## <u>Scripture</u> Habakkuk 1: 1-4 and 2: 1-4 [OT 871]

The oracle that the prophet Habakkuk saw. O LORD, how long shall I cry for help, and you will not listen? Or cry to you "Violence!" and you will not save? Why do you make me see wrongdoing and look at trouble? Destruction and violence are before me; strife and contention arise. So the law becomes slack and justice never prevails. The wicked surround the righteous – therefore judgment comes forth perverted.

I will stand at my watchpost, and station myself on the rampart; I will keep watch to see what he will say to me, and what he will answer concerning my complaint.

Then the LORD answered me and said: *Write the vision; make it plain on tablets, so that a runner may read it. # 2 Timothy 1: 1-14 [OT 211]

Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, for the sake of the promise of life that is in Christ Jesus, To Timothy, my beloved child: Grace, mercy, and peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Lord.

I am grateful to God – whom I worship with a clear conscience, as my ancestors did – when I remember you constantly in my prayers night and day. Recalling your tears, I long to see you so that I may be filled with joy. I am reminded of your sincere faith, a faith that lived first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice and now, I am sure, lives in you. For this reason I remind you to rekindle the gift of God that is within you through the laying on of my hands; for God did not give us a spirit of cowardice, but rather a spirit of power and of love and of selfdiscipline. Do not be ashamed, then, of the testimony about our Lord or of me his prisoner, but ioin with me in suffering for the gospel, relying on the power of God, who saved us and called us with a holy calling, not according to our works but according to his own purpose and grace. This grace was given to us in Christ Jesus before the ages began, but it has now been revealed through the appearing of our Savior Christ Jesus, who abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel. For this gospel, I was appointed a herald and an apostle and a teacher, and for this reason, I suffer as I do. But I am not ashamed, for I know the one in whom I have put my trust, and I am sure that he is able to guard until that day what I have entrusted to him. Hold to the standard of sound teaching that you have heard from me, in the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. Guard the good treasure entrusted to you, with the help of the Holy Spirit living in us.

This is the Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God!

# <u>Message</u>

Today I want to talk about Habakkuk. It is a short book of the Hebrew Bible – one of the minor prophets – only three chapters in length – yet it is one of the most poignant and painful books in the Bible. It tells about the people of Judah who have evidently been faced first with corruption and then with invasion. The prophet goes to God in prayer, searching for help or explanations. He wrestles with the question of how we can justify the goodness of God and the powerfulness of God with the presence of evil.

The heart of the book consists of a prayer dialogue between Habakkuk and God, concerning the theological meaning behind the atrocities that have befallen his country. From references in the text, it seems that he wrote when Babylonian armies were ravaging Judah, before the fall of Jerusalem in 587 BC, but the problem is universal. The prophet, like countless people through the centuries, asks why bad things happen to good people and (perhaps just as troubling) why bad people often prosper. People who oppress the poor, who lie and cheat, despots and dictators – they too often die peacefully in their beds. Where is the justice in that? Where, in fact, is God in that?

We could easily envision someone from Ukraine today making the same cries, or any one of several other countries that are going through political or economic or military ravages. For that matter, anyone whose body is being devastated by a grindingly debilitating disease can identify with the tears of Habakkuk when he saw the end coming and looked to God for an explanation. His pain is a universal – physical – emotional – spiritual pain.

In the opening verses Habakkuk seems mostly concerned about the suffering caused by rampant corruption and injustice in his country – something that also sounds eerily contemporary. While away last week I had the opportunity to go swimming and ended up in conversation with another person in the pool. We somehow got on to politics and the state of the world – increasing fuel and food prices – lack of confidence in government. She shook her head in disgust and I wondered how long – how long before things change for the better – how long?

We skip over the next section of the text when God responds – more with confrontations than explanations for the evil that abounds – and the prophet returns to a prayer of despair. However, at the beginning of chapter 2, Habakkuk shows his confidence that God will respond in due time – the prophet will watch and wait for a word from God. When the answer comes it is of such critical importance that it should be written plainly – large enough so that someone running by can read it – and on tablets – to ensure durability – a word that lasts. The message is that there is a vision for the end – what John Dominic Crossan calls "God's great big clean up of the world." It may come soon, or it may come later – there will be a time of waiting but have confidence – *live by faith*.

That sounds good – the righteous live by their faith. But what does it look like to live by faith?

The disciples seem to think that faith is quantifiable, something that can be measured. *"Increase our faith,"* they demand of Jesus. And Jesus responds by confounding their expectations – faith is not something one stockpiles. In fact, faith the size of a mustard seed is sufficient. Paul reminds Timothy that faith is often learned in community – in his case, the community of his mother and grandmother. For their part, the psalmist and the prophet both emphasize the fact that faith involves waiting.

Our reading from Psalm 37 is all about not getting so worked up over the wickedness of others and the injustice of the world that it paralyzes and overwhelms you. Be still and trust in God. Be patient and wait for the Lord. *Commit your way to the LORD; trust in God who will act.* It may be that God will act through you or through causes you support. I don't read these verses as a message of complacency but of hope and reassurance that it is not my fretting but my faith that will make the difference.

Habakkuk initially advises the people of God to be faithfully bold in wrestling with God in the face of historical situations that do not match with divine integrity and justice. Ask the tough questions – don't settle. Then he counsels that troubles do not constitute grounds for despair since in the end God's design will be made manifest. Keep alive and burning your faith in God's ultimate triumph no matter what odds may be stacked against the pursuit of God's justice. *Living* 

*by faith* means something like... don't give in, give up, or give out – endure/survive/live until the end. That's God's promise. Not an easy one – not always a satisfying one – but it is a holy one. As you are faithful God will be with you always as you wait.

What do you wait for? What do you long for?

What is the role of faith in such times of waiting? Faith, as the writer of Hebrews says, *is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen.* Faith is what sustains us when we do not yet see the fulfillment of our longing. It is our touchstone as we wait, especially in those times when the evidence on the ground would seem to contradict our hope. Such faith does not answer all the questions and dispel all the suffering, but it does give us light on the way.

The book of the prophet Habakkuk ends with one of the most beautiful statements of faith in all of scripture. After God responds to Habakkuk's questions, essentially telling him to wait for God's promises to be fulfilled, the prophet remembers God's saving power in the past and then, seemingly without any outward change in his circumstances, says this:

Though the fig tree does not blossom, and no fruit is on the vines; though the produce of the olive fails, and the fields yield no food; though the flock is cut off from the fold, and there is no herd in the stalls, yet I will rejoice in the Lord; I will exult in the God of my salvation. God, the Lord, is my strength; the Lord makes my feet like the feet of a deer, and makes me tread upon the heights. (Habakkuk 3:17-19)

Though there is nothing in his outward situation that would seem to warrant praise – though the evidence on the ground contradicts the promises of God, the prophet still praises God. He will not allow his present circumstances to determine his future hope. He will not allow his present circumstances to cloud his vision. He knows that God is faithful, and he continues to trust God – to praise God for all that God has done and will continue to do in his life and in the world. Such is the power of faith.
