**THE PRESBYTERY OF HURON-PERTH**  
**Care of Congregations Committee**

*Dear Members of Knox Presbyterian Church, Goderich*

*Rev. Amanda Bisson has informed you that she has been appointed Interim Moderator for a two-point charge in Brussels and Molesworth, which has become vacant when their Minister has moved on to another congregation. Your congregation had an Interim Moderator appointed during your vacancy in the past, and now it is your minister's turn to help out the Presbytery, and a fellow congregation.*

*The Care of Congregations Committee of Presbytery prayerfully asks that you be as considerate and sharing of your Minister's time and gifts as possible as she will be required to care for these other congregations and will have many duties to fulfill. As an Interim Moderator she is required to ensure that the vacant congregations have pulpit supply for every service and that the sacraments are celebrated. She must also guide their Sessions and congregations firstly through their grieving process, through their discernment of their future, and finally their preparation for calling a new Minister. She will be responsible for conducting baptisms, funerals, weddings, as well as moderating their Session meetings, Search Committee meetings, and congregational meetings.*

*This appointment will not cost you financially, but you do need to keep in mind that your Minister's time and energy will be spread over a significant amount of time and distance throughout the length of the vacancy.*

*We ask that you keep your Minister in your prayers and help and support her as much as possible.*

## **Knox Property Committee**

*As we changed our calendars to November, it was very pleasant to feel an unusual, but warm breeze, and feel warm sunshine. It was almost like September. However, the change of calendar reminded us that the clocks would be changing, and the preparations for the winter months were needed to be done.*

*We are well aware that COVID-19 is still around, but our building is open and we are welcoming so many people back, and also a number of newcomers to our congregation.*

*Much has happened at Knox over the last three years. Our elevator had reached a point where its operating mechanism was obsolete, and we were advised by the maintenance company that if we did have a failure, that it would be a three-month “down-time” before it could be fixed. We were also advised that if we chose to have an upgrade done, it would only mean about two weeks of “down-time”. Obviously, this was far more acceptable and we decided to do that. Of course, just as that was starting, COVID-19 reared its head and the work took far longer than the two weeks. However, as we were closed, this did not impact us in any way. The work and the elevator is functioning quite well.*

*The flat roof over the office area and hallways had been springing leaks for quite some time, and these got quite bad, and we undertook the work. At the same time we discovered that auxiliary HVAC units for the office and Royal Room were in need of replacement. This was also undertaken and completed. The roof leaks resulted in the necessity for ceiling repairs and painting. This has also been done.*

*Over the period of COVID-19, practically every room has been thoroughly cleaned, and we are greatly appreciative of Brenda Shea’s efforts in this regard.*

*Of course, regular maintenance is taking place, as we are dealing with a very large and older building.*

*As the co-property manager, I am very pleased to be able to work with such a good committee. We pride ourselves on getting things done. Thanks to the long association that Knox has with the businesses in town, we are able to get timely help whenever a problem takes place.*

*I noted that there is a picture at the rear of the church, taken at the time of the opening of the “new” Sanctuary, and I know that many people who have long*

*associations with Knox still refer to the “new” building. Well, 2022 is the 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary of that building’s opening.*

## BRIEF HISTORY

### THE NEW BUILDING



*The new Knox Church building received an award for most outstanding ecclesiastical building in Canada.*

The building was designed by Canadian architect Philip Carter Johnson who received the Governor General's Silver Award for the most outstanding ecclesiastical building in Canada. With its sloping concrete walls, beautiful mixture of quarried stone and soaring ceilings, the building could be classified as modern Gothic in style. It was 130 feet long, 49 feet wide and 50 feet tall. (Editor's Note: Later renovations would change these proportions somewhat).

The free-standing tower is a slender structure complementing the architecture of the church and connected to the narthex by an open porch. It currently contains a Schullmerich Electronic Carillon which may be played automatically or from the organ console and can be heard both within the church and from the tower speakers for a distance of approximately 2.5 kilometres.

On the left in the narthex is the cornerstone taken from the church destroyed by fire. The stained glass window on the north wall is dedicated to Dr. MacMillan. The nave, including a balcony, has a seating capacity of approximately 600. The walls and ceiling are reinforced concrete and the pews and panelling are white oak plywood. The memorial stained glass windows on the north and south walls depict scenes from the life of Christ (detailed information on the windows is contained further on in this book). On the east wall are the memorial plaques listing the names of members killed during the wars of the twentieth century.

## **Choir News**

*As the congregation met together for worship each Sunday through the spring and summer of this year, we were finally able to bring singing back into our services. We were helped with the accompaniment of Mary Smith, Robert Blackwell and Bruce Morgan.*



*In September, we welcomed Deborah Bailey as our new Music Director. Deborah has been involved in church music for many years in Huron County, and we are pleased to have her lead us in musical worship Sunday by Sunday. Her presence has enabled us to gather together as singers to assist with the singing of hymns during worship, and of course to sing, usually one anthem.*

*One of the difficulties with our church space is trying to adapt to the new realities of our rather sparse congregation. On the first Sunday that the choir participated in worship, we sat in the choir loft, and there were very few people sitting in the main body of the church. Deborah felt very strongly that the choir loft was not helping in the projection of the sound out into the main sanctuary. As a result of this, the next Sunday, we sat in the front two rows of the church pews, and stood up and moved to the chancel steps to sing the anthem. While the sound was good, the moving around was extremely disruptive for everyone. Currently, we are sitting to the side, where we are able to stand and sing without needing to move, and the sound is, according to the sound technicians, excellent. Needless to say, this is all an ongoing work-in-progress, and we thank everyone for the encouraging support during this transition.*

*One advantage of this particular set-up is that a number of the choir members are easily able to visit with family and friends at the end of the worship service, as there are no steps to negotiate.*

*This year, our Sanctuary is 70 years old, having been opened in 1952. There certainly would not have been any contemplation on anyone's part that we would be, seven decades later, a worshipping congregation of around 50 on any given Sunday (this is counting everyone in the Sanctuary). Unfortunately, we have to accept the fact that we are an aging congregation. Even so, music still plays a major part in our worship services, and we are also attempting to incorporate music that is both traditional and contemporary.*

*As choir members, we share a love for singing, but we are aware that it is important for us to be leading the singing of hymns, both old and new. We hope*

*that when we are using something that is new, that you will hear the words and as you are able, sing along with us. We are, after all, part of the worship service.*

*We have been pleased to welcome some new choristers. Joyce Garrick has returned after a leave of absence, Mary Hay has returned, and Tony Davison has come to us from another congregation. Renee Stalenhoef has also been singing with us as she is able, and we are thankful for their presence with us.*

*If anyone else is interested in singing with us, please speak to Deborah.*

*Our Ukrainian family arrived July 7th and went into a 2-week isolation with us. During those 2 weeks, we all got to know each other, as well as our different cultures.*

*As they could not go anywhere, they spent time in the backyard helping us do some chores and enjoying the pool. We took turns cooking our favorite meals. We ate perogies, dumplings and many cakes that Natasha made. They got to try corn on the cob, fresh fish from Lake Huron, rouladen and chili. During that time both Natasha and Aleksandr were studying English and settling into their new lives in Goderich.*

*After the 2 weeks were up, they began to explore their new home location and took daily walks around the town and to the beach which they really enjoyed. They went to Service Canada and received their social insurance numbers and then onto Service Ontario for health cards. Aleksandr was fortunate enough to get a job at Jokey Plastics. Their daughter Barbara was lucky too and attended the Celtic Kids camp at GDCI which she loved. Natasha has had some driving lessons and now has her G2. Both Bill and I found that the summer flew by as we were looking for a rental home for our family to move into with Natasha's mother & brother who arrived in Canada a month before our family arrived.*

*September came and Barbara entered grade 7 at Goderich Public School. She comes home everyday and tells me what she is learning. She is very excited to be in school and making new friends. During that month Kent Gillen & Christy Lomax (Natasha's mother & brother's host family) found the perfect house for them all. The Donnelly families generously offered to let the six of them stay in their family home which was empty. They moved into the home on October 1, 2022.*

It has been a wonderful learning experience and we feel lucky to have been able to do a small part to help this family start a peaceful live in Canada. ## ***Knox and partners supporting people from Ukraine who have arrived in Huron County***

*Since the summer of 2022, more than 50 people fleeing the conflict in Ukraine have arrived in Huron County. The new arrivals, who have been hosted by long-time residents in the area, are starting over and are being supported by Knox Presbyterian Church and other community partners.*

*Every month in the autumn, the newcomers and their hosts have been gathering in the lower part of Knox Presbyterian Church to share food, meet one another, and learn about various aspects of life in Huron County. Children's activities have been coordinated by volunteers from the Huron County Library.*

*The monthly events, coordinated by volunteers and the Huron County Immigration Partnership, are an opportunity for people to gather with others who share experiences and language.*

*“Because Huron County is so large, many people who were arriving in this area were not able to meet each other or didn't know other people from Ukraine were here. These meet-ups are a chance for people to share information and build community in a new land,” explained Mark Nonkes, manager of the Huron County Immigration Partnership.*

*The meet-ups have also been a way to address needs that people face. In October, the Goderich Salvation Army provided new winter coats to adults and children who were in need, along with signing families up for their food assistance program. Gift cards to a department store were also distributed at that meeting, thanks to a donation from the congregation at Knox Presbyterian Church.*

*A settlement advisor from the YMCA of Southwestern Ontario has also been on hand to provide information to the Ukrainians. Information about health care in Huron County has been provided by community volunteers, along with information about various funds that are available for people in need.*

*The Goderich Lions Club, in collaboration with community partners, have set up the Huron Area Newcomer Fund to provide funds of up to \$1,500 to families for unforeseen expenses during their first 18 months in Canada. While this*

*committee was founded with the intent of assisting Ukrainians in need of support, it is available to support newcomers from various countries.*

*Rev. Amanda Bisson represents the Goderich Ministerial Association on the Huron Area Newcomer Fund. She joins John Maaskant, Paul Good and Michael Daley of the Goderich Lions, along the Mark Nonkes of the Huron County Immigration Partnership and Christine Marshall of the Wingham Community Connectors who collaboratively administer the fund.*

## ***Spaghetti Dinner Event by Deb Bell***


On October 12th we held our Spaghetti Dinner which was very well attended and I received many positive comments, such as *“when will we do it again”*.


