-you for your prayers, and I pray that God's grace and peace, love, hope, and joy would abound in your lives!! Praise the Lord, He is always faithful!!!

Leading With Care

It is the policy of the Presbyterian Church in Canada that all persons and in particular all children, youth and vulnerable adults, who participate in the programs/ministries of the Church and/or use the denomination's facilities will be cared for with Christian compassion and will be safe. The policy document entitled "Leading with Care" emphasizes training and prevention. The Policy details at length, the practices required to eliminate opportunities for abuse, prevent occurrences of abuse and ensure the safety of the most vulnerable.

In September of 2005 Session resolved that "In concert with the resolution of the 2005 General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, KEPC implement Leading with Care, with modifications as appropriate for Kitchener East, with the objective of having the program fully in effect by June 2006". This objective has its greatest impact on the Education and Nurture Team with its very special group of teachers and leaders. There is a much smaller but nevertheless significant impact on the activities of the Minister, the Elders, Christian Community, Mission and Outreach, Property, and Worship and Sacrament Teams. This objective has not been realized so the Leading with Care program at Kitchener East Presbyterian Church therefore falls under the direction and oversight of Session.

It is most desirable that a Leading with Care Team be staffed. If you are willing to consider serving on the Team, wish to understand more about the Team's roll and activities, or should you wish to view any of the referenced documents please contact Rev. Mark Richardson.

Kitchener East adopted Term Service for Eldership in 1999. The intent under Term Service for Eldership is that one third of the active elders for the congregation step down every two years to be replaced by Elders elected to new six-year terms. Elders may and do, for various reasons, resign before completion of their term. Elders Gordon Kong, Gibson McIlwrath, Linda Patterson will step down immediately prior to the ordination of new Elders in December this year. These Elders and any Elder who has previously served may, should they be willing and able, be re-elected.

The reason for the staggered replacement of Elders is to ensure that Session always includes many experienced individuals. Although six years is a seemingly long commitment it is not as great as the "service of life" standard that was formerly used throughout The Presbyterian Church in Canada and is still the practice of many congregations.

What is an Elder? An Elder (Ruling Elder) is a Church leader who shares, with the Minister (Teaching Elder), in the pastoral care of the people within a congregation of the Church, in terms of its fellowship (ministry of each other) and its mission (ministry to the world). An Elder is a member of a local Church who is elected by the membership of that Church and ordained to the office of Ruling Elder. The Presbyterian Church understands that the Biblical roots of Eldership describe it as a calling from God to care for and lead the people of God, so Elders are set apart by the act of ordination. An Elder is ordained for life, but may resign from active service. There are a number of individuals within our congregation who have been ordained as Elders in the Presbyterian Church, either at Kitchener East or in other congregations, who are not presently in active service.

The scheduling process is as follows:

- January 27, 2025 Session resolution of approval to elect 13 new elders to bring the total number of elders to 24.
- February 16, 2025 Information article in the annual report on eldership, election of elders and term service.
- September 7, 2025 Distribution of nomination/election package to members of the congregation.
- September 28, 2025, 12:00 Noon Return deadline Votes duly attested, to Clerk of Session.
- September 28, 2025, 11:30 p.m. Special Session meeting examination of voting papers to ascertain those elected.
- November 23, 2025 Appointment of the Edict of Ordination of New Elders Elect.
- November 30, 2025 Due notice to congregation of results of election; "Appointment of the Edict of Ordination" to be read before the congregation.
- December 14, 2025 Ordination/Induction of Elders Elect."

Elders are elected to be servants to God and to the congregation of His Church. Only full members of Kitchener East are eligible to vote and only full members are eligible to be elected. All members of Kitchener East were urged to consider their choices for Elder carefully, pray about it, get to know your fellow members better and by September 28th be certain to submit your nomination votes for up to fifteen different individuals.

BIBLE STUDY ANNUAL REPORT for 2024

We continued with our Bible study on zoom, meeting every Tuesday at 9:30 for two hours. We prefer to use the Life Guide Bible Studies series provided by Inter Varsity press on various topics and books of the Bible. This is an informal, interactive study where lessons are prepared ahead of time and responses are shared when we meet. The discussion is open, friendly, informative and encouraging and reveals each week how God has spoken to each of us as He teaches us lessons from His Word.

We began last February with a study on Busyness – Finding God in the Whirlwind. We learned that our relationship with God is meant to be the center from which our life's activities flow. God's presence with us is the center, the source, the light of our lives, providing the peace, the strength, the wisdom, the joy, the companionship and the purpose we seek. We are called to live thoughtfully, compassionately and humbly as the much-loved children of God that we are. We are called to live in the present moment, aware of God's loving presence with us and in us, relying on God and responding in love to God and our neighbour in all we say and do.

In our study on The Twelve Disciples we discovered that the Master is still in the business of transforming lives. He can take the most fear-filled and faithless among us and empower us to be confident witnesses of His grace and forgiveness. We focused on the disciples individually and saw how each one was changed because of his association with Jesus.

In September we began a study on Colossians and Philemon in which Paul writes to Christians who have longings of more wisdom, more maturity, more power and more faith. This is Paul's strongest declaration of the uniqueness and sufficiency of Christ, His full authority over all powers and the fullness of life He gives. It gave us the chance to discover the scope, reality and implications of the fullness of life we have in Christ and to explore and apply the main ideas that Paul presents. The little book of Philemon is the only surviving letter of Paul to an individual friend and convert about a private matter giving principles for mending broken relationships.

January began with a study on Growing Older and Wiser. This is the second time we have done this study the last being ten years ago. It will be very interesting as we look back to see if we indeed have done so! God has made us for Himself, and mere physical survival is not our highest goal. No matter how many years we accumulate on this earth, we are offered His gift of eternal life in Christ. May we spend our years here, whether few or many, growing wiser and becoming more like Him.

We are pleased that our study via zoom allows us to reach shut-ins and friends from miles away. We do welcome new friends from our church or from the community to join us as we look forward to continuing to grow in God's Word.

The property team would like to express our gratitude to our congregation and session for your ongoing support, guidance and encouragement throughout the year.

A special thank you goes out to our moderator Rev Mark and his wife Emmy, Sarah Portier and the praise team for all their hard work leading us in our worship services and music, online and in person. God has truly blessed us with your talents!

The property team has had a very good year as far as maintenance and operations go. As you see in our weekly church bulletins and calendar by the office, there are plenty of activities going on, but always room for a few more.

Our rental income has decreased by 50% over the past two years unfortunately.

Our snow removal and lawn care cost have increased close to \$5000 in the same period. We thank Burtch Landscaping for keeping our property looking good.

Utilities have remained fairly stable at a bit over \$1000/month.

On February 26th we passed our annual fire inspection after replacing three fire extinguishers and batteries in the main panel.

On March 21st, Rev Mark and Dan met with Alysia Kay and her husband about renting the nursery on Mondays and Wednesday for her Kindermusik program. This program started in September and ended on November 24 due to personal circumstances. Alysia was very grateful to KEPC for our help in giving her the opportunity to expand her business. Many thanks to John Aitken for his help painting the old toy cabinet for Alysia.

Many thanks to Marg Fannon and Ruth Anne Joseph who organized our annual spring cleanup of the church and all those who volunteered and brought cleaning supplies and equipment. It was a beehive of action resulting in an excellent job of cleaning everything in the Sanctuary, Fireside Room, Narthex, as well as much of the lower level. Well done!

Marg also suggested we clean the carpets on the two stairwells, so we got AAA Steam Cleaning to do this on April 16, as well as the nursery room carpet. It made a big difference. Once again, we have to thank Lloyd Weeks for keeping our new floor downstairs nice and clean. It sees a lot of traffic every week. 2024 Report

"Now thank we all, our God, with hearts & hands & voices" The 2024 KEPC financial year included some ups and downs but we were again blessed with generous congregational offerings in the latter couple months that resulted in a surplus of \$3,274. Thanks to everyone for their prayerful support throughout the year in helping to exceed our financial goals for 2024.

The offerings made their way to the Church through a variety of ways via PAR, E-Transfer, Tithely, offering envelopes and mail.

We count offerings following the service (alternate weeks) & appreciate the assistance of the following people – Doris Aitken, Barb Cook, Rob Gloin, Janis Kenzie, Catherine McKerron, Julie Murray, Graham Taylor & Monie Zaayman.

In addition to her church service streaming support, Emmie Richardson supports the offering counters as an alternate as well as ensuring the counting sheet templates on the computer are available and up to date. Emmie also manages the sale of the grocery cards that contribute to the Church fundraising efforts (along with Barb Cook). Thanks for all your contributions to the team Emmie.

Chris Clemens manages the tracking and recording of the offerings, as well as the preparation of the tax receipts. We thank him for committing the many hours during the year that this responsibility requires.

We would also like to express ongoing thanks to our treasurer, Joan Gloin. She continues to look after the day-to-day financial operations of the church, preparing regular financial reports and the annual financial statements and budget. Thanks Joan.

Finally, we would like to thank Gib McIlwrath & Dan Fraser for reviewing the financial statements and associated records and processes. We appreciate the time you take to ensure the financials are in order!

We would also like to thank those involved in the various ministries within Kitchener East. In all cases, you continue to carefully manage the costs to run your ministries and that is a significant help in keeping the operating costs of the church at a manageable level.

In addition to the ongoing grocery card fundraising, there was additional fund-raising activity in 2024 involving the books sale, soup lunches & frozen foods sales in the Grey Hall following Sunday services. In 2024 there was \$3,400 raised by these activities & these efforts are greatly appreciated!

For 2025

Revenue In order to support the proposed operating costs, the total 2025 operating revenue required is \$195,600. This level of offerings will be needed to meet the ongoing expenses that are outlined below.

The proposed offering budget includes assumptions for existing fund raising (Grocery cards, special initiatives) of \$1,500, rental income of \$2,500, & investment income of \$1,000 that help in meeting the expense requirements.

Expenses The 2025 operating expenses are \$195,600 to match the expected revenues. These are higher than 2024 budget given inflationary increases to operating costs as well as adjustments to salaries to reflect prescribed levels by Presbytery.

We are proposing that the Presbyterian Sharing budget remain at \$7,200 for 2025. We continue to share with other Presbyterians through this program.

Thanks to everyone for their financial support of Kitchener East in 2024 – we will continue to share our financial position throughout the year so you can plan your financial support for KEPC. Together we can continue to manage the financial resources available to assist in sharing God's love with our neighbours in Kitchener and elsewhere.

Best wishes to all for 2025 – new members to our team are always welcome.
