Scripture Psalm 50: 1-8, 22-23 responsive/displayed

The mighty one, God the LORD, speaks and summons the earth from the rising of the sun to its setting. Out of Zion, the perfection of beauty, God shines forth.

Our God comes and does not keep silence, before whom is a devouring fire, around whom is a raging storm.

God calls to the heavens above and to the earth, that the people may be judged: "Gather to me my faithful ones, who made a covenant with me by sacrifice!"

The heavens declare God's righteousness, for God alone is judge.

"Hear, O my people, and I will speak, O Israel, I will testify against you. I am God, your God.

Do not be afraid, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom. Sell your possessions, and give alms. Make purses for yourselves that do not wear out, an unfailing treasure in heaven, where no thief comes near and no moth destroys. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

Be dressed for action and have your lamps lit; be like those who are waiting for their master to return from the wedding banquet, so that they may open the door for him as soon as he comes and knocks. Blessed are those slaves whom the master finds alert when he comes; truly I tell you, he will fasten his belt and have them sit down to eat, and he will come and serve them. If he comes during the middle of the night, or near dawn, and finds them so, blessed are those slaves.

But know this: if the owner of the house had known at what hour the thief was coming, he would not have let his house be broken into. You also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour.

Hebrews 11: 1-3, 8-16 [NT 225]

Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. Indeed, by faith our ancestors received approval. By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was made from things that are not visible.

By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to set out for a place that he was to receive as an inheritance; and he set out, not knowing where he was going. By faith he stayed for a time in the land he had been promised, as in a foreign land, living in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. For he looked forward to the city that has foundations, whose architect and builder is God.

By faith he received power of procreation, even though he was too old – and Sarah herself was barren – because he considered him faithful who had promised. Therefore from one person, and this one as good as dead, descendants were born, "as many as the stars of heaven and as the innumerable grains of sand by the seashore."

All of these died in faith without having received the promises, but from a distance they saw and greeted them. They confessed that they were strangers and foreigners on the earth, for people who speak in this way make it clear that they are seeking a homeland. If they had been thinking of the land that they had left behind, they would have had opportunity to return. But as it is, they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; indeed, he has prepared a city for them.

This is the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

<u>Message</u>

When God tells Abraham, who is one hundred years old, that at the age of ninety his wife Sarah is finally going to have a baby, Abraham comes close to knocking himself out in hysterics – according to Genesis 17 he *"fell on his face and laughed."*

When God tells Abraham about this rather late in life, miracle baby, Sarah is hiding behind the door listening in on the conversation. She nearly splits a gut trying not to laugh out loud, even though she denies it when God asks. *"No, but you <u>did</u> laugh,"* God says.

You might think that God would be annoyed about all this laughing at a divine plan, might hold their outburst against them. On the contrary, God tells them the baby is going to be a boy and that they are to name the child Isaac – which, in Hebrew, means *laughter*. Who says God has no sense of humour!

Why did the two old folks laugh? Wouldn't you? They laughed because they knew only a fool would believe that a woman with one foot in the grave was soon going to have her other foot in the maternity ward. They laughed because God expected them to believe it anyway. They laughed because God seemed to believe it. They laughed because they half believed it themselves. They laughed because laughing felt better than crying. They laughed because if by some crazy chance it just happened to come true, they would really have something to laugh about, and in the meanwhile it helped keep them going.

According to Reinhold Niebuhr, "humour is a prelude to faith, and laughter is the beginning of prayer."

Faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen.

Faith is laughter at the promise of an unexpected child called Laughter.

Faith is a gift of God that we nourish weekly in our worship – a gift that we constantly renew in Word and Sacrament – a gift that we celebrate in the shared life of God's people. Faith comes to each of us in different ways and at different times. For some of us, faith is an uncomplicated way of being in the world, and for others it is a journey filled with struggle. Faith is a response to God's presence in the midst of life.

To say that faith is a gift of God, however, is not to say that it is easily defined. The assurance of things hoped for, and the conviction of things not seen is challenging for questioning, alert, enlightened minds. We would prefer proof, something concrete. I read an advertisement once for a lecture at an island church: *"New Scientific Evidence Points to God."* Faith may be the conviction of things not seen, but a little evidence might be comforting.

On the other hand, would evidence ruin it altogether? If you could "prove God" – could work out a formula or take a picture, then faith – the wonderful gift of God that is our "yes" to God who is here with us – faith wouldn't be the mystery and the joy that it is.

In the late 1800's John Patton, a Scot from Dumfriesshire, traveled to a group of islands in the South-West Pacific called the New Hebrides, to tell the tribal people about Jesus. The islanders were cannibals, and his life was in constant danger. Patton decided to prepare a translation of John's gospel but couldn't find a word in the native language for "belief" or "trust" or "faith". It must be difficult to trust one another in a cannibalistic society! Eventually, he hit upon the way to find the word he was looking for. One day Patton raised both feet off the floor and sat back in his chair. He asked one of the islanders, *"What am I doing now?"* In reply, the person used a word that means, *"to lean your whole weight upon."* Patton used this expression. Faith is leaning your whole weight upon Jesus – resting completely in the love of God.

Faith is better understood as a verb than as a noun, as a process rather than a possession. I have heard it said that faith is not the same as belief because belief is passive, and faith is active. Perhaps the difference is best summed up by a response that Carl Jung gave in an interview to the question, *"Do you believe in God?"* He said, *"I don't believe, I know."* Faith is knowing – it is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen.

That knowing is not always being sure of where you're going but going anyway – just as Abraham confidently set out for a place, not knowing where the journey would lead. Faith is a journey without maps. It is a journey shot through with laughter because you are traveling a road filled with doubts and traveling with conviction because of faith.

I have faith that my friend is my friend. It is possible that all her motives are ulterior. It is possible that what she is secretly drawn to is not me but my possessions or my attention, or that it is only an illusion that she is drawn to me at all. Nevertheless, there is something about the way I feel when she is around. There is something about the way we can talk to each other about things that really matter – or things that are totally trivial – or rest in comfortable silence, that makes me willing to be vulnerable with her – my friend.

I can't prove the friendship of my friend. When I experience it, I don't need to prove it. When I don't experience it, no proof will do. If I could think of a test and applied it to this friendship, it would be spoiled.

Another friend from years gone by gave me this plaque that says, *"He who laughs, lasts."* (I try to read it as <u>She</u> who laughs, lasts!) If the story of Abraham and Sarah teach us about faith as laughter, then with the laughter of faith comes the strength to last, to endure – the courage to go the distance – the assurance of things hoped for. Laughing with Sarah behind the door is part of living in faith. The laughter of faith that causes us to double over in our leaning into Christ and to fall into the love of God is the hilarity of conviction. The laughter of faith is the joy of knowing – knowing that God is present in our lives and that anything is possible with God. **Amen**
