Scripture

Acts 2: 43 - 47

Matthew 15: 21 - 28

Jesus left that place and went away to the district of Tyre and Sidon. Just then a Canaanite woman from that region came out and started shouting, "Have mercy on me, Lord, Son of David; my daughter is tormented by a demon."

But he did not answer her at all. And his disciples came and urged him, saying, "Send her away, for she keeps shouting after us."

He answered, "I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel."

But she came and knelt before him, saying, "Lord, help me."

He answered, "It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs."

She said, "Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table."

Then Jesus answered her, "Woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish." And her daughter was healed instantly.

This is the word of the Lord. **Thanks be to God.**

Message

Throughout our lives we continually experience growth and change. We learn from our parents, our siblings and friends, and from our larger connection with other social groups. Some learning is organized and well structured: schools, Sunday school, other adult study groups. Other forms of learning are contextual, experiential, and sometimes serendipitous – it is in our best interests to adopt a learning mode of interaction wherever we are. One common expression is "everyone has a story to tell." We learn from and about each other and ourselves when we share our stories.

The earliest Christian communities did not have buildings, committees, annual meetings, or budgets. They were simply gatherings of people who had heard and been transformed by the good news about Jesus. They considered themselves children of God and followers or disciples of Jesus, the Christ. They stood apart from the norms and values of the societies in which they lived and so were naturally inclined to gather together and to talk about their new understandings. In the euphoria of a Christ-centred hope, they shared whatever they had with each other, as there was need. They "spent much time together" and learned to communicate, worship, and live in new and life-giving ways.

Together, they were reaffirmed in their beliefs and in how they were to live life abundantly. Together, the poorest were not quite so poor and the richest were blessed with opportunities to be generous, and all practised loving God and serving their neighbour. They learned to survive in a challenging, and sometimes very hostile, world.

Many sense that we are living now in a challenging and hostile world – one in which we may feel isolated and alone. Learning the practicalities of the times in which each of us lives has been part of the human story and the Christian thread within that story. God has blessed each of us with hearts, minds and spirits, and it is important that we exercise and "grow" all of them. How will the times we are living in today "grow" our faith?

The flow of learning is multi-directional – we share our understandings of what it means to be called by God and guided by Jesus in a new, interconnected global community. Advances in medicine and health are shared to the benefit of the poorest and the most vulnerable. Teaching others how to pass on their skills and knowledge, teaching the teachers of tomorrow, empowers people and broadcasts the benefits of knowledge and skills. We learn all the time – intentionally and unintentionally – from teachers, from one another, from the environment and the world in which we live.

God too continues to teach us. There are many wonders and signs if we are willing and able to learn – if we have the eyes with which to see them. It is not enough to know what is right before the Lord – we must put it into practice. May God continue to grant us wisdom as we seek to fully live our faith in the world – sharing our personal stories and the gifts with which we have all been blessed.

The story shared from Matthew's gospel today is not one I am especially fond of. Who wants to hear Jesus sounding so harsh? Who can reconcile his refusal to answer a woman pleading for his help – denying that he has anything to offer "her kind"? The traditional reading of this passage is that the Canaanite woman is passing some sort of test of faith – that Jesus doesn't really mean what he says when he makes his exclusivist remarks about only ministering to the Israelites – when he calls her a dog. Some people like this interpretation – in part perhaps because it saves Jesus from looking like too much of a jerk. He doesn't mean to be rude – he is just testing her faith – bringing to harvest the faith God has already planted in her. But I still don't like it – I still believe there is another way of looking at it.

First of all, you need to embrace the notion of teaching and learning we discussed earlier – that it is part of the human experience – for all of us – in all cultures – at all times in our lives. And this means that it can be true for Jesus too. Jesus can learn – can grow and change – can be influenced – perhaps by a persistent, faithful, somewhat desperate mother of a sick child.

The theological implications of accepting that Jesus learns might challenge us a bit. Does that mean Jesus is not perfect – not complete or sinless? Or does it simply mean that Jesus' own sense of God's kingdom is challenged, stretched, and enhanced by his encounter with this fierce and faithful woman. Maybe Jesus really believes he was sent only to the Israelites – and the woman takes him on – persuading him that something larger is at stake.

Is it possible that this encounter helps Jesus to widen his own perspective? Was Jesus capable of ever harboring such attitudes? It is no sin to make an honest mistake – no sin to get startled – no sin to be unaware of something. So, if Jesus really did think at some point that he was supposed to limit himself to Israel, that was no sin. Maybe part of what it means for Jesus to be fully human is that he not only shares our vulnerability in terms of suffering and dying, but also has the genuine ability to learn through experience as we do.

Perhaps through this encounter Jesus learns that God's kingdom and his mission to enact that kingdom is bigger than he had initially imagined – more encompassing than he'd at first dreamed. And perhaps the reason Matthew makes sure to record the incident is to challenge his Jewish-Christian audience – and us – as we struggle with questions about who should be included in the church – about who we need to help and who might be safely considered to be beyond the pale? What is the scope of salvation?

This passage invites us to imagine that God's purpose unfolded throughout Jesus' life and ministry and continues to do so in our own lives and experiences. This tenacious and faithful woman – a complete stranger – pushed Jesus to reconsider – to learn, and to grow. Certainly for us – and maybe even for Jesus – the Canaanite woman in this story becomes an instrument of teaching by reminding us that in the end, the love of God needs to be available to all people.

We share God's love as we encourage the work of various ministries in the church and efforts throughout the world seeking healing, reconciliation, and an end to racism in its many forms. We share God's love as we donate to relief and uphold in prayer those suffering in Beirut following the recent devastating explosion. We see God's purpose continuing to unfold as we support one another through this time of pandemic separation and anxiety. We remember the struggles of early Christians living together and sharing what they had in common to celebrate the abundance God promises. The

love of God invites us to share our stories of faith – learning from and with each another. There still are many wonders and signs if we are willing and able to learn – if we have the eyes with which to see them. **Amen**
