~ Message ~

Today we celebrate the interplay of tradition and transformation as we remember the saints, those who have been faithful to God throughout history and in our congregations. We commit ourselves to embody the living thoughts, values, and actions of our companions and saints of the church. We grieve but also rejoice in their lives and the difference they made in the lives they influenced. They live on with God and in us. We affirm that with God nothing of value is ever lost and whatever is loved shares in God's everlasting life.

Isaiah calls for celebration. The days of exile and sorrow are gone. Now a feast is served. Laughter and merriment replace tears and pain. Loss and death will be no more. Isaiah invites

us to look at our own pain – the pain of our world – and to dream of a banquet where everyone is healed and every life matters.

I think we all yearn for – and do our best to work for – a world in which everyone is safe – to proclaim God's promised justice. As we celebrate the saints among us, we seek to participate in creating a world in which saints can emerge.

What makes a saint a saint?

We often refer to those who have lead exemplary lives as saints – those who serve as an model to all of us of how to live a good and holy life but who have gone on to a wider life in eternity – people like Sister Theresa, Dietrich Bonhoeffer, and many others. We keep days in their honour and frequently recognize them with the honorific title "saint": St. Peter, St. Andrew and so on.

There is another aspect to being a saint – those whom we call the saints on earth – the saints mentioned in scripture. It is likely that the apostle Paul – St. Paul – would say baptism is a mark of sainthood. The writer of the Revelation to John in his heavenly vision puts it this way – the home of God is among mortals. God will dwell with them – they will be God's people – God will be with them.

In the Reformed Tradition we are all called saints – the "sainthood of all believers" – because of God's continuing incarnate presence among the people. It is God who is intimately and fully holy – it is God who came in the flesh, who still dwells in our midst. That presence permeates the entire community of faith. What makes God's people holy is God's divine presence – not our behaviour which is so often quite "un-saintly".

God's voice continues from heaven, "See, I am making all things new." God is making a promise and we need to be patient as God works in and through us.

We live in a world that often advertises perfection in some interesting ways and so we forget that saintliness is much less about perfection than it is about transformation. We who are God's saints on earth are called to allow the holy presence of God be a transforming influence in our life. And sainthood is not about externals – piety and looking good – but about the internal person – who we are on the inside.

If you have ever watched a potter working clay you will know that as the clay is shaped, what happens on the inside is critical to the finished piece. In the process of making a pot the importance of the inside of the vessel – how the interior space is formed – determines the outer appearance of the piece of pottery. If attention is not given to the inner form, the outer form will be misshapen – and will collapse.

If we focus only on an outward show of piety, then all we get is attention from those around us. If we are truly repentant and seek to be realigned with God's divine purposes, then it is our inner self that must be transformed.

We are called to be good – to do good – not for the glory or the recognition – not to be thought "a saint". We are good, and do good, as God acts in and through us to cause our own transformation and the transformation – the salvation – of the world.

Today as we celebrate "the saints", God calls us again to be clay in the hands of the potter – to enable God's holy presence in our midst to continue to shape our lives and our faith as God's saints on earth – saints in a broken world. As saints on earth we are called to live life inside out. Isn't that what the Incarnation is all about? With God there is always more than we can see. Amen

~ Remembering the Saints ~

> For all the saints (verses 1 and 2)

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Today we direct our attention to the richness of Christian history and the varied experiences of the grace of God by lifting up the lives of the saints.

We celebrate saints as those who aspire to the sanctity of God whom they serve. Because the Holy Spirit dwells within them, they too are made holy. A saint, therefore, is one who reflects the blessedness of the God he or she serves: to be a saint in this sense is a sign not of perfection, but of fidelity.

We think of all the people of God, living and dead, who together form the mystical body of Christ and we name those associated with our congregations who have died since our last remembrance of the saints. We remember them in our prayers – we give thanks for their lives – we find strength in their faith and the faith of all the saints both known to us and known only to God.

1 Thessalonians 4: 13-18 Reid Chudley

But we do not want you to be uninformed, brothers and sisters, about those who have died, so that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope. For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have died.

For this we declare to you by the word of the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will by no means precede those who have died. For the Lord himself, with a cry of command, with the archangel's call and with the sound of God's trumpet, will descend from heaven, and the dead in Christ will rise first. Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up in the clouds together with them to meet the Lord in the air; and so we will be with the Lord forever.
