Now when the apostles at Jerusalem heard that Samaria had accepted the word of God, they sent Peter and John to them. The two went down and prayed for them that they might receive the Holy Spirit (for as yet the Spirit had not come upon any of them; they had only been baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus). Message

Crazy times – right!? We really thought we had turned the corner on Covid and then the Omicron variant showed up. Now all those cloth masks are deemed not effective enough and we all need a vaccine booster too. I got mine on Friday. We were getting comfortable again and suddenly we are reluctant to let our guard down.

We were expecting visitors for New Years – nothing wild mind you, just a few family members and games and a bottle of bubbles or two. But no one came. Uncertainty about whether it would compromise one's health or the health of someone in long term care – if those visits would be curtailed. Uncertainty about the weather – what is with all this snow and cold and black ice anyway? So Steve and I enjoyed a nice dinner and an early evening and hope to celebrate with family in 2022.

I fell a few times shortly before Christmas – nothing serious but I couldn't run for a few days. And then the weather changed and even walking the dog has become a challenge – an Olympic level feat! So although I was planning to get out for some long runs, try out my new headlamp and maybe even get a bike ride in – none of it happened. I was looking forward to it but things have not turned out as I planned.

Maybe that has happened to you too this year – or at some point in your life. It shouldn't surprise us that plans get interrupted by "life". You plan a trip and you or your partner gets sick so things

are rescheduled – canceled. I know that has happened for some of you in the past year or so. Or events you have signed up for were not able to go ahead and your registration fee was deferred to the next year – or the year after that! Maybe you budget to buy new glasses but when you go for your check-up your prescription is unchanged so now you have "extra" cash! You are preparing for a quiet evening at home – dinner and TV or reading a book but you get a chance to go to the opera with someone who has a ticket they can't use. You think your family is complete when suddenly you are expecting another child. You plan to work five more years until retirement, but the company is downsizing so you "take the package" and wonder what you will do with all your free time. You think that this Christmas will be just like all the others when suddenly a loved one dies, and all your plans are thrown out the window – gone like so much dust in the wind.

We plan our life, but we also learn to adapt to whatever comes our way because it is rare that our plans remain completely intact – sometimes the interruptions are welcome and sometimes they are devastating but they happen none the less. Which is exactly what it suggests in our scripture from the prophet Isaiah today. It is the little word "When..." in verse 2 that tips us off. God does not say that the people will avoid deep waters, raging rivers, and fiery trials – rather it is implied that believers in the God of Jacob and Israel can pretty much expect to face such struggles. The promise is not wholesale avoidance of difficulties but an abiding divine presence in them. And, while it is good to know that God sticks with us in life's trials – is present no matter what – in the events we plan and in the unexpected that excites, overwhelms, or confuses – that doesn't necessarily make the trials and disturbances of life comfortable or easy to take.

There is no question that we will have interruptions – things we hadn't expected to get through – and in all of it the promise is that God will be with us. Our text today is shot through with lyric imagery and hope. We are assured that all is forgiven – all is restored – the lost will be gathered in, and we will be protected no matter what. Do not fear – I have redeemed you – I am with you.

There is a literary device called an *inclusio* that brackets the passage in which God makes clear that the people being addressed through the prophet Isaiah – you and me – belong to God alone.

Verse 1 says: But now thus says the LORD, he who created you, O Jacob, he who formed you, O Israel... Essentially: I made you and so you are mine. You belong to me. I am the potter – you are the clay – and whatever shape you have is due to my creative work. I own you.

And at verse 7: everyone who is called by my name, whom I created for my glory, whom I formed and made. Which is something like: my name is your name, and you don't exist for your own sakes or to make a name for yourself or to generate some sense of glory or pride as an end unto itself. No, I made you so you could glorify me. You exist to make me known, not yourselves or your own accomplishments. The bragging rights are mine, says God!

God's good news is true for us as we recognize and accept our identity as God's people. God loves us because God made us – we are held by loving hands. When we abandon ourselves to

the God who made us – we can be confident that God will never abandon us, even when our best laid plans are interrupted for whatever reason.

It would be wonderful to begin the year telling you that everything is in order — that all is right with the world — that all is unfolding according to plan. It would be lovely to suggest that it is all sunshine and light and that it will be a perfect year. It would be nice to say — and in God's time such promises will be fulfilled — but for now all we know is that not everything is happening exactly as planned — interruptions are certain — trials do come, will come. Some are personal and some are worldwide — some are exciting opportunities — some fill us with despair or fear or profound sadness — some are mixed blessings.

It has been said that tough times don't last but tough people do, yet that flies in the face of our message today. There are many whose lives are filled with difficulties — a litany of tough patches. Sometimes it is a string of challenges one after another. Sometimes it's one overarching problem or wound that goes on and on for decades that colours everything in a person's life. Sometimes tough times do last — sometimes the interruption becomes the norm — a way of life and so we must cope with that too.

Whether challenges come and stay for years or prove to be more fleeting interruptions in the pattern of our lives, it is not the toughness of the people that makes the difference but the tough and fierce providential love and care of God. Nowhere in scripture are we thrown back onto our own resources. We're not told that our own optimism or strength of character is what will see us through. When the waters get deep, when the rivers in which we're sunk neck-deep get violent, when the fires of life's trials lick at our flesh, it is the abiding presence of God that reassures us.

This promise is for you – whoever you are and whatever the circumstances of your drought and danger. And this promise is also for us as a community of faith – for the church. Hang in there. Trust in the Lord. You don't need to be able to see the light at the end of the tunnel before you can take the next step. Give us today our daily bread. Not tomorrow's – just enough for today. Keep going, resolutely and faithfully knowing that you are precious in God's sight - beloved.

God is with us – this is what God does, over and over and over – in scripture, in history, in your life and in your circumstances, in the world. God is with us – the Spirit of God is at work – God's people are sustained.

What we cling to in utter hope is that God goes with us in and through all that we plan and all that interrupts those plans. God is with us in every moment – transforming and renewing our experience. Things may well get worse before they get better, but still the promise remains, we will not be finally swept away or drowned or burned up. There will always be a new thing yet to come in God's grace and in God's slow kingdom coming.

Do not fear, for I have redeemed you – Do not fear, for I am with you...
