Scripture

Jeremiah 31:27-34 [OT 735]

The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will sow the house of Israel and the house of Judah with the seed of humans and the seed of animals. And just as I have watched over them to pluck up and break down, to overthrow, destroy, and bring evil, so I will watch over them to build and to plant, says the LORD. In those days they shall no longer say: 'The parents have eaten sour grapes, and the children's teeth are set on edge.' But all shall die for their own sins; the teeth of everyone who eats sour grapes shall be set on edge.

The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt—a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the LORD. But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the LORD: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, 'Know the LORD', for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the LORD; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.

Luke 18: 1-8 [NT 81]

Then Jesus told them a parable about their need to pray always and not to lose heart. He said, 'In a certain city there was a judge who neither feared God nor had respect for people. In that city there was a widow who kept coming to him and saying, "Grant me justice against my opponent." For a while he refused; but later he said to himself, "Though I have no fear of God and no respect for anyone, yet because this widow keeps bothering me, I will grant her justice, so that she may not wear me out by continually coming." And the Lord said, 'Listen to what the unjust judge says. And will not God grant justice to his chosen ones who cry to him day and night? Will he delay long in helping them? I tell you, he will quickly grant justice to them. And yet, when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?'

This is the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

Message

"Well behaved women rarely make history" and nowhere is this truer than in our Holy scriptures.

Women like Ruth, Deborah, Sarah, Mary Magdalene, the woman at the well, the women at the tomb and the central figure of our parable today are only a few of the examples of misbehaving women making history through scripture. I mean the fact that we are talking about them thousands of years later tells us they have firmly planted themselves into Gods story! In fact, any woman who is named in the Bible is there because she is important, we are told to pay attention to what she has to teach us.

So, I wonder, what our main character, a middle eastern, nameless, faceless widow from the 1st century, can teach us today?

Before we get to her (I promise she is the main character of my sermon!) we need to look at the first character introduced in this parable, the judge.

From the start Jesus makes it clear that this judge is bad news, he "neither fears God nor respects human beings" This judge has no shame. Like most judges of his day, he was not there to serve justice. He was there to take bribes from the rich and powerful and then rule in their favour. Impartial justice was not even on his radar! He had abandoned all the pretense and was openly a judge of injustice.

After hearing about this horrible Judge Jesus introduces his listeners to a new character, who he calls "the widow." By giving her the title widow we know that God hears her cries, she is the character in this story that we are supposed to care about. In sharp contrast to the powerful judge, she is a symbol of helplessness.

Though we do not know all the details, based solely on the reality that she is alone in court we can surmise that her husband has died. If she brought any money into the marriage, she would be in court fighting to claim her money back. As a woman she would have been extremely vulnerable, and her opponents would have been numerous. Anyone of her male relatives including her sons would want to keep that money and would do anything in their power to make sure it was not returned to her. You can hear the desperation in her voice as she says "'Grant me justice against my opponent.' This court case was life-or-death for this woman.

Despite all that is against her, she does not stay quiet. She goes public in the most embarrassing way; her voice cries out for justice against this corrupt system. She speaks the truth about the laws and blows the cover of those who co-opt it and corrupt it to serve their greed. She does not criticize the judge but instead calls him to justice, to do the right thing, to be accountable. This widow has nothing on her side except what is right and uses it to fight for truth!

Even the judge cannot stand up against her, the Greek word used in their interaction is a boxing terms which describes continual blows that eventually give one a black eye. Her persistence is working! She is starting to raise some eyebrows, people in the court are asking questions, is this Judge following the laws? Is he taking bribes? Is he doing what is just? Under the pressure, the judge decides to move on, all this isn't worth the trouble, and he knows there will be a less troublesome cases to come.

This widow is not to be forgotten.

So, I wonder again, what can our main character, a middle eastern, nameless, faceless widow from the 1st century, teach us today?

A wise scholar who I much admire gives one suggestion. He writes:

"When anyone steps out of the system and tells the truth, lives the truth, that enables everyone else to peer behind the curtain too. Anyone who steps out of line therefore *denies it in principle* and threatens it in its entirety...if the main pillar of the system is living a lie, then it is not surprising that the fundamental threat to it is living the truth."

On September 13th Mahsa Amini was arrested by the morality police in Tehran the capital of Iran. She was beaten by police, taken to a detention center and died in hospital. The reason for her death? Her headscarf was not placed on her head correctly, she was living outside the societal norms expected of her. She like our nameless widow was vulnerable, God heard her cries and yet evil persisted.

When we hear of situations like this it is hard have faith and yet Jesus tells us not to lose heart and to keep praying. He tells a story with the most unlikely of heroes at its center to remind us of this new Kingdom of God that is here on earth. The widow embodies Jesus new vision for a world where "victims will claim their rights and seek justice often in an unsettling manner."

God is calling us to remember that he is love that he is on the side of his people, that we are not forgotten. God is the opposite of the judge God is justice. He calls us to be people of faith, to pray despite all odds because he knows that the Truth will set us free.

Like the cries of our widow, we have heard the cries of people all over the world, shouting the name of Mahsa Amini and this has not come without a price as protestors are beaten and killed on the streets. They are telling and living the truth bringing to light a corrupt and unjust system that keeps women silent. This is a life-or-death situation and with desperation people are turning to God and asking where is this quick justice that you promised us? And Jesus responds with an equally challenging question. He asks, "when I return, will I find faith on earth?"

Like so many parables that Jesus tells there is not an easy answer to either of these questions and instead it is left up to us.

What I do know for certain is that justice is the character of God, and it will come true. It may come true in stages, in ways that are not at once obvious, but where we bring the love of God justice will be.

I leave you with this poem from Jan Richardson:

Blessed are you

who bear the light in unbearable times, who testify to its endurance amid the unendurable, who bear witness to its persistence when everything seems in shadow and grief.

Blessed are you in whom
