Scripture Reading: Matthew 18:21-35

Then Peter came and said to him, "Lord, if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?"

Jesus said to him, "Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times.

"For this reason the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his slaves.

When he began the reckoning, one who owed him ten thousand talents was brought to him; and, as he could not pay, his lord ordered him to be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions, and payment to be made. So the slave fell on his knees before him, saying, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you everything.'

And out of pity for him, the lord of that slave released him and forgave him the debt.

But that same slave, as he went out, came upon one of his fellow slaves who owed him a hundred denarii; and seizing him by the throat, he said, 'Pay what you owe.'

Then his fellow slave fell down and pleaded with him, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you.' But he refused; then he went and threw him into prison until he would pay the debt.

When his fellow slaves saw what had happened, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their lord all that had taken place.

Then his lord summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked slave! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me.

Should you not have had mercy on your fellow slave, as I had mercy on you?' And in anger his lord handed him over to be tortured until he would pay his entire debt.

So my heavenly Father will also do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother or sister from your heart."

Message: Unnatural Forgiveness

My kids like the Avengers movies, you know the films with Iron Man, Black Widow, Black Panther and my personal favourite, the big green beast called The Hulk.

The Hulk is actually a man ... a scientist called Dr. Banner. But as a result of a radioactive experiment that didn't go as planned now when Dr. Banner gets angry he becomes the green monster called the Hulk.

In a way, the Hulk is two identities: one the brilliant scientist, Dr. Bruce Banner who knows everything about everything. The second, the uncontrollable beast called The Hulk whoknkows about breaking everything.

The reason I like the character so much is because he is so human. They are two identities in the one being. When soft spoken respectable Dr. Banner solves world problems through science ... but when he gets mad, he becomes the Hulk ... and bad guys get smashed and so do lots of other things.

In our passage this morning Peter asks Jesus how often we should forgive one another.

In response, Jesus gives a very unnatural answer. He says not just the perfect amount of seven times but seventy-seven times. Why do I say that Jesus' answer is unnatural? Because human beings are not naturally forgiving. The problems we face as a society ... the real problems we face ... go on for generations ... if not centuries ... in no small part because we cannot naturally forgive. We hold onto anger ... we hold onto status quo ... we hold on to power.

Jesus knows this. He knows that the human heart is not naturally inclined to forgiveness nor is the human heart naturally inclined to remember what it is to be forgiven.

This is why Jesus tells this radically unnatural parable.

Why is so radically unnatural? Simple because it contains the gospel.

Look again at the story. There is a massive debt owed to a king. The debtor asks for more time to pay off the debt. But the king will have none of it. Instead of taking up the offer of extending the debt, the king forgives the debt outright.

Imagine that. Now on the surface we could simply apply this radical story to the world. How much poverty is caused by crushing debt? How many systemic problems in the world are caused by poverty? We don't have to have great imaginations to understand that a lot of racism is perpetuated through class struggle and cold grip of poverty.

The Bible tells us that all debt should be forgiven, not just financial debt but personal debts. If we could make that happen ... unnatural as it is ... I have no doubt that many issues would be alleviated.

But it is so unnatural ... that kind of forgiveness. The human heart and the human economics will never permit it.

This is why Jesus has to tell a story about it. There is probably no historical example of this kind of forgiveness of debts.

Except there is ... In fact quite recently in the United States, the radical unnatural pardoning of debts has been criticized by almost everyone ... even Christians as well.

Yet the debtor in the story told by Jesus is obviously a remorseless debtor who ... in the freedom forgiveness has shown him ... only finds more greed and anger and desire for status quo.

The debtor in the story is a very modern human ... or we are just humans who change very little ... where it counts.

And it doesn't seem to matter about education or upbringing ... everyone wants to be seen as debt free ... but on the inside ... we count our debtors ... sometimes with the vitriol of a radioactive beast.

Now I cannot change the world and neither can you, even if we are able to unnatural in our quest to forgive. But we can make a big difference in the church. We can radically and unnaturally forgive one another and live the freedom that comes with carrying no debts and managing no debtors. And if our communities become places of radical forgiveness then won't they be attractive in a world where naturally we count our debtors?

Maybe the church could be known for something radical ... like forgiveness. And that would be attractive.

The problem is there are Hulks in the church. On the outside they are prim and proper ... well presented and maybe even well respected ... but on the inside they house hauling unforgiveness ...

I have seen Matthew 18 Christians. They love God for the forgiveness that they unconditionally received ... yet are only happy to count out the debts of others.

I probably should be careful here, because I have probably been a Matthew 18 Christian at my worst.

And right now, amid a pandemic and social and cultural unrest ... it is almost impossible to be at our best all the time.

My hope is that we can be like the king in the story. In the story the king is obviously God ... because only God can forgive fully and completely and unnaturally ... or maybe the better word would be supernaturally able to forgive.

My hope is that this divine ability to forgive so fully and completely is hidden in the human soul ... just as we claim through faith to be made in the image of God.

My hope is that in every person lurks a larger than life ability to forgive ... completely and unconditionally ... just as we have been forgiven ... completely and unconditionally.

My hope is that every Christian has enough of the Holy Spirit to be transformed into a great hulking beast of forgiveness ... with a hulking ability to smash debts into oblivion.

My hope is that ... day by day ... more and more debts will be smashed by the power of God's image in each one of us and the church ... not the building ... but the flesh and blood church ... the people of God ... will be recognized by their ability to crush and smash debts ... and the world will be a little more gospel because of it.

I think a lot of people are attracted to the characters in movies who can overcome the evil in the world or the evil in someone else and protect the freedom of the world.

But I think the real world could use some real-life superheroes who ... feeling the of the supernatural freedom offered in the gospel of the King of grace ... can slowly but surely transform the debts of the world into opportunities to set people free ... from debt ... from punishment ... and from crushing systems of ongoing condemnation ...

May we hold onto the truth that our debts are not just put off but are crushed by hulking grip of grace. God bless you all, children of God.
