Reflection / Sharing

The Golden Rule basically states that you should treat others like you want others to treat you. It implies the basic assumption that other people would like to be treated the way you would like to be treated. *The Golden Rule* is also known as the *Ethic of Reciprocity* – arguably the

most consistent, prevalent, and universal ethical principle in history. It is found worldwide throughout cultures, religions, secular philosophies, and indigenous traditions...

Gold has symbolic value and a psychological appeal that spans cultures throughout history. As a metaphor, it points to what is most pure, noble, enduring and ideal. It was long considered the most valuable of metals, so it is no surprise that we call this prized principle is known as *the Golden Rule.*

This is a rule for individuals – about considering how to treat others – but it is also a rule to apply to groups of people and society as a whole. As many regions of the world – including Canada – become more and more multicultural, we are seeking ways to live together in harmony. *The Golden Rule* can be the standard to which different cultures appeal in resolving conflicts. It can be the ethical cornerstone as the human family works together to build a peaceful, just, and sustainable global society. It has tremendous capacity for promoting social justice, the teaching of compassion and ethics, multicultural and multifaith cooperation, and unity.

We live in a global village – all citizens belonging, not only to our particular groups, races, cultures, religions and nations. We have privileges and responsibilities as global citizens to bring the world's people together and to live together in peace.

If we follow the Golden Rule, it would be safe to assume:

- We would be kind to others.
- We would not be rude to others.
- We would help others in time of need.
- We would welcome guests to our homes, neighborhood and our country.
- We would thank others for the good things they do.
- We wouldn't bad mouth and defame others.
- We wouldn't spread hate against others.
- We wouldn't hurt others.
- We wouldn't oppress others.
- We wouldn't kill others.

Pope Francis told the American Congress, "Let us treat others with the same passion and compassion with which we want to be treated. Let us seek for others the same possibilities which we seek for ourselves. Let us help others to grow, as we would like to be helped ourselves. In a word, if we want security, let us give security; if we want life, let us give life; if we want opportunities, let us provide opportunities. The yardstick we use for others will be the yardstick which time will use for us."

How do people usually treat each other at work (school, home, etc.)? Why is that so? How might the Golden Rule make a difference?

To what current issue in our city or country might the Golden Rule offer a solution? How so?
