Scripture

Acts 16: 9-15 [NT 136]

During the night Paul had a vision: there stood a man of Macedonia pleading with him and saying, "Come over to Macedonia and help us." When he had seen the vision, we immediately tried to cross over to Macedonia, being convinced that God had called us to proclaim the good news to them. We set sail from Troas and took a straight course to Samothrace, the following day to Neapolis, and from there to Philippi, which is a leading city of the district of Macedonia and a Roman colony. We remained in this city for some days.

On the sabbath day we went outside the gate by the river, where we supposed there was a place of prayer; and we sat down and spoke to the women who had gathered there. A certain woman named Lydia, a worshiper of God, was listening to us; she was from the city of Thyatira and a dealer in purple cloth. The Lord opened her heart to listen eagerly to what was said by Paul. When she and her household were baptized, she urged us, saying, "If you have judged me to be faithful to the Lord, come and stay at my home." And she prevailed upon us.

Revelation 21: 10, 22 – 22: 5 [NT 259]

And in the spirit he carried me away to a great, high mountain and showed me the holy city Jerusalem coming down out of heaven from God.

I saw no temple in the city, for its temple is the Lord God the Almighty and the Lamb. And the city has no need of sun or moon to shine on it, for the glory of God is its light, and its lamp is the Lamb. The nations will walk by its light, and the kings of the earth will bring their glory into it. Its gates will never be shut by day and there will be no night there. People will bring into it the glory and the honor of the nations. But nothing unclean will enter it, nor anyone who practices abomination or falsehood, but only those who are written in the Lamb's book of life.

Then the angel showed me the river of the water of life, bright as crystal, flowing from the throne of God and of the Lamb through the middle of the street of the city. On either side of the river is the tree of life with its twelve kinds of fruit, producing its fruit each month; and the leaves of the tree are for the healing of the nations.

Nothing accursed will be found there any more. But the throne of God and of the Lamb will be in it, and his servants will worship him; they will see his face, and his name will be on their foreheads. And there will be no more night; they need no light of lamp or sun, for the Lord God will be their light, and they will reign forever and ever.

John 14: 23-29 [NT 109]

Jesus answered him, "Those who love me will keep my word, and my Father will love them, and we will come to them and make our home with them. Whoever does not love me does not keep my words; and the word that you hear is not mine, but is from the Father who sent me. I have said these things to you while I am still with you. But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you. Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid. You heard me say to you, 'I am going away, and I am coming to you' If you loved me, you would rejoice that I am going to the Father, because the Father is greater than I. And now I have told you this before it occurs, so that when it does occur, you may believe."

This is the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

Message

At the beginning of Acts, when Paul is first introduced, he is described as a persecutor of Christians – committed to stamping out the new way. Paul was an enemy of the Christian movement – resistant to God's newness, clinging to old, settled patterns of certitude and authority.

In the account from chapter nine we see how God interrupts Paul's journey to Damascus with a blinding flash of light. The change in Paul because of the encounter is striking. Paul was a man brought to his knees and sent in a new direction by the power of the Holy Spirit. The one who was an enemy became God's instrument. Paul's response to his encounter was a clear sense of commission to bring the gospel to the wider world. Today we see that same man sent in a new direction yet again. Paul dreams as he tosses and turns in sleep — a dream that will continue his work of recovery and restitution — sharing the gospel — founding and nurturing churches.

Paul experiences his vision on the western edge of Asia in the port city of Troas. Across the Aegean Sea is another world — Europe. In his dream he is called to cross these gold-flecked waters to a new mission field — to bring the gospel of Jesus Christ and help those he encounters.

Paul is sent a new way – unencumbered and ready for whatever is given by God. His vision leads to proclamation of the good news – news that challenges old patterns and invites everyone to new life. In Jesus of Nazareth, the world becomes open to God's generosity – Paul's listeners are invited to abundant life based on God's unending mercy. We hear that same invitation.

Paul receives his vision – his call – and sets sail immediately – his ministry in Europe, prompted by the Holy Spirit, continues to push him across boundaries in the name of the risen Lord. Paul continues with the passion of Christ within him to be as radical as ever, taking the message to whomever, whenever and wherever God calls – to Gentiles, to rich and poor, to Europe, to women, to men.

Paul – the proud man who knew all the boundaries and guarded them jealously – is now engaged in a ministry of healing and reconciliation as God's messenger among the Gentiles. He has come to recognize as sisters and brothers those he previously shunned – oppressed – persecuted. God has chosen Paul to do God's work.

We hear this story as the church today and marvel at the power of God to transform the enemy into a friend. We need to be ready to be continually surprised by God's transformation of our enemies into our friends. Who knows what God has in store when our heart is opened?

When *The Presbyterian Church in Canada* began the long road of healing and reconciliation with Indigenous peoples in Canada as part of national efforts undertaken through the *Truth and Reconciliation Commission*, we did not know what God had in store or how we might be called to change and grow. We did not know how long and fraught and important the road would be.

On May 27, 2021, ground-penetrating radar located 215 unmarked graves on the grounds of the former Kamloops Residential School. Over the past year, many more unidentified burials sites have been found at the sites of other former residential schools. The devastating pain and loss of these announcements are shared by all who lost family, friends, or community members to Residential Schools.

Let us take time now in a moment of silence to honour the lives of children who were forced to attend the schools, and those who died because of the schools...

The Presbyterian Church in Canada operated eleven Residential Schools at twelve sites. The harm they did to generations of students and their families did not end when they closed. Their legacy of trauma continues today. This trauma is not limited to Survivors but is also borne by members of their families and communities, over generations. As a church, we are deeply sorry for the harm we have caused. We know we cannot undo these harms, and that words must be accompanied by meaningful action. In humility and lament, with God's guidance, we continue to seek healing, working for reconciliation in ways that uphold the dignity and rights of Indigenous peoples.

We know that healing begins with acknowledging the harm we have done and making apology for that. We know that healing is supported and strengthened as we become better educated and aware of a history we have ignored, glossed over, and denied. We know that healing can lead to reconciliation and that the *Calls to Action* outlined by the *Truth and Reconciliation Commission* can continue to guide us in this transformation. We know we need to be open to the work of the Holy Spirit in this process just as Paul needed to be open to the Spirit as he was transformed from an oppressor of Gentiles to one who worshipped and ate with them.

This morning Paul comes to the gate by the river – a spot known as a place of prayer. It is a quiet Sabbath day when routines are suspended – people are open and available to visitors. The women have gathered at the river. Here, with Paul, we meet Lydia...

Lydia is a worshiper of God – from the city of Thyatira – a dealer in purple cloth. A worshiper of God – a "God-fearer" as they were also called – a Gentile who believed in the Jewish God. Thyatira was a small city known for its commerce – an area noted for abundant crops and the manufacture of purple dye – a prosperous place. Purple cloth was expensive and valuable as a sign of nobility or royalty, so it is likely Lydia was a successful businesswoman.

In general terms, Lydia is not unlike many people we might meet any day of the week in Victoria – lounging at the beach, strolling at the Inner Harbour, cruising along a bike path, paddling in the Gorge, gathered at a park – people who live in an affluent community – many of whom are involved in thriving businesses. People who may believe in God – even worship God, often without always clearly articulating their faith.

On that Sabbath morning something special happened in Paul's encounter with Lydia —the Lord opened her heart... just as we know that Paul's heart had only recently been opened — transformed. Paul was sent by a vision to continue healing relationships with Gentile believers and to reconcile with them in faith. His task was to proclaim the message with all the warmth and freshness and passion of Christ knowing that it is the Holy Spirit who brings it to flower and fruit. His ministry leads Lydia to open her heart as she listens eagerly to the news Paul brings — the good news of Jesus Christ. This is God's amazing work into which Paul is invited — into which we also are invited. How are we participating in healing relationships with those we once harmed — in reconciling with past enemies — in sharing the gospel in healthy and helpful ways?

When the good news is shared with her that day by the river, Lydia listens – believes and responds. She is baptized and embraces new life. Not only does she believe but her whole household with her. Think of the influence she has on her family, servants, employees, and friends. As soon as Lydia believes, she goes to work for Christ – continues the healing process. She shares her faith with her entire household. She opens her home to God's people and remains of service to others. Lydia's home becomes a place of refuge.

Lydia responds to the good news with hospitality – a most crucial gift and practice in the early church – a gift and practice that continues to be central to who we are as a community of faith – as Christians. Lydia becomes a willing servant. She invites Paul and his companions to stay at her home. Paul's willingness to receive the hospitality she offers solidifies their relationship – strengthens their bond and puts them on a level playing field so that healing can continue.

Lydia tends to the needs of the visitors. Later in Paul's mission, he returns to Lydia's home where he meets with believers. Lydia apparently becomes an active member of the church at Philippi, one of the most flourishing Christian communities that Paul ever founded — a community to which he later writes one of his happiest letters.

When Lydia gathered at the river on that quiet Sabbath to worship and pray, I wonder if she had any idea – any hope – of what God had in store for her. When we gather for worship, do we come ready to listen to what the scripture will reveal? Are we eagerly anticipating the power of the Holy Spirit at work? Are you excited about the possibility of the Lord opening your heart?

When it happens how will we react? This text tells us that healing begins by opening to the gifts of the Spirit in our midst and being willing to come alongside those whom we once feared or disparaged. It encourages us to offer and receive hospitality – love in action – as part of the process of reconciliation.

Lydia's conversion – like Paul's – is not about passing from sin or immorality to uprightness, but from ignorance to comprehension. As she listens – as God opens her to knowledge of the divine – as she understands in the depth of her being, she comes to faith. And this is the work of God – our God who crosses boundaries – who knows no limits. Our God is an extravagant, generous God who calls us to extravagance – to renewal and restoration.

I pray that God will open each heart this morning. That we will participate in acts of healing and reconciliation as we are able – celebrating with hope the journey that indigenous, settler and newcomer Canadians are on together. I pray that you and I respond to the abundant grace of God with unrestrained warmth and welcome. **Amen**
