Strive for the Kingdom

A work horse can weigh 2,000 lbs. Or more. A teamster might weigh 175 lbs. Or less. If the horse-teamster partnership is to be at all fruitful, if they are to accomplish any of the work which they set out to do, the relationship must be built on trust. If the horse doesn't trust the teamster, that little bit of metal in the horse's mouth is not going to stop the animal from simply walking away, or kicking the teamster! In fact, if the horse doesn't trust the teamster, it's nothing for him/her to clamp the bit between it's teeth so it doesn't feel the bit at all!

Horses can become quite anxious. If the horse is going to have the confidence to do its work without anxiety, it must trust the teamster to keep it out of danger. The horse must trust that the teamster is behind it, is watching out for any hazards, and won't ask the horse to pull more than it is safely able.

So, the teamster talks to the horse. They don't need to shout. Horses have excellent hearing. They simply talk. Constantly. Calmly. Reassuringly. And, the horse *listens*. The horse knows its teamster's voice. As the teamster calmly talks through the various tasks, as the horse *listens*, *trusts*, and *responds*, the two work together in physical poetry to accomplish whatever job is before them.

Shortly before Jesus began his public ministry, He was baptized. As he came out of the water, the heavens were opened, and a voice from heaven said, "This is my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased."

Nearing the end of his earthly ministry, as he began to set his face toward Jerusalem and the cross, Jesus took with him Peter, James, and John up a high mountain. There the disciples saw Jesus *transfigured*. His face shone as brightly as the sun; his clothes became dazzling white.

And, they saw him speaking with Moses and Elijah.

The significance of this is that Moses represents the Law. Moses represents the order of government, ethics, and morality which God gave to His people in the various covenants so that they would be His holy community. A community that lived in the world in a way that pointed the world to God, to God's justice, to God's mercy, to God's providence. Elijah represents the prophets. The prophets were God's spokespeople. They received a message from God to be passed on to His

people and His people's human leaders. And, often, the message had to do with awakening to their deviations from the Way and calling them back to God's Way in faith, repentance, and obedience.

The Law defines God's rule on earth, the prophets call for repentance and adherence to that law.

If you can remember back a few weeks ago when we started reading the Sermon on the Mount together with Isaiah's Servant Songs, you'll remember Jesus said that, consistent with the ministry of the Servant in Isaiah's Servant Songs,

I have not come to abolish the law or the prophets but to fulfill. For truly I tell you, until heaven and earth pass away, not one letter, not one stroke of a letter will pass from the law until all is accomplished.²

Now, on this mountain, Peter, James, and John witnessed him talking with the representatives of the law and the prophets. And they heard the divine voice affirming, as he did at Jesus' baptism, that *Jesus* is the Son of God.

So, we have these bookends in which the divine Voice affirms, for the benefit of the disciples, that Jesus is not merely a carpenter's son from Nazareth, but is, in truth, the Son of God and the Messiah.

This is my Son, the Beloved; with him I am well pleased.

However, the bookends aren't identical. Now, near the end of his earthly ministry and the beginning of the church's ministry in his name, the divine Voice added a command: "Listen to him!"

Jesus is the one who teaches and also obeys the right interpretation and application of the law and the prophets.

He is the one who knows the lay of the land, knows where are the hazards, and knows of what we are capable.

He is the church's teamster.

So, in the cacophony of other voices calling for our attention, enticing us to distraction, from within the cloud, the divine Voice said:

This, Jesus, is my Son, the Beloved; with him I am well pleased; listen to him!³

And the one whom the Sovereign of Creation has affirmed is the Son of God, the Messiah, whose words are trustworthy words of life calmly says to his church:

> ... do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing?⁴

A well cared-for horse doesn't worry about its next meal. It trusts that the teamster will get its hay, oats, and water to it in due course of time. And it doesn't worry about the myriad of hazards it encounters on the job. It trusts that the teamster will look for it. And so, freed from that worry, it can do its work trusting the teamster will look after it.

Look at the birds of the air; they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? ... Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin, yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not clothed like one of these.⁵

I don't think Jesus was calling his church to laziness. The birds weren't falling through the social media tunnel! The lilies of the field weren't binge watching Netflix!

There is a lot of work to do.

There are many people who don't know the Triune God and His grace, mercy, and peace.

There are many people who do, and yet for whom that promised peace evades them.

There are many people who are hungry.

The Mission Moment for this week talks about:

There is much to be done to bring healing, hope, and justice to the world God loves. In teaching, that worry is unnecessary because God will provide, Jesus is not calling the church to inaction.

Instead, he's evoking the non-anxious labours of Adam and Eve before the fall. The non-anxious tending of creation and caring for one another trusting that the Creator will supply what is necessary.

I don't think Jesus is teaching us to sit back and do nothing, to rest our feet on the footstool and say to ourselves: "Oh, don't worry, God will take care of it!"

What he's saying, is that in everything we do, strive first to allow God, His will and His Word to rule over the entirety of our being: our emotions, thoughts, actions, and reactions.

In whatever situation the Lord has placed you now, trust that He's involved, and strive to listen to His Voice, obey His will and glorify His name.

Strive first for the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well.

What Jesus is teaching, is that if we allow God complete authority over our emotions, thoughts, actions, reactions, and interactions, He will look after what we need, so that we can look after what He needs.
