# Message Comfort Can Lead to Power The Rev. Reid Chudley

#### **CLAW BACK WORDS**

How long do you think it took for Peter?

You can probably figure it out quite easily... because you've probably done it yourself!

So, it probably took Peter about the same time it took you... probably not very long!

How long did it take you... between the time you spoke words... words you wish hadn't escaped your mouth... how long until you wished you could physically arrest those words and then stuff them back into your mouth?

I know it only takes an instant to want those words back... I know because I have done it a thousand times.

I wonder how long it took Peter... having just said the words... to want to grab them out of thin air... and stuff them back into his mouth.

While the action seems to be almost instant, Jesus does have to turn and face Simon, before he says those dreadful words: "Get behind me, Satan! You are a stumbling block to me..."

I bet that was time enough... for Peter to want those words back.

#### **JESUS WANT HIS WORDS BACK?**

I wonder if Jesus regrets his words.

I wonder if Matthew talked to Jesus, privately, about these words. Maybe asking Jesus privately: Rabbi, did you mean these words?

Rabbi, how could you call Peter, Satan?

Rabbi, do you regret your words?

Matthew remembered them... and wrote them down. Surely he couldn't write down every word that Jesus spoke... so I have to think that these words of Jesus are important for us to hear.

### TWITTER WORLD... JESUS THE WORD

In a world of Twitter and social media isn't this an important discussion? A discussion about OUR words and how they affect us and others. Anyone who have been cut down by impulsive and thoughtless words... anyone who deeply regrets the use of rash words must surely understand this.

So the first lesson for us is a reminder for us to use words carefully. Thoughtfully. Slowly.

We can use theology here too.

Some of the first Christians understood Jesus as Incarnating... the Divine Word of God. That is the Word of Life... The Word which gives shape, substance and being to everything...

Jesus... the Word of Life tells us that words are primarily for creating, giving substance and form and purpose to the thoughts of God... which through the Word were spoken into life.

Words are meant to build up the truth... about God and everything.

Yes, Jesus also used words to rebuke. But remember who he most often rebuked: those who abused power; those who abused an un-complex faith.

Jesus used words of rebuke to those whose human ideals brought death to faith... instead of faith to life.

#### THE REBUKE

I wanted to start with Peter's rebuke of Jesus. But in order to give us a starting point we actually need to start with Jesus' rebuke. Not the accusation of embodying Satan, but the last part, where Jesus says: *Peter, you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things.* 

What then are the human 'things' to which Peter has set his mind.

Well if we think about it, there is really only one answer. Peter doesn't want Jesus to go to the cross... and what is the cross? Well if we use the words of hymn writer George Bennard... the cross is *the emblem of suffering and shame*.

So, if Peter doesn't want Jesus to go to the place of suffering and shame then doesn't he want Jesus to go to the place of comfort and power?

What human doesn't ... on some level want comfort and power?

Isn't this what all of our social unrest and protest is working toward... **a balance of comfort and power for all?** No human soul yearns for suffering and shame; the human soul will only endure suffering and shame when it is used to achieve a balance of comfort and power.

So here is my definition for the *human things* ... against which Jesus warns.

Human things are the collective desire of the human soul for comfort and power, without enduring the experience of suffering and shame. Comfort and power... without suffering and shame ... This separation is the human things ... Why is this important?

#### SUFFERING AND SHAME AS TEACHERS

Suffering and shame are better teachers than are comfort and power.

Suffering and shame teach us directly about pain, human weakness and endurance, humility and human need. Suffering and shame teach us indirectly about responsibility, compassion, mercy.

Wouldn't you hope that everyone who is blessed with comfort and power would first have to spend some time under the tutelage of the cross?

Wouldn't the world be quite different if all of our leaders spent more time learning from suffering and shame than comfort and power?

Maybe there is a reason that many of today's brightest emerging leaders *are other than those* who were born to privilege.

Yes, our human souls crave a world without suffering and shame, but in truth these remain good teachers for our sinful sides.

**TO BE CLEAR...** I am not suggesting for a moment that we should liberate suffering and shame upon the world. Nor am I saying that these are to be ignored as necessary evils. All I am saying is that they are here, and they seem to be staying... so may we learn their lessons and remember them in times of comfort and power.

#### **HEAVEN AND EARTH**

The craving of the human soul for comfort and power is a product of our desire of heaven. But here... is not there. Earth is not Heaven.

Therefore, when Peter rebukes Jesus, saying *never will you go to the cross* he has mistaken earth for heaven and falsely imagines a world where comfort and power can come... without suffering and shame.

#### **BACK TO JESUS**

This is why Jesus' rebuke is so severe.

Get behind me Satan! rebukes Jesus.

And I don't think for a moment that Jesus regrets his words. He doesn't try to take the words back. Why? Because however **we** understand Satan, Satan's message is always about comfort and power. Remember Jesus and the temptations in the wilderness? They were all about comfort and power.

However we understand Satan, Satan's message is always about comfort and power. Remember the forbidden fruit in Eden. Comfort and power.

So, when Jesus rebukes Peter with the words, 'Get behind me Satan' he is accusing Peter of embodying the teachings of Satan... comfort and power without suffering and shame. And therefore, earth as a substitute for heaven.

By the way this is why we are taught to pray ... your will be done... on earth **as it is** in heaven... and not... thy will be done on earth... **as if it were** heaven.

Jesus accuses Peter of not having his mind set on divine things. What are these?

Well this is cleared up by the gospel.

Divine things... heavenly things... are comfort and power... obviously... yet these are things that cannot be easily managed by the human heart... comfort is too easily confused for blessing... power is too easily confused for righteousness

Therefore, Jesus left the comfort and power of heaven to take up the suffering and shame of the cross... in order to remind us that this is not heaven... not now ... not yet...

So, if the gospel is truth... true comfort and power cannot... under heaven be separated from the teachings of suffering and shame...

And finally, this... there is no shortcut to heavenly things... our political failures have taught us this.... that every shortcut to comfort and power... leads more often to injustice and corruption. There is no shortcut to heavenly things... otherwise Peter's rebuke was right.

If there were a shortcut to heavenly things... then the cross of Jesus is unnecessary, and Jesus could have simply gone straight to comfort and power

There is no shortcut to heavenly things... certainly not for the world and certainly not for the community of Christ: also known as the church.

Our way is always the cross first and then Easter. Without the cross Easter is empty... yet the comfort and power of Easter remains always OUR hope beyond the suffering and shame of the cross.

Friends... there are no shortcuts to finding heavenly things. The church must embrace this and remember that historically... we have been our worst version when forgetting the lessons of the cross and the tutoring... of suffering and shame

To imagine comfort and power without suffering and shame is to make too much of ourselves and the world and we usurp the Word of God and rob Heaven of its glory.

May God bless us with a rebuke when we forget suffering and shame. For there are no shortcuts to comfort and power. **Amen**

May they know your strength and assurance day by day

O God, we need the embrace of your presence, each in our own way. Bring healing and peace to our lives and to this world you love. Open our eyes and our hearts so that we may offer healing and peace to those we encounter. We bring our concerns in the name of Jesus who encourages us to pray together... Our Father, who art in heaven – hallowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come – thy will be done – on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever. Amen
