

The foundation of the earth

1. As a species, human beings have learned a lot about how life works. We've learned about how a tree can grow from a tiny seed; how crops grow well or poorly; how the sun warms the earth. We've learned about how we can smell and differentiate smells: rain from manure, diesel fuel from fresh-cut hay. We've learned about how our brains send signals to our muscles and our fingers move seemingly of their own volition. We've learned about why we feel sadness and anger. We've learned about how our bodies need a variety of nutrients to survive and thrive; about emotional health; about mental health. We've learned about hygiene and the importance of sewers. We've learned about atoms and electrons, super novas and black holes. In fact, just this past May, scientists were able for the first time to actually take a picture of the black hole that is at the center of the Milky Way galaxy!

We have learned a lot!

And, we are still learning. New discoveries are still being made (such as the picture of the black hole!) New technologies are being created. We're learning about how our past and present experiences and actions affect the present and future health of this planet and all who dwell thereon. We're learning about how we are influenced by many factors and our reactions and responses to them can cause harm or blessing to others.

And, any researcher with a soul stands in awe of every new discovery made. On some level, they declare with the psalmist:

O Lord, how manifold are your works! In wisdom you have made them all; the earth is full of your creatures.¹

Yet, for all that we've learned, for all that we know about the world in which we live, for all the discoveries we continue to make, we don't know it all.

2. In this series of sermons, I've been trying to lay some building blocks that will help us build into our own daily walks of Christian discipleship the wisdom contained in the book of Proverbs. I've argued that pursuing Godly wisdom, while perhaps not as exciting as miraculous healings or speaking in tongues, is an important part of living in the power of the Holy Spirit.

The first building block we discussed is the belief that by the Holy Spirit guiding our eyes to the particular proverb our Lord needs us to hear, the Father passes on to us, His children, wisdom for our faithful and holy living.

My child, do not forget my teaching, but let your heart keep my commandments; for length of days and years of life and abundant welfare they will give you.²

The second building block is the belief that the *fear of the Lord* (by which we mean awe-fuelled obedience to God's principles manifest in the Word of God) underlies everything that is good, holy, and lasting.

The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge....³

The third building block on which we're reflecting today is *humility before the* wisdom of God.

Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and **do not rely on your own insight**. In all your ways **acknowledge him**, and he will make straight your path. **Do not be wise in your own eyes;** fear the LORD, and turn away from evil.⁴

This theme occurs repeatedly throughout the proverbs. In 16:2 we read:

All one's ways may be pure in one's own eyes, but the LORD weighs the spirit.

And again, in 16:25:

Sometimes there is a way that seems to be right, but in the end it is the way to death.

And again, in 19:21:

The human mind may devise many plans, but it is the purpose of the LORD that will be established.

And again, in 20:24:

All our steps are ordered by the LORD; how then can we understand our own ways?

The point is clear: simply because we are part of the creation; we are creatures and not the Creator, our wisdom is limited. We don't know it all. In whatever situation we find ourselves, as sure as we may be that we are right, it is also true, that we may be wrong.

3. The wisdom tradition, which is represented by the books of Job, Ecclesiastes, and Proverbs, affirms that, although human wisdom is limited, God's wisdom is complete and eternal.

The rationale for this assertion is simple: God is the Creator.

God created all that exists.

God is the author of the life that enlightens anyone who embraces it. He has established an order in the world and in society that reflects His goodness and His good purposes.

Therefore, God is the author of the wisdom that will sustain this eternal life.

The Lord by wisdom founded the earth; by understanding he established the heavens; by his knowledge the deps broke open, and the clouds drop down the dew.⁵

The foundation of black holes and supernovas; electrons and quarks; of you and I, is the wisdom of the living God.

He knows what is needed to sustain good and holy living.

He knows what the Right.

Speaking through the Proverbs, the Father promises that if we can accept that and live in humility before the wisdom of God than,

It will be a healing for your flesh, and a refreshment for your body.⁶ Jesus once said:

Come to me, all you that are weary and carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls.

For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light.⁷

4. In the context of this series, taking Jesus' yoke upon ourselves, and acknowledging the Lord in all our ways involves acknowledging that, in the mystery of the indwelling Holy Spirit, the One who is the incarnation of the Wisdom of the Creator speaks through Scripture, and, in particular for us today, through the Proverbs.

So, the Father encourages us to keep the wisdom of the Proverbs close to us at all times:

...bind them around your neck, write them on the tablet of your heart.⁸ Keep the wisdom of the Proverbs close to your body, mind, and heart so that, in all your ways, whatever decision you need to make, in whatever circumstance you find yourself, you will remember your Creator's advice and He will direct your ways.

There are a few people who are able to memorize and recall vast portions of Scripture. I'm not one of them, and I don't think many of us are. I don't think the Father means for us to necessarily memorize all the Proverbs in the book. If you can, that's wonderful, go for it!

However, as I've been saying throughout this series, I do think what is needed is for us to trust that the Holy Spirit is actually moving within our souls and will guide our eyes to the particular proverb the Lord needs us to hear today. The beautiful thing about engaging with the Proverbs is that it doesn't require a lot of heavy reading. The collection of the proverbs proper begins in chapter 10 and from there on you'll find that, generally speaking, each proverb requires 1 or maybe 2 verses. So, what's needed is

prayerful time in which you sit down to peruse the book. Or, if you'd prefer, to buy an audio version, and listen to it being read. And, pay attention to what catches your eye and ear. Trust that this is the Spirit guiding you to what the Lord needs you to hear today. Then, memorize that one particular proverb – one to two verses. Write it on a card. Put it in your pocket. Refer to it throughout the day.

And, "Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not rely on your own insight. In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make straight your path." For, "The Lord by wisdom founded the earth."

Glory be to God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, Amen.

to the possibilities for unity among diverse peoples everywhere.

God of every life,

Hear our prayer.

God of every precious life,

our hearts ache for those who are suffering.
