Two houses

According to the church calendar, the season that began on Pentecost Sunday and lasts until the start of Advent is called "Ordinary Time," or, "Pentecost Season." During this long season we are invited to reflect on the implications of Christmas, Good Friday, Easter, Pentecost, and the Ascension in our daily living as disciples of Jesus.

One of those implications is that those of us who confess Jesus as Lord and Messiah are baptized in the name of the Triune God, live now in the power of the Holy Spirit.

Along with working of miracles, speaking in tongues, and interpreting tongues, the gifts the Spirit gives to us include understanding, knowledge, counsel, fortitude, piety, fear of the Lord, and wisdom.

Living in the power of the Holy Spirit, therefore, involves pursuing, learning, remembering, and heeding Godly wisdom. Indeed, the personification of wisdom presented in the book of Proverbs as Lady Wisdom, is a way of visualizing the Holy Spirit who speaks through scripture and ministers to our heart, mind, and through our actions.

Spiritual living involves the pursuit of Godly wisdom.

Through the first 9 chapters of the book, we've listened in as a father encouraged his son to make the pursuit of Godly wisdom his life's goal.

The insert in your bulletin (which is provided as a PDF file on the "sermons" page of our website under the video for today) summarizes the some of the core beliefs which I've been arguing are necessary and helpful to join the son in this request and engage the wisdom of the Proverbs in our Christian, Spirit-led living.

Today, in this penultimate sermon in the series, we'll hear the last chapter in the book's introduction. In chapter 9 the father, having built his case, presents the son with a choice.

READ: PROVERBS 9:1-6, 13-18.

To set up the choice, we're presented with two scenarios:

(a) Lady Wisdom has built her house, slaughtered her animals and prepared a feast. She has sent out her servant-girls to seek out and invite in anyone who'll respond to her call.

Lady Wisdom is active – *built, hewn, slaughtered, set, sent out*, diligent, and caring. She searches us out and pleads with us to join her for our good – so that we would mature as God's image-bearers and live His good life in communion with the One in whose presence is peace beyond understanding.

(b) Woman Folly, in contrast, *sits* at her door. She calls out to those walking past – not seeking us out, but simply waiting for us to walk by. She entices the unsuspecting to come to her and partake of her illicit food and drink.

We're presented with two houses in which to live, learn, laugh, and love.

The choice is ours to make.

Whose food will you share?

In whose house will you dwell?

Who will you pursue?

A noteworthy detail is that Lady Wisdom has hewn seven pillars.

We can picture that in our mind's eye. Seven pillars supporting the roof of the porch surrounding the house.

Some have distilled the gifts of the Holy Spirit to the seven that are on the bulletin cover and which I listed above. They then equate the seven pillars of Lady Wisdom's house to these seven gifts of the Spirit. I don't discredit that; however, I think it is too limiting of the Holy Spirit's ministry. The Spirit gives more than 7 gifts.

I think we ought to interpret this detail in light of the symbolic significance of the number seven.

In the biblical imagination, seven is symbolic of perfection and completion. On the 7^{th} day God rested – not because he was tired, but because his masterpiece was finished. There is nothing more to be done.

As we, year after year, celebrate the high holy days of the Christian year, we celebrate God's completeness.

Jesus was born. He has died and been resurrected. Sin is forgiven. The means of reconciling with our heavenly Father are in place. The Holy Spirit abides within those who believe and are baptized. God's Word has been recorded and preserved for our good and His glory.

There are no more arguments to make.

All that needs to be said has already been said.

The house is in order; built with seven pillars.

The feast is prepared.

The invitation extended.

The choice is now yours to make.

If you want to know God, to dwell in the house of the Lord forever, to live in the power of the Holy Spirit, to follow Jesus and be his hands and feet, to enjoy communion with the Son of God and Messiah Jesus, then pursue Godly wisdom.

Make the proverbs contained in chapters 10-22 part of your regular meditation and study. Sit in prayer with the Proverbs and trust the Spirit to guide your eyes to the proverb the Lord needs you to hear today. Learn it. Listen to it. Remember it. Obey it in the busiest times of your day as well as in the moments of quiet.

There's no more to be said.

The choice is yours.

For the good of your soul, the health of our societies, and the glory of God.

Support them in times of stress

and inspire them to speak out when they see needs being neglected

God of our homes and families,

we pray for our friends and neighbours near and far,

for all who travel and for those who find themselves strangers in new communities. Draw near to each one in deep need, especially those on our hearts this day.

Keep silence for 15 seconds.

Equip us to support those lives that intertwine with ours,

for we are your people, embraced by your love, which we claim together in the words Jesus' taught us:
