Scripture **Acts 1: 1-11** [NT 118]

In the first book, Theophilus, I wrote about all that Jesus did and taught from the beginning until the day when he was taken up to heaven, after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen. After his suffering he presented himself alive to them by many convincing proofs, appearing to them during forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God.

While staying with them, he ordered them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for the promise of the Father. "This," he said, "is what you have heard from me; for John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now."

So when they had come together, they asked him, "Lord, is this the time when you will restore the kingdom to Israel?"

He replied, "It is not for you to know the times or periods that the Father has set by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."

When he had said this, as they were watching, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight.

While he was going and they were gazing up toward heaven, suddenly two men in white robes stood by them. They said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking up toward heaven? This Jesus, who has been taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven."

Clap your hands, all you peoples; shout to God with loud songs of joy. For the LORD, the Most High, is awesome, a great ruler over all the earth.

Ephesians 1: 15-23 [NT 192]

I have heard of your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love toward all the saints, and for this reason I do not cease to give thanks for you as I remember you in my prayers.

I pray that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and revelation as you come to know him, so that, with the eyes of your heart enlightened, you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance among the saints, and what is the immeasurable greatness of his power for us who believe, according to the working of his great power.

God put this power to work in Christ when he raised him from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly places, far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and above every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the age to come. And he has put all things under his feet and has made him the head over all things for the church, which is his body, the fullness of him who fills all in all.

Luke 24: 44-53 [NT 91]

Then he said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you – that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled."

Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things. And see, I am sending upon you what my Father promised; so stay here in the city until you have been clothed with power from on high."

Then he led them out as far as Bethany, and, lifting up his hands, he blessed them. While he was blessing them, he withdrew from them and was carried up into heaven. And they worshiped him and returned to Jerusalem with great joy; and they were continually in the temple blessing God.

This is the Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God!

Message

In the reading from Luke's gospel, we hear the two men in white robes ask, ...why do you stand looking up toward heaven? And so, even though this is a day when the readings tell us about the Ascension of the Lord, we are going to heed the words of the angels and look around at one another – look around at Jesus with us rather than looking up toward heaven. As we look around let us think of ourselves as a family – a Christian family – the church, which is [Christ's] body, the fullness of [Christ] who fills all in all.

We are called to be one body in Christ: together rejoicing when things go well, supporting one another in sorrow, celebrating the goodness of God and the wonder of our redemption. [That's what it says in *Living Faith 8.2.1 & 8.2.6*] The church is the family of God in which all should be valued for themselves. And so, as we see one another this morning we need to understand our congregation, our community of faith, as a family of which each one of us is an important part. But beyond that we can also consider our nearby sibling congregations – Chinese Church, Knox Sooke, Saanich Peninsula, St. Andrew's, Trinity, and Grace Korean – all of these we can consider as part of our immediate family. And the whole of The Presbyterian Church in Canada and the larger church throughout the world as our extended family. Indeed, I would say that we can contemplate the idea that all humanity and all creation is intimately connected to one another and the wellbeing of one enhances the wellbeing of all. There is an ancient African word – *Ubuntu* – that means *humanity to others*. It is often described as reminding us that I am what *I am because we all are* or in a more philosophical sense *the belief in a universal bond of sharing that connects all humanity*.

There are various definitions of the word *Ubuntu*. The most recent was provided by the African Journal of Social Work: *A collection of values and practices that people of Africa or of African origin view as making people authentic human beings. While the nuances of these values and practices vary across different ethnic groups, they all point to one thing – an authentic individual human being is part of a larger and more significant relational, communal, societal, environmental and spiritual world.*

Wikipedia goes on to say... There are many different (and not always compatible) definitions of what *ubuntu* is, yet within the various definitions Ubuntu encompasses the interdependence of humans and the acknowledgment of one's responsibility to their fellow humans and the world around them. It is a philosophy that supports collectivism over individualism.

So, look around again and think about the collective that is Knox Church. How do relationships within our community of faith support one another – in our journey of faith,

through our joys and sorrows, in the mundane and exotic experiences of everyday life? How would you describe this group to others? What are the important characteristics to point out – the key features that tell who we really are as a congregation? The <u>welcome</u> <u>page</u> on our website says this...

At Knox Presbyterian Church, our Christian community of faith aims to create a welcoming space for all by upholding the values of diversity and inclusion. We recognize that some people experience historic and current systemic barriers based on their country of origin, gender identity and expression, Indigenous identity, race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, age, ability, and faith experience. We seek to serve in our community and the world in ways that contribute to dismantling these barriers.

We are committed to celebrating diversity, identity and expression, implementing antiracism and anti-bias practices. We continue to seek opportunities to develop our cultural competence and humility awareness.

As Jesus did, and as he taught, we strive to respect and affirm the dignity and worth of all whom we meet, especially those who seek spiritual, emotional and physical support through our community of faith.

We are a small, strong congregation – a community of all ages from many national and ethnic backgrounds representing the universality of God's love – all siblings in Christ. We seek to know one another and to care for one another as we journey in faith. Our fellowship is warm and friendly. Everyone is welcomed gladly and encouraged to share their gifts through and with this community of faith.

We try to spread the good news of God's love through our words and actions. We are also just ordinary people involved in the real world. We care about the social and justice concerns of our community and our world and are continually seeking ways to address them.

And the congregational statement declares that...

We are a welcoming, reformed Christian community of faith that values inclusivity, affirming and honouring the diversity of God's creation. We believe we are stronger together.

Relying on the enduring love and grace of God, we endeavor to follow Jesus' example of caring for the most vulnerable in society and making a positive difference in the world.

We look for meaning through intellectual engagement and sacred reflection. We believe that science and religion are compatible – we need to learn each other's language.

We believe that harmony with the divine implies a good relationship with the earth – caring for all creation responsibly while walking humbly with God.

We seek to provide safe space so that each person can bring every aspect of their identity as they participate in the life of this community. We would like to know each other better.

Not bad descriptions, I think. Do they tell the whole story – do we always embody the ideals outlined in those statement? Probably not – is that even possible?

We are a family that has experienced loss in the past year. Some people have died and are sorely missed. Others have moved and we wish them well in their new locations. Several people have joined our congregational family – bringing their unique gifts and expectations to our midst. And like any family there are things that some people like and others don't – changes that some people resist, and others crave – those who enjoy formality and those who thrive on a more casual atmosphere. Like any family there are those among us that we look to for our history – those who can tell the stories of our past and keep the memories alive. And there are those we look to as our future – those for whom we have great hope and who will lead us forward. Like any family we have differences of opinion to resolve and joys to celebrate.

One thing about families is that they are always shrinking or growing, shifting and moving in new directions. The important thing is that, like the church at Ephesus, we might come to know God through Christ Jesus – that the eyes of our heart might be enlightened – that we might discern the hope to which God calls us – that we might realize the inheritance God has planned for us and have confidence in the greatness of God's power. This is what the author of the letter to the Ephesians prays for that community of faith – for that Christian family – and what we need to continually pray for ourselves.

There is a story about an elderly carpenter who was ready to retire. He told his employer-contractor of his plans to leave the house building business and live a more leisurely life with his wife enjoying his extended family. He would miss the paycheck, but felt he needed to retire – they would get by.

The contractor was sorry to see such a good worker go and asked if the carpenter would build just one more house as a personal favour. The carpenter agreed, but in time it was easy to see that his heart was not in his work. He resorted to shoddy workmanship and used inferior materials. It was an unfortunate way to end a dedicated career.

When the carpenter finished his work, the employer came to inspect the house. He handed the front door key to the carpenter. "This is your house," he said, "my gift to you."

The carpenter was shocked! What a shame! If he had only known he was building his own house, he would have done it all so differently.

So, it is with us and with the building up of our community of faith – our Christian family here at Knox – the community we are strengthening with our sibling congregations – the wider church and with all creation. We are entrusted with building the future of this congregation – for maintaining a strong foundation and providing creative opportunities for new growth. We are invited to envision ways to extend our family – to connect with and nurture relationships beyond ourselves and our church walls. We are called to put our best effort into this work because the community of faith that we build – the society in the world that we strive for – is where we will live – and it will, we hope and pray, live beyond us into the future.

Today we have much to celebrate in our renovated space – a space we can be proud of – a space we can enthusiastically invite people into. We have technology that enables us to reach those who are unable to be with us in person. Today we have prayed in new and familiar ways – sung new and familiar hymns – seen new and familiar faces. Today we can give thanks that in this community of faith we may *receive a spirit of wisdom and revelation as we come to know Christ Jesus, so that, with the eyes of our heart enlightened, we may know what is the hope to which God has called us.* **Amen**
