It has been a year and a half since my family made the move to Tiverton. How quickly time has gone. Thinking about the past year, I recognize how many things God has done through various ministries at Knox Tiverton. Without your prayer, spirit of volunteering, and gifts, this would never have been possible.

It's about having the courage to identify areas that are toxic and experience healing and change. It's about encountering God's presence and abundance in our lives.

It is my prayer that together we will be God's faithful children and strive to do God's work in this community no matter what that might look like tomorrow. I trust that God will continue to guide us faithfully, continue to bless us in our lives together, and continue to make us a blessing in our community.

MINUTES CONGREGATIONAL MEETING SUNDAY APRIL 23, 2017

A congregational meeting of Knox Presbyterian Church Tiverton, Ontario was held on Sunday, April 23, 2017 following Worship Service. This meeting was called to inform the congregation about the repairs to the Church roof. Board of Managers Chairperson Carolyn Hamilton opened the meeting with a prayer. Carolyn explained that the Board of Managers had met with the "Roof" committee headed by Don MacArthur and the trustees of the church in regards to the state of the church roof. The roof needs to be replaced sooner than later. Carolyn explained the research that was done by the committee.

The roof committee and trustees recommend Hy Grade Steel roofing using steel shakes. There is a 50 year warranty on both material and workmanship.

All the wooden shingles will be removed, sheathing checked and ice and water shield installed over the entire roof. Then the roof will be strapped with 1X4 vertically and 2X2 horizontally before applying the new steel shakes. This also includes the tower. The flat roof on top will be replaced with 4X8 - 1/2 inch plywood and rubber membrane.

The cost for the main roof will be \$63,119.00, flat roof area \$1500.00, man lift \$6000.00 for a total cost of \$70,799.47, plus \$9180.47 HST. Payments will be made in three instalments. Deposit upon signing, when the material is delivered and upon completion. The church will get approximately 80% of the HST back. Insurance is going to cover 25% of the cost before HST.

There is enough money in the memorial Renovation fund at present thanks to a very generous donation from John H. MacKenzie for capital repairs.

Carolyn stated that the Board of Managers recommends proceeding with the Hy-Grade Steel system using money from the Memorial Renovation Fund.

Motion by Ken Young, seconded by Heather Catto that the church proceed with the work that needs to be done on the church as recommended by the Board of Managers and outlined by Carolyn Hamilton. A discussion was held. A question was asked if this project would drain the Memorial Renovation Fund. Carolyn mentioned that any further funds would go back into the MRF. The motion was carried.

A big thank you was extended to the members of the Roof Committee (Don MacArthur, Norm Dobson and Ernie Young).

Carolyn closed the meeting with a prayer.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL REPORT

KNOX CHURCH FUNDS

This page refers to different funds in our church and offers a brief explanation of each.

MEMORIAL RENOVATION FUND

PURPOSE: The Memorial Renovation Fund was established at the Annual Congregational meeting, January 25, 1979 and amended at a special congregation meeting June 29,1988. The fund was established to provide a fund for those wishing to make memorial gifts or any unspecified bequests to the church; and to provide a fund for major renovations and restorations of the church or manse buildings and property and the replacement of Sanctuary furnishings.

PROCEDURE: The Treasurer receives funds from donors and sends thank you cards to the donors. The Treasurer notifies the Board of Managers and records the fact in the Memorial Book that a memorial gift has been received in memory of a particular person(s) or that a bequest has been received from the person named. If the memorial gift or bequest is, or exceeds, \$500.00, this information is forwarded to the Stewardship Committee who co-ordinates the wording and installation of a plate on the Memorial Plaque and notification in the Sunday bulletin.

FUND MANAGEMENT: The fund is administered by the Treasurer upon instructions from the Board of Managers. Release of funds is approved by a duly called meeting of the congregation where the Board of Managers present their detailed case.

GRANT HELM ESTATE TRUST FUND

Early in 1980, the Board of Managers, on behalf of the congregation, received a bequest of \$5000 from the estate of the late Grant Helm. It was specified that the interest from the invested funds be used for the purchase, renovation or repair of equipment for the Sunday School; and the redecoration, renovation and improvement of the Sunday School room.

HUGHES-MCKELLAR MEMORIAL FUND

In 1997, Miss Margaret Hughes of London, Ontario donated \$50,000.00 to our church to establish the Hughes-McKellar Memorial Fund. The principal amount of \$50,000 is to be invested in perpetuity. The yearly interest from the fund is to be used as follows:

- 1. One half of the interest to be given to the W.M.S. for mission projects as they see fit.
- 2. On half of the interest to be given to the Board of Managers choir needs to be met first, the remainder used as the Board of Managers see fit.

THE OUTREACH FUND

At the Annual Congregational Meeting, January 31, 2000 the Knox Church Tiverton Outreach Fund was established. This fund is contributed to by the congregation, separate from Presbyterians Sharing Allocation. Funds are used for local benevolent needs, mission outreach and other Congregational Life Activity expenses at the discretion of the Session.

JOHN H. MACKENZIE BUILDING TRUST FUND

In 2016 Knox Presbyterian Church Tiverton received a bequest of \$50,000.00 from the estate of John H. MacKenzie of Bruce Township to be administered by the Board of Managers and to be set aside in a separate fund for use only for repairs, maintenance and improvements to the church building. At the February 12, 2017 Annual Congregational meeting the John H. MacKenzie Building Trust Fund was established as the separate fund for the bequest. As per donor's request such fund does not permit expenditure for general upkeep such as heat, light, insurance as this gift is intended to be used for expenditures of a capital nature in order to maintain the physical structure of the church and/or improve it.

ROBERT 'BOB' HUGH MACKINNON FUND

In 2013 Knox Presbyterian Church Tiverton received a donation that will be continued each year by the family, in memory of Robert 'Bob' Hugh MacKinnon of Tiverton, Ont. The family has requested that the yearly donation be dispersed in full each year with half the donation to be used within the community and the other half to be used for youth programs within the Church ministry. At the February 12, 2017 Annual Congregational meeting the Robert 'Bob' Hugh MacKinnon Fund was established for this yearly donation. The Board of Managers will administer the fund according to the donor's wishes and determine each year the specific recipients.
