# God speaks to us through his Word:

### What are you looking for? Part 2

Last week we began a new series of sermons using the testimony of the Gospel of John to help us better understand the character and mission of Jesus of Nazareth. As we saw, in order to explore the questions: "Who is Jesus?" and, "Why is it worth our while to know him?" we also have to explore a more personal question: "What are you looking for?"

Inasmuch as last sermon and this sermon together form the introduction to this series, these questions are also foundational for today.

Starting next week, we'll spend the rest of the series exploring what are known as Jesus' "I am" statements which help us better hold in memory and imagination who Jesus is and how he does his ministry.

For now, let us listen for God's Word to us as preserved in the text of Scripture. As we do so, let us pray:

Move among us Holy Spirit, and prepare our hearts and minds to receive your Word. Silence in us any voice but your own, that hearing you, we may obey your will and follow your ways in the example of Jesus Christ, the Living Word. Amen.<sup>3</sup>

READ GENESIS 1:1-3a. READ JOHN 1:1-18. READ JOHN 17:1-18.

#### **1.** The Story opens with the memorable words:

In the beginning, when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep ...

Consider the images evoked by these words:

formless- without shape, boundaries, purposevoid- empty, vacuousdarkness- absence of God, deathdeep- unknown, hence scary, depth of turbulent sea

These provide metaphors which describe a visionless, purposeless, anxious, fear-filled existence. An existence that is endured but not enjoyed. An existence that is not a life.

Until, over the visionless, purposeless, anxious, fear-filled existence, like a gentle wind blowing over the ocean, God swept.

Then God spoke. He uttered the timeless Word. And there was light. And there were boundaries and categories, beauty and security.

Earth and sea and sky. Birds and fish and land animals. And there were people. People with purpose. People to live in harmony with their Creator, to reflect the Creator's image, to create and to care for creation. God spoke the timeless Word; and there was life, and the life was the Light of all people, and it was very good.

When John wrote his Good News Story, he connected this thematic thread with the person and work of a man named Jesus from Nazareth in Galilee.

John recognized that an inherent longing of humankind is to experience life in a way that transcends our base needs of simply acquiring food and shelter. A way that is beautiful. A way that is peaceful. A way that is timeless. A way that has eternal qualities.

In his prayer to the Father, we learn from Jesus that this *eternal* life which is the light of all people, consists first of *knowing* God. Knowing the One who creates life itself.

You've likely realized that this isn't the same as knowing *about* God. Jesus was praying that we would know the Father in the close, relational way that he knows the Father *so that,* we then can share in the **joy** of the Son of God:

I speak these things in the world so that they may have **my joy** made complete in themselves.<sup>4</sup>

Eternal life. The Garden of Eden life. The Spirit-breathed, Father-spoken, Christ-given life. The life that enlightens all people is a life described by **joy**. The joy experienced by Jesus himself.

#### 2. I don't know about you, but that's what I'm looking for.

I'm looking for the peace of mind and spirit that allows me to raise my kids so that they grow up knowing that God is a God who loves them. I'm looking for the assurance that reminds me that no matter what befalls my loved ones, even death doesn't get to control my thoughts. I'm looking for the type of life that is not constrained by the fears of this present age. I'm looking for the eternal life that enlightens the lives of all the people I meet. I'm looking for the **joy** of Christ made complete in me.

> What we need to keep in mind that joy as described in God's Word, and as shown in Jesus' life, is not dictated by feelings.

We know that Jesus frequently *felt* overwhelmed, and sad, and angry, and frustrated. And yet, here, just hours before he was betrayed by one of his closest friends, arrested, and crucified, he prayed that his disciples would know the same joy he knew!

When we talk about joy in the context of the Christian life, in the context of eternal life, we need to qualify our thoughts.

At any given moment, when you're ill or injured, stressed or tired, worried or scared, you might not *feel* like clapping your hands and shouting "Hallelujah!" And we can get ourselves into danger, because when you don't *feel* these things that are often associated with joy in a more secular context, you might begin to think that maybe you're not the child of God you thought you were. Or, that maybe Jesus isn't the Son of God you thought he was. After all, isn't Jesus supposed to be the light that lightens the lives of his people? Aren't we supposed to be praising God and shouting Hallelujah!?

Feelings are the consequences of our circumstances. We can be exuberant one moment, and crushingly devastated the next depending on what comes our way.

Joy doesn't bend at the behest of the changing wind of circumstance.

**3.** Joy is the relief of knowing that neither sin, death, nor the devil; that neither our inner turmoil, illnesses, nor outer circumstances get to control our thoughts, speech, and action – no matter how much they try.

Because, by nature of his pre-existent unity with the Father, his coming to us in his incarnation, his confronting sin, death, and the devil for us and in our place on the cross, his forgiveness and defeat of the same on our behalf in his resurrection, his giving the Holy Spirit, and his promised return when heaven and earth are forever wed,

> Jesus of Nazareth is the mediator who reconciles us with our Father whom to know is life eternal.

Joy is the relief of knowing that, despite how much our thoughts, circumstances, or world events try to convince us otherwise, the formless, vacuous, dark abyss does not get to control how we live; how we think or speak or do!

The light shines in the darkness, **and the darkness did not** overcome it.

Joy is not dictated by feelings, nor is it dependent on circumstances. It's dependent on faith.

**4.** The daily task of the disciple, before we pursue any of our physical labours, is therefore to *receive* Jesus.

Joy is not something we can create. It's a gift given by the Father through the Son to all who receive him and believe in his name.

Our task is thus to *believe* that this man named Jesus of Nazareth has been united with the invisible yet Living God from the beginning, that he comes from God, and that he is the Messiah. Our task is to *believe* that Jesus of Nazareth is able to mediate this joy that is the light of all people.

And, in believing that he is the Way to the True Life, in fellowship with our Maker, our task is then to *trust* the ways by which he is the Way.

This means *trusting* that when we give ourselves to worshipfully and prayerfully hearing, understanding, and obeying his Word, the Holy Spirit softens our hearts to receive more and more completely Christ's joy.

Thus sanctified, we can then engage with the world – regardless of what that looks like in our unique contexts – with gratitude, being assured that we belong to the One God who is Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Body, mind, and emotions. In life or in death.

Because, this is eternal life, that you may know God and thus receive the joy of Christ, made complete in you.

For the good of our souls, the health of the nations, and the glory of God. Amen.
