<u>Scripture</u> **Exodus 24: 12-18** [OT 70]

The LORD said to Moses, "Come up to me on the mountain, and wait there; and I will give you the tablets of stone, with the law and the commandment, which I have written for their instruction."

So Moses set out with his assistant Joshua, and Moses went up into the mountain of God. To the elders he had said, "Wait here for us, until we come to you again; for Aaron and Hur are with you; whoever has a dispute may go to them."

Then Moses went up on the mountain, and the cloud covered the mountain. The glory of the LORD settled on Mount Sinai, and the cloud covered it for six days; on the seventh day he called to Moses out of the cloud. And when they looked up, they saw no one except Jesus himself alone. As they were coming down the mountain, Jesus ordered them, "Tell no one about the vision until after the Son of Man has been raised from the dead."

Message

I was flipping through the Lenten Devotional from St Andrews Hall last week and came upon a short reflection based on our reading of the Transfiguration story from Matthew's gospel offered by the Rev. Dr. Jean Morris. She focuses on the line: "This is my Son, the Beloved; with him I am well pleased; listen to him" because it is spoken, not only here in the middle of the gospel when the glory and mystery of God in Christ is revealed on the mountaintop, but because these are also the words spoken at Jesus' baptism.

Jean says that her favourite part of ministry is the Sacrament of Baptism. She continues...

The babies are precious, the parents full of hope, and the congregation is delighted.

But her favourite part is when she says to the congregation, "Remember your baptism and give thanks."

Remember that you are a beloved child of God, called, blessed, and assured of the grace, love, and communion of God, no matter what. With the baby in her arms having just received the sign of the promises of God, she see the faces of those who need to be reminded that they have received them, too. In the middle of the tumble of life and faith... remember your baptism. Remember the steadfast promises of God for you now.

These are also words that I invoked not that long ago as we received new members as part of our congregation. They are a reminder that the promises of God are not just at the beginning of our journey when things are fresh and new. We know the promises of God in the midst of life when pressure is mounting, when the future is unclear, when suffering is at hand, just as it was for Jesus.

I found Jean's insight helpful for me at this time in my life, in my ministry, in our life together as a congregation. God comes to us in the midst of our lives reminding us to trust and listen to Jesus. This is not only when we are feeling strong and vital at the cusp of some new adventure but also as we struggle to discern a path through *Mirkwood* when we are depleted and fragile.

Some of you will recall that I took sailing lessons several years ago – twelve to be exact though that hardly seems possible! Turns out it wasn't the sport for me but I don't regret a moment of it. One day was particularly challenging as I went for the lesson overtired and anxious about work that was incomplete. It was not a calm day. It was blustery and may have even been raining. I was not feeling confident as we headed out and my feet were cold and wet – not good. Eventually I ended up in the support boat which I thought would be more relaxing – an opportunity to develop a deeper sense of security on the water. It was not to be however as two teams capsized and we needed to rush to assist!

Eventually we had all the salty sisters safe and warm, debriefing over lunch after helping to take down the rigging from one of the capsized boats, hanging sails to dry in the shed, getting towels, sharing warm clothes, etc. There was conversation about how they had capsized and each person's perspective on the event. I remember standing beside one woman for a time – holding her until her shaking subsided. Crazy since I had arrive that day feeling depleted and fragile – unsure that I whether I was going to be the weakest link that day. In the moment I knew I was where I needed to be – where God hoped I would be. I knew that I had been helpful – that despite my anxiety about some things, about others I was calm and confident and reassuring because I knew God was with me. I could remember my baptism and give thanks for God's reassuring promises of our loving God.

Just as the transfiguration of Jesus is a moment when his divinity is revealed in a powerful and mysterious way, we too are blessed to experience the divine presence of God in ways that stretch, challenge, surprise and overwhelm us. We never know when we will be invited to offer the saltiness of our faith in this broken world, but we can be confident that God provides – comes to us wherever we are reminding us to trust and listen to Jesus. *Remember your baptism. Remember the steadfast promises of God for you now.* **Amen**
