PWS&D Sharing Emergency Treatment for Malnutrition

In Somalia, Shiindha was worried when her three-year-old son, Abdihakim, became sick and hadn't improved after two months. One day a community worker from a PWS&D-supported nutrition project visited Abdihakim's village. After an assessment, the three-year-old was identified as malnourished.

Abdihakim was immediately provided with a therapeutic food supplement intended to prevent and treat malnutrition. "He really started becoming healthier after two weeks of treatment," shared his mother, Shiindha. After a month and a half, Abdihakim made a full recovery.

Nutrition staff from the clinic also equipped Shiindha with advice on how to diversify her family's diet and how good hygiene practices can help prevent further malnutrition.

Speaking of how thankful she is for the program, Shiindha commented, "I am forever grateful for the existence of such services to help our children."

Through support of PWS&D, we can help vulnerable families overcome hunger. *This project is a collaborative effort led by Development and Peace with additional funds from Canadian Foodgrains Bank.*

Message The Challenge of Solitude

When I was about 13 or 14 I found a place to hide. It was among some large bushes and tall grasses that had been left untouched between my Montreal neighbourhood and the highway into town. I don't recall any troublesome reasons for me to hide.

But I needed the solitude and the space to gather my thoughts and to sort of catch my breath. Looking back, I can think of other places that served that purpose for me as well. Perhaps you have had places like that in your lives too. Even though that place was near the highway, the bushes and grasses muffled the noise and for me it was a quiet place, a place of peace.

Today's gospel reading is about Jesus heading out to the wilderness - the desert for 40 days. Jesus had his reasons for needing that time. He had just been baptized by his cousin, John. The Holy Spirit had descended on him like a dove the scripture tells us, and everyone heard the voice of God proclaim, "You are my Son, The Beloved, with you I am well pleased."

Jesus had not even begun his ministry yet, but the writer of Luke for all the chapters leading up to this, has been telling us who Jesus is. The angel Gabriel had told Mary she was to have a son who would be the Son of God. Her response to the angel was "Here I am, the servant of the Lord."

Mary's cousin Elizabeth knew who Mary's son was too. So did Simeon, Anna and John the Baptist. The genealogy in Luke 3 explains that that is who Jesus is as well. We know Jesus' identity.

There in the wilderness the devil challenges Jesus' identity. Scripture tells us Jesus was there in the wilderness for 40 days. Forty days should ring some bells for God's people. The people of God spent 40 years wandering in the wilderness. During that time God cared for them, despite their arguing and complaining.

Moses was on the mountain for 40 days with no food and Elijah spent 40 days getting to the mountain of God. The history of God's people often is framed by the number 40. Forty tells us it was a very long time in biblical speak.

And then along comes the devil. He is not some character in a red body suit with a pitchfork and horns. Rather the evil one is bold, cunning and clever. Fred Craddock, one of my favourite theologians notes that those who are most engaged with the way of God seem to experience the opposition of evil often. I've heard others says that too, and I believe they are correct. In fact, the devil isn't even asking Jesus to take part in some debauchery. Rather it's more like - here! Let me really make you look like God. Think of all the hungry people who would love it if you turned stones into bread! Of course, you must be hungry too, but just think of the possibilities. Give the people what they want! You can be so relevant. Jesus responds with scripture. "One does not live by bread alone."

The Devil shows Jesus all the nations of the world. You could be so powerful! Just worship me and it's all yours. This temptation of political popularity doesn't work either. Jesus comes back with more scripture: "Worship the Lord your God, and worship only Him."

Jesus is taken to Jerusalem and is asked to show just how powerful he really is. Throw yourself off this tower! The devil then starts quoting scripture back at Jesus, verse 11 of Psalm 91 that we read today. "He will command his angels concerning you, to protect you. On their hands they will bear you up" and so on. Even the evil one can use scriptures.

But Jesus knows that life is more than food. He knows the true source of life is God, and his reliance on God who is the only one worthy of worship. And so Jesus makes it clear that he is entirely dependent on God, rather than self for life, glory and his identity.

And here we are at the beginning of the season of Lent. Another time of 40 days (not including Sundays - because those are always the day of resurrection)

Traditionally, some people have given things up for Lent, as a way to focus perhaps on what is important, as a reminder to turn to God instead of whatever you have given up. It can be a helpful tool for some. I done that, and maybe you have too.

It is also a time when some have tried different spiritual disciplines - reading scripture, times of prayer. Perhaps trying a different kind of prayer than what you are used to.

The prayer discipline called the Examen is one that I think of and often use. It is ancient and has been practiced in various forms for centuries. To sum it up simply you take some time to ask

yourself a series of questions as you reflect prayerfully on your day. It can be done alone or even as a family.

First, you pray for God to shed light on your day. Perhaps take a deep breath, relax, and get comfortable. Thank Jesus for your day. Ask yourself, where did you experience God's presence? Look at your day through God's grace. Imagine having grace glasses on. Then ask yourself, What can you celebrate? Is there even something you can be proud of? Is there something that needs healing, that makes you sad, afraid, upset? Tell Jesus about it. Imagine him giving you a hug and taking that weight. (That's my own addition to the examen) and rest, in God's presence.

But perhaps the bottom line is to find a time of stillness, your own time apart to simply be with God. What comes to mind for you when you think of wilderness or solitude? Is it a forest of Sequoia's or an Arizona desert? Or an uninvited confinement during a pandemic?

We could all use some stillness these days. The prophet Isaiah reminds us of God's words: Be still and know that I am God. In times of solitude and stillness we can actually be a bit vulnerable. It is what some have termed a liminal place or a thin place. Spending time in that 'space' can be uncertain, even a fear-provoking place at times. But it can as well be a place and time of transformation much like a cocoon brings forth a butterfly in due course.

Psalm 91 reminds us as well, that we are always cared for and protected under Gods' wing. Verse 4 is one of my favourites:

He will cover you with his feathers, and under his wings you will find refuge;

A thin place is where earth and heaven collide. Where is that place for you? How do you find it? Is there a place you like to go to listen in the silence? Or is it while you are doing a quiet task? I love what writer Rachel Naomi Remen said about silence. "Silence is sitting on God's lap."

The early church fathers and mothers headed to the desert, and they were like the prayer warriors of the time. During the Middle Ages there was a group of people who chose to live a solitary life of prayer affiliated with their local church. They were called Anchorites and Anchoresses. It was a rather unusual choice but not uncommon. Julian of Norwich was one of them. She lived during the plague in the 14th century. On her deathbed she had a series of visions of Jesus. But she actually recovered and ended up writing about it and becoming an anchoress. Her writings weren't published until the 1600's because a woman couldn't have their writing published until then. But I digress.

When one became an anchorite, basically a funeral was held for you. The scriptures for such a service were read and they were processed into a tiny cell attached to a church. The door would be locked, and they would stay there for the rest of their life. They would have a servant to bring food. And two windows. One that opened into the church so they could receive communion and another to receive visitors who wanted your prayers and counsel.

Now I'm not suggesting that we become Anchorites! But solitude can be a precious thing. John O'Donohue was an Irish priest, poet and in my opinion a brilliant writer. He referred to solitude as being home and sitting at the hearth of your soul.

There are so many distractions in our world, both images and sounds. There's the internet, the news, the emails, the texts, the googles, the tv, the radio, the cell phone, the superficial chatter around us, the cars going by, or if you are near a truck protest, horns, or the updates on war.

Have you ever noticed the silence when the power goes out? It has its own kind of weight and power. I invite you to take the time to sit on God's lap, to sit by the hearth of your soul. You may come face to face with your weaknesses and temptations, but God's wings and feathers will always cover you and care for you. You are never alone.
