

Typically, we would be looking forward to Advent and Christmas, celebrating the birth of Jesus and great anticipation of Jesus second coming. But, the last 20 months or so have changed the way we see things, the way things used to be and created an uncertainty of what things will be like in the coming months.

But Advent is a season of anticipation. As Christians we believe in a kind and loving God, who is all-knowing and ever-present. One to which, nothing is new or a surprise. So, when we look back at the COVID years, we can remember things in a new way. The four Sundays of Advent focus on Hope, Peace, Joy and Love.

Hope is for the future. We put the things of the past behind us and look to the hope and promises of God. Let's look back for a minute and see how our future hopes were fulfilled during COVID-19 as many of our families were kept safe, we learned how to adjust to changes, continued to function in a new and different way and now we can see less restrictions on the horizon. It was that show of love that helped keep so many people and families stay grounded and bonded together as a community and community of faith.

So, maybe for the Advent season and Christmas activates we can look back instead, to appreciate the hope, peace, joy and love that continued in-spite of our circumstances, that we shared with others and then look forward to experiencing those things in a new way moving forward and remember these words of Jesus from John 14, "25" I have said these things to you while I am still with you. <sup>26</sup> But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you. 27 Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid."

Let us hold onto those words until Jesus comes again.

I thought I could see a grimace on his face as he peered out through the tangled vines bracing himself for another hard winter guarding our backyard. I thought maybe I could say, "Keep your chin up we'll get through this".

Then I walked across the little bridge over the fishpond, maybe I could say, "There's been a lot of water under the bridge and we are still afloat".



You'll be pleased to see that I finally found something I feel is more apt. The last roses of summer. The battered blossoms stand tall on spindly leafless canes. Bravely they continue to show beauty in spite of less than perfect conditions. A wonderful

example of the way Knox Church has continued to thrive even through the difficulties of COVID-19 and the process of calling a new minister. When you think of it, perhaps it's no coincidence since the hand of God controls the seasons of nature as well as the work He has planted here in Knox Church Tiverton.

Last year I said, "Our Interim Moderator the Reverend Paul Sakasov is the epitome of organization and diplomacy and a master of innovation. (That may be just a tad thick)". In looking at the events of the last year I'll have to take some of that back. I mean the part about being a tad thick. The Rev. Paul guided us through these uncharted waters in a way that made it feel simple and easy and even fun. The session of Knox Church owes the Rev. Paul a debt of gratitude for his work with us.

One of the most memorable times of innovation was the call of the Rev. Richard Warne during pandemic times, where a maximum number of 10 people were allowed at the Worship Service. Under Rev. Paul's guidance, the call took place with ten meetings over two days. It was a very unusual and worthwhile process and many commented that it was in some ways better than a conventional call. Approximately seventy people from the congregation were able to meet the Rev. Rick and Mary in a small group setting.

When the Rev. Paul retired to help his parents, the Rev. Kathy Fraser became the Interim Moderator for a few months. The Rev. Kathy led a Session Meeting with the Rev. Rick present prior to his induction. It was an interesting meeting and a great way for Session to meet with the Rev. Rick before his real work as leader began. The Rev. Kathy also preached at the Induction Service for the Rev. Rick and she did a fine job of introducing our new minister.

The Rev. Rick and Mary moved into the manse about the middle of August and the Rev. Rick officially started as the minister of Knox Church on the first of September. Since then, the Rev. Rick and Mary have been working to get to know the people in our congregation. Both the Rev. Rick and Mary are pleasant and easy to visit with and are fitting nicely into the fabric of our church.

Every minister or leader has their own style. The Rev. Rick began to establish his style by moving out of the pulpit and presenting his message at floor level in the front of the church. This has provided a less formal atmosphere that allows a lighter give-and-take with the congregation especially during the opening announcements and any place where interaction is beneficial.

I'm pleased to see that even with social distancing and masks many of our congregation have been showing up for Worship Services. While "Noses and Nickels" should never be the focus of a congregation, it is nice to see many are back again. Without them we would be in trouble. With caring people and God's help, we have the opportunity to continue to make Knox Church a place where we can live, learn, love and grow to the glory of God.



## Otra Fe Canada

Otra Fe Canada, together with Otra Fe El Salvador, supports many farmers and 12 postsecondary students in North-Western El Salvador.

Qualifying farmers are given aid with money to purchase seeds, fertilizer and training with a trained agronomist through our program.

Our scholarship students receive the funds to pursue their postsecondary studies which would otherwise be impossible given their family's income level.

In past years with help of fellow directors of Otra Fe, I would hold fundraising dinners and auctions in an effort to financially support our cause. For the last two years in response to Covid-19 we have had to pivot to on-line fundraising efforts which have been reasonably successful. I am very thankful to those in the Knox community who have continued to support Otra Fe, either by donating or purchasing auction items and making donations through Canada Helps.

I am happy to share that our Students in El Salvador have been able to continue their learning online and all have been reporting to our group regularly.

The farmers had a successful harvest of beans and corn this year. The chicken project that we helped to build in 2019 is

continuing to produce quality chickens and the farmers are very grateful to have this income.

# The Patterson Family, the Founding Family of Knox Presbyterian, Tiverton

Before Zoom, before pandemics, before Bruce Power, there were the pioneers. They came with dreams and fortitude; dreams of better lives and the fortitude to build those lives.

The Patersons were one of these pioneer families. In 1851, shortly after the "Queen's Bush" was surveyed and opened for settlement, John Paterson brought his family to settle on 200 acres west of what is now Hwy. 21, and south of Cty. Rd. 15 (the Boundary) to what is now the farm of Jamie and Laurie Convay.

John and his six sons were carpenters and they proceeded to build. First, a log cabin on the north side of the creek on the northeast corner of their holding.

John wanted the new village to grow so he encouraged other settlers to set up businesses on his land at the same corner as his new log home. He offered this home for early church services and in 1854, a school. First communion services were held in the new Paterson barn.

In 1853, John donated to the village 32 acres from the east side of his holding. He built a four bedroom story-and-a-half frame house further west on his lot. Throughout its 168 years some changes have been made within this house, but the exterior still retains its original style.

John's three grandchildren Annie,
Dan and Katie were the last
Patersons to live in this house.
They continued the Paterson
tradition of community service
and hospitality. Annie was a
member of the Ladies' Aid and
Women's Institute. Dan served as
a village counsellor. Katie was a
teacher in many of the schools in
Bruce and Kincardine Townships.

As a child living on the farm across the road, it was always a happy change of pace for me to visit the neighbours. They had a wood-burning cook stove in the kitchen under which the family Collie used to lay warming his old bones. There were always delicious baking aromas emanating from the kitchen too. The baked goods were offered to guests with a cup of tea. Tea was a "grown-up's" beverage in my experience, so this was a special treat (even if it was mostly sugar and milk!)

In 1963 Dan retired from farming and my parents bought the farm. The Patersons continued to live out their lives in their grandfather's original frame house.

To quote my mother in 'A Historic Album of Tiverton' published for Tiverton's centennial in 1979:

"Although the family is gone, we remember it for the prominent role it played in the settling of Tiverton, and for its hospitality and the active part it took in the life of the community."



I was at the Thanksgiving Service with my daughter and very much enjoyed worshiping in my home church where I worshiped growing up.

In the Knox Church Christmas Letter I wish all members of the congregation a Merry Christmas and many blessings and good health in 2022.

When I was 8 years old my father was cutting railroad ties in northern Saskatchewan.

Just before the roads closed my dad took a load of ties into Prince Albert and sold them. At the same time, he did some Christmas shopping. I remember the smell of Christmas candy and the hush that surrounded everything else he brought home.

When Christmas morning came there was a rationed supply of candy and fruit plus the usual less than exciting socks and underwear for me. However, there was an extraordinary gift for the whole family – a shiny new Viking AM radio complete with a battery pack too heavy to lift and 50 feet of aerial cable to be strung from the cabin to a tree.

Our tight knit little family had everything we could possibly need, exciting drama from Lux

theatre, humour from Fibber McGee and Molly and the latest news from Prince Albert, Saskatchewan – the centre of the universe. We were rich!

Christmas in Hespeler was magical. The main street was adorned with Christmas decorations that shone in the night. The streets on Friday and Saturday was filled with neighbours wishing each other a Merry Christmas while shopping at all the local shops for that perfect Christmas gift. You could feel the excitement and anticipation of family gatherings, gifts to exchange and turkey dinner with all the trimmings, and wishing Baby Jesus a Happy Birthday at Sunday school and church.

During the depression Dominion Woolens made sure at least one person from every family had a job at the Mill so some money would be coming in. The volunteer firefighters raised money and made up bags with a colouring book and crayons, a small toy or game, an orange and apple, candies and nuts in the shell so every child would have at least something for Christmas. Every Christmas Eve right after supper the line would start at the main street and file into the Fire Station to receive your bag and make your last plea for that special gift from Santa. My Dad, sister and I would join the long line and wait our turn to get our goodie bag from Santa, like all our waiting friends and neighbours. That was one

special highlight of growing up in Hespeler. The love and warmth of a small caring community that I'll always cherish.

After getting our goodie bag we would gather with my Mom's family and we'd play cards or board games and eat munchies until sandwiches and sweet treats were served. On the way home as sleepy we were we'd keep our eyes open for Santa and his sleigh in case we were coming home too late for his visit. Oh to believe in I Santa! Waking on Christmas morning and sneaking down the stairs as not to awake Mom and Dad and see what Santa had left for us and waiting to share those gifts with our parents.

The people may be long gone but not forgotten at this most special CHRISTmas time. The memories flood back and the joy rekindled, once again I'm a child with wide eyes awaiting Jesus' arrival, the visit of Santa Clause, the goodie bags, and the sounds of family past.

I loved the shared stories of Christmas memories in our newsletter.


