<u>Scripture</u> **Acts 17: 22-31** [NT 137]

Then Paul stood in front of the Areopagus and said, "Athenians, I see how extremely religious you are in every way. For as I went through the city and looked carefully at the

objects of your worship, I found among them an altar with the inscription, 'To an unknown god.' What therefore you worship as unknown, this I proclaim to you.

The God who made the world and everything in it, he who is Lord of heaven and earth, does not live in shrines made by human hands, nor is he served by human hands, as though he needed anything, since he himself gives to all mortals life and breath and all things. From one ancestor he made all nations to inhabit the whole earth, and he allotted the times of their existence and the boundaries of the places where they would live, so that they would search for God and perhaps grope for him and find him – though indeed he is not far from each one of us.

For 'In him we live and move and have our being'; as even some of your own poets have said, 'For we too are his offspring.' Since we are God's offspring, we ought not to think that the deity is like gold, or silver, or stone, an image formed by the art and imagination of mortals.

While God has overlooked the times of human ignorance, now he commands all people everywhere to repent, because he has fixed a day on which he will have the world judged in righteousness by a man whom he has appointed, and of this he has given assurance to all by raising him from the dead."

Now who will harm you if you are eager to do what is good?

But even if you do suffer for doing what is right, you are blessed. Do not fear what they fear, and do not be intimidated, but in your hearts sanctify Christ as Lord. Always be ready to make your defense to anyone who demands from you an accounting for the hope that is in you; yet do it with gentleness and reverence. Keep your conscience clear, so that, when you are maligned, those who abuse you for your good conduct in Christ may be put to shame.

For it is better to suffer for doing good, if suffering should be God's will, than to suffer for doing evil. For Christ also suffered for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, in order to bring you to God. He was put to death in the flesh, but made alive in the spirit, in which also he went and made a proclamation to the spirits in prison, who in former times did not obey, when God waited patiently in the days of Noah, during the building of the ark, in which a few, that is, eight persons, were saved through water.

And baptism, which this prefigured, now saves you – not as a removal of dirt from the body, but as an appeal to God for a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities, and powers made subject to him.

# John 14: 15-21 [NT 109]

If you love me, you will keep my commandments. And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate, to be with you forever. This is the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees him nor knows him. You know him, because he abides with you, and he will be in you.

I will not leave you orphaned; I am coming to you. In a little while the world will no longer see me, but you will see me; because I live, you also will live.

On that day you will know that I am in my Father, and you in me, and I in you.

They who have my commandments and keep them are those who love me; and those who love me will be loved by my Father, and I will love them and reveal myself to them.

This is the Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God!

#### **Message**

Did you know that Mother's Day began in the late 1800's as a peace movement? Julia Ward Howe wrote the *Battle Hymn of the Republic* – an anthem carried by Union Soldiers. It speaks of her view of God's divine will for the Union Army to be victorious. Later she began a tradition centered on peace – thinking of mothers on both sides of the American Civil War who lost their sons. Mrs. Howe declared Mother's Day as a day to celebrate peace and honour mothers. This tradition was continued by Anna Jarvis, devoted activist and mother, who founded the Mother's Day celebration that is familiar to us today as an act of peace and resistance.

While this has become something of a "Hallmark holiday," the roots of Mother's Day are in Christian Peace movements – and so we take note – we honour, celebrate and remember. Think about the current armed conflicts around the world – Ukraine, Ethiopia, Myanmar, Columbia, Afghanistan, Somalia, Iraq, Syria, Nigeria, Yemeni, Israel/Palestine – displaced people, refugees, genocide – and on it goes. When we think of the peace roots of Mother's Day let's remember all those – mothers and fathers – sisters and brothers – wives and husbands – children, who have lost loved ones in war. Let us remember and work always towards peace.



This picture from KAIROS shows Kelly Campo from the Organización Femenina Popular (OFP) in Colombia sharing yellow flowers with participants of the *Memory Walk* to remember the many victims of violence from the Magdalena Medio Region during Colombia's decades long war.

In Colombia, violence and insecurity continue, despite support from the current government for the peace process. In this setting, the OFP continues to play a crucial role in the recovery of displaced families. They provide counselling, legal support, human rights training, accompaniment, and education. When a woman is educated and supported, she is empowered. She can then make her own decisions, raise the standard of living for her family, create more job opportunities, and help heal her community.

I want to encourage us all to consider giving a different kind of gift in celebration of mothers today – a gift to support women peacebuilders who don't give up even in the face of violence! Through KAIROS' Women, Peace and Security program your donation will have four times the impact. What a meaningful and environmentally friendly way to show your love!

Jesus says to his disciples, *If you love me, you will keep my commandments.* If I live in you and you in me, you will follow my example – do the things I have taught you – love and value and act in ways that show divine love in the world. Nurturing, advocating, and supporting peace efforts is one way to show our commitment to Jesus – to love and follow the way of Christ.

I wonder about this conversation that Jesus is having with his disciples. We just catch the beginning of a couple of chapters of theological discourse between the Last Supper and his Crucifixion. It is a bit dense and overwhelming to tell the truth, but I appreciate that he begins with a call to love and a promise of solidarity.

Sunk right into the middle of the verses we read this morning is a powerful phrase: *I will not leave you orphaned*. We hear the voice of Jesus speaking to his disciples – but we might also hear a mother – any parent – whispering to their child. We may hear the words in our head as we recommit to being present for our own children – or for others in our chosen family whom we love and support: *I will not leave you orphaned* – a piece of me is always with you – in you.

Let's imagine we are there with the gathered disciples, listening to Jesus say he is leaving and then speaking words intended to reassure. I think it is an evening of significant disorientation and bewilderment for the disciples. Their little world is falling apart. Everyone is sad – perhaps crying or staring numbly in grief or pacing in angry dismay.

Imagine some special family and friends event with everyone gathered – expecting familiar tastes and sounds – laughter and sharing and joy. Then it explodes into something quite different as someone drops a bombshell – announces a marriage breakdown – reveals a shocking secret – confirms a terminal illness. There would be tears and confusion and anger and uncertainty almost too great to bear.

The upper room that night must have been something like that. An evening that started out as a normal Passover meal has become something quite disquieting. One of them slinked from the room only minutes ago with dark clouds of betrayal following him out the door. The leader among their little band of followers – Peter – has just been informed

that very soon he will be the first to jump from the sinking ship of Jesus' way – denying the one he loves.

And so, as Jesus talks about the Holy Spirit and all the other things he talks about, he is staring into moist eyes – looking at Peter shaking his head and muttering skeptically – at Philip who seems about as befuddled as a human being can be. There is fear in the room – very nearly panic.

And out of that atmosphere – into that stretched atmosphere – Jesus is motivated in love and compassion to say, "My friends, I will not abandon you. *I will not leave you orphaned.* Please stop crying – please stop being so afraid. It's going to be okay. Really! I know this looks and sounds bad – parts of what is to come will be bad – but in the end I will be with you in a way you cannot imagine right now. This Holy Spirit really will help. Through the Spirit you truly will understand and be connected to me in a living way. It is going to be okay, my dear friends."

Here at the Passover table, Jesus spills out his last words to his closest friends. We can imagine Jesus calling them to remember the wondrous wisp of glory they have shared – when light came into the darkness of the world. With such a song the disciples could go on – sustained by the memory of this one great life – waiting and hoping for Jesus' soon return. And in and through everything Jesus keeps lacing his speech with dark intimations of death and a sudden departure.

John wrote these words long after Jesus was gone. This gospel is written backwards, in the midst of a community for whom Jesus was only a memory. Most, if not all, of those in John's community had never met Jesus. Most, if not all, the disciples were dead. The temple in Jerusalem had been destroyed – a sign for many that the end-time would soon come. But the end-time didn't come. Life went on and that was, in many ways, the hardest part of all. Jesus hadn't returned even when all the signs seemed right. This community of believers felt pushed to the very edge of despair, and despair could defeat them. The gospel writer knew the dangers of such despondency. So it was that John pulled together many of the things Jesus said into this group of chapters known as "The Farewell Discourses." It's a bit like "The Last Lecture Series" in some colleges, where professors are asked what they would say if they knew it was their last chance to speak. Here at the table, Jesus says:

If you love me, you will keep my commandments.

A new commandment I give you, that you love one another as I have loved you.

#### Whoever does not love me does not keep my words.

I am giving you these commands so that you may love one another.

"But how can we do that?" the disciples wonder. They have a hard time loving each other now – while Jesus is with them – how could believers love like that in John's community where memory is fading? How can we love like that today?

Can't we just remember the good ole days when Jesus was on earth and love abounded? Let's just keep singing about days gone by – that time when Jesus was here.

But Jesus did not call the disciples to hold up his life as mere memory – he insists on presence. Jesus is calling his disciples to live and love in ways that seem impossible. They can't do it without the Advocate – the Spirit. "I will not leave you orphaned," Jesus says. He appoints a guardian – a helper – the Holy Spirit. You are not alone. Jesus has a plan to be with his friends – with the believers during John's time – with us – in a different way.

The Spirit – which blew like a wind over the face of the deep in creation – took on flesh in the one who now sits with them at the table. This Living Word has just knelt to wash their dirty feet. You can't get much more down-to-earth than that. Jesus is very clear: the Spirit that dwells in me will abide also in you.

Jesus speaks these words into hurting, confused, and disoriented hearts. For us to avoid a similar hurt and confusion, we need the Spirit now as much as ever! Even as God breathed into lifeless clay to create a living person – the Spirit breathes the presence of Jesus into you. In the power of the Spirit, Jesus continues to be present.

Jesus promises his disciples that he will not abandon them to the loneliness of the world's dark night. He says, "I will not leave you orphaned." And he has not. He has come to us in the visible Body of Christ in the world – the church. Even all these centuries – two whole millennia later – we are not orphans. We are not alone.

We are called to be the church in the world. We are called to stand up and stand out in the midst of the world's cold and prickly winter of loneliness and division as a unique and warm place of community and acceptance – of forgiveness and love. We are called to be the advocates that Julia Howe and Anna Jarvis exemplify in nascent peace movements – to remember that in celebrating mothers today we are taking a stand for peace and justice in a broken world.

If we live and love as Jesus did – with gentleness and reverence – the love that comes to us through the Spirit will overflow into the lives of others. We will be agents of God's love in the world – our lives, evidence of the presence of the Spirit in our midst.

We are not left alone – we are not abandoned or orphaned – we are Easter people. If we remember this, we can be those to whom grieving or searching souls come for comfort, encouragement, and strength because they sense God's presence and God's Spirit in and among us – inspiring and sustaining the life we share – nourished for ministry in the world God loves.
