Scripture Isaiah 60: 1-6

Arise, shine; for your light has come, and the glory of the LORD has risen upon you.

For darkness shall cover the earth, and thick darkness the peoples; but the LORD will arise upon you, and his glory will appear over you. Nations shall come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your dawn.

Lift up your eyes and look around; they all gather together, they come to you; your sons shall come from far away, and your daughters shall be carried on their nurses' arms.

Then you shall see and be radiant; your heart shall thrill and rejoice, because the abundance of the sea shall be brought to you, the wealth of the nations shall come to you. A multitude of camels shall cover you, the young camels of Midian and Ephah; all those from Sheba shall come. They shall bring gold and frankincense and shall proclaim the praise of the LORD.

Matthew 2: 1-12

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising and have come to pay him homage."

When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born.

They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet: 'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel.'"

Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage."

When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was.

When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy.

On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

This is the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

Message

There weren't three of them, they weren't kings, they didn't have camels, and we don't know they were men. When we hear the stories of Jesus' early life, it is almost impossible to look at a text apart from what we think we know about it. For most of us, the birth narratives of Matthew and Luke are entwined with one another and their Hebrew scripture roots. In Matthew, the Magi come to a house in Bethlehem – no manger, no shepherds, no heavenly host. Three gifts are named: gold, frankincense, and myrrh. In Isaiah 60, gold, frankincense, and camels are listed among the tribute of nations and kings. In Psalm 72, kings bring gifts to Israel's king and fall down before him.

While we retain the details of wealth and power described in these passages – kings, camels, gold, honour – we often lose the theme of justice that pervades Isaiah and is explicit in the Psalm: for he delivers the needy when they call, the poor and those who have no helper.

When we peel away the surplus meaning and focus on justice and power, the real gift of the mysterious and exotic visitors is revealed for us. W. H. Auden puts it perfectly and concisely in his poem For the Time Being: To discover how to be human now / is the reason we follow this star.

It happened in the time of King Herod, a time of great injustice and suffering. Herod was that most dangerous kind of powerful person: insecure and fearful, eaten up with worry about maintaining his power and place and comfort, his unearned advantages — his privilege. Protecting all of those things demands a lot of energy. Just imagine, how thrilled he must have been when a little band of travelers showed up at his palace — camels parked out front, loaded down with treasure — and they asked him — the king — for directions to the real King of the Jews?

Matthew's gospel says that Herod is frightened and all Jerusalem with him – but many translations read perturbed – troubled – disturbed. The king is disturbed by these wise guys! And the people are agitated because it is never good for the common folk when a king is upset.

We can understand Herod's anxiety. He has built himself a comfortable kingdom that works for him. Things are in place – orderly and comfortable – just the way Herod has arranged them. He is king after all and the thought of some other king who might threaten to disturb things – well you can see how a king could get perturbed about that.

Herod gathers his scholars to discover where this king is to be born since it seems the travelers – learned as they were – did not have all the answers – needed help on their long and hope-filled quest. They had dropped everything – left their country and the comforts of home to set out for a distant land. Their guide was a spectacular natural phenomenon – a bright star – but that star had only led them most of the way – not quite all the way – to this newborn king.

Where does one expect to find a newborn king? Well, in addition to the bright star in the sky, the wise men also had some knowledge of scripture to guide them – like today's beautiful words

from the prophet Isaiah spoken to the people of Israel more than five hundred years before these wise men set out on their journey. Based on Isaiah, they assumed that Jerusalem was the place to find the new king. To Jerusalem they carried their gifts just as the dream of Isaiah had the wealth of the nations coming to the bright shining city. And when they got there, they innocently — naively — turned to Herod the lesser, evil king, for directions to the real king promised by God.

Herod reacts in fear to the birth of a baby king destined to replace him – one who brings good news for the world. For Herod, this is bad news, and he turns to the chief priests and scribes, to help him figure out where this dangerous child is. Herod is disturbed and all Jerusalem with him.

The scholars do a little Bible study and instead of Isaiah they bring to Herod a surprising, counter-intuitive, and maybe even dangerous answer from two other books of the Old Testament: the prophet Micah and the second book of Samuel. These texts say that the one who is to rule – the gentle shepherd king – will come from the most unexpected of places, off the beaten path, out of the limelight – the little town of Bethlehem.

Our story – the one that comes to us in Matthew's gospel, is really about those two Old Testament stories: one about a great and prosperous city and one about a humble little town. Jerusalem and Bethlehem are only nine miles apart, but what a long nine miles from the halls of power and glory – to what God is doing out there on the margins.

One account offers a grand vision of self-sufficiency and normalcy – security that we're tempted to seek through power – the power of money – possessions – misinformation – weapons.

The other offers an alternative that runs throughout the entire Bible: a dream of peace and a time when all nations will beat their swords into plowshares and live together in harmony — when the lion and the lamb will lie down together because nature itself will embody a whole new way of being — no more deaths of innocents — no violence or wretched injustice. The way of Jesus is vulnerability — neighborliness — generosity — delivering the needy when they call, the poor and those who have no helper.

We have followed the star with the wise men and arrived with them to find Jesus on the margins – Jesus, who challenges our comfort and disturbs our carefully organized life. So, what now? Will we simply pack this Bethlehem shepherd king away with the Christmas decorations and lights, and assign them to the musty cupboard till next Advent?

The mystical magi are knocking at the door. They speak of stars and destiny, and a guide and king who offers an alternative path leading us to God. Will we allow them to disturb us enough that we might join their caravan of change? Will we follow the star to discover how to be human now? **Amen**
