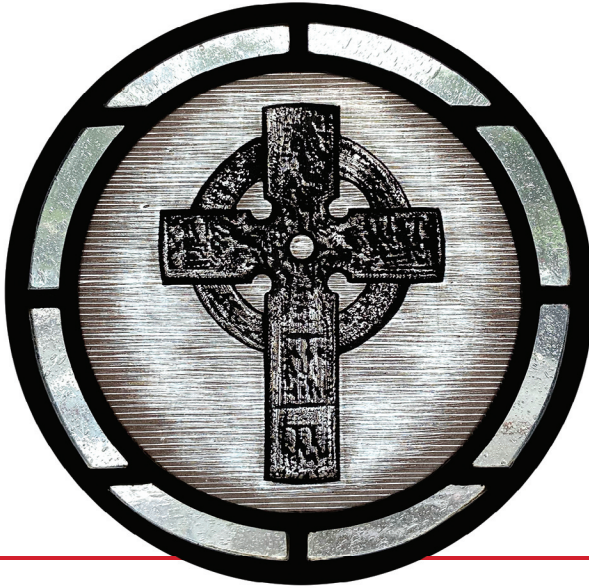

Housing as a Human Right

Currently, around 235,000 people experience homelessness in Canada. Experiencing homelessness can be temporary or long term, and there are many causes, including poverty, domestic violence, and discrimination. Injustices such as racism, xenophobia or transphobia often contribute to housing insecurity, as well as issues like insecure employment, mental illness or accessibility barriers. Need often surpasses available shelter beds and subsidized housing is wait-listed, sometimes for years. Inadequate housing leaves people more vulnerable to violence and other forms of harm. No one should have to face this. Adequate shelter is a human right—every person deserves the dignity of safe, affordable housing.

What can you do?

- Many congregations participate in the Coldest Night of the Year walk (Feb. 26, 2022). This community-based initiative helps to raise money to assist those who are facing homelessness and hunger. You can learn more or sign up at cnoy.org.
- We can change the conversation about housing by addressing prejudice and systemic injustices. Talking about housing as a human right helps push back against some of the systemic injustices mentioned above.
- We can learn about the factors that build up homelessness prevention, such as access to health care and education, wage equity, social inclusion and community participation, and policies that contribute to affordable housing. These factors work together to reduce the likelihood that someone will experience housing insecurity or homelessness in the first place. Preventing homelessness and housing insecurity requires that many sectors and levels of government work together, but ensuring safe and adequate housing is a key pillar to community and human flourishing.

In Somalia, Shiindha was worried when her three-year-old son, Abdihakim, became sick and hadn't improved after two months. The treatment he received at a nearby clinic helped to provide short-term relief for his pain but did not help to improve his overall health.



One day, a visiting community worker screened Abdihakim for malnutrition and identified that he was moderately malnourished. Abdihakim was admitted to a nutrition program right away and underwent bi-weekly treatment. After a month and a half, Abdihakim made a full recovery and was able to return home to his family. **This therapeutic nutrition project is supported by Presbyterian World Service & Development in collaboration with Canadian Foodgrains Bank.**

Friday, January 7 We pray for the people, ministries and mission of the Presbytery of Kootenay in British Columbia.

Saturday, January 8 We pray for the committees of the General Assembly as they discern what God is calling the church to say, learn and do.

We are God's people, called to serve God with our many gifts. We belong to a denomination that is connected by faith, governance, history and mission.

Presbyterians Sharing is one of the ways that Presbyterians across Canada work together to proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ, sharing God's love and hope in our communities, in Canada and around the world. Gifts to Presbyterians

Wednesday, January 12 We pray for Syrian refugees and host communities in Lebanon, and we give thanks for the church's support of Presbyterian World Service & Development programs and partners that provide aid to this deeply struggling country.

Thursday, January 13 We pray for the members and work of the International Affairs Committee.

Friday, January 14 We give thanks for the leadership and ministry offered by LGBTQI2+ people in the church.

Saturday, January 15 We pray for the people who gather and serve at Edmonton Urban Native Ministry in Alberta, and we give thanks for their mission and ministry.

In Haiti, Wilner used to harvest very little, no matter how hard he worked his field. **So, in 2017, Wilner joined an agroforestry program where he received training and learned sustainable agriculture techniques to conserve the soil in his fields and increase crop yields.** His crop yields have now increased, and he has a greater variety of food available for him and his family. Today, Wilner has a beautiful garden with diverse crops, such as corn, pigeon peas, yam, taro, squash, okra, spinach, and forest and fruit trees. This has helped Wilner afford to pay the school fees for his four children and support his family's other needs as well. This sustainable agriculture project is supported by Presbyterian World Service & Development in collaboration with Canadian Foodgrains Bank.

“Here I am, Lord,” rang out at the 88th Commencement Service of the Near East School of Theology (NEST) in Lebanon, a seminary supported by Presbyterians Sharing. NEST graduates, Jamil, Khalil, Shant and Asadour, will serve churches



in Palestine, Syria and Lebanon—three of the most troubled countries in the Middle East that are rife with violence, oppression, occupation, and severe economic, social and political crises. The hymn was their bold response to God’s calling. NEST President, Dr. George Sabra, declared, “If our seminary is able to continue graduating students with such commitment, then we must go on with our mission no matter what befalls us and our countries.”

DAILY PRAYERS

Children in Conflict: Palestine

Children are among the world's most vulnerable people. When his disciples would have sent the children away, Jesus demonstrated to them that children are important to God. Today, children live under threat of violence in many places in the world, including where Jesus walked in Palestine.

Conflict is damaging for all, but children are especially vulnerable. The experiences of growing up under occupation are often traumatic. In addition to seeing their homes destroyed, many Palestinian children have lost loved ones. Some have difficulty accessing necessary medical attention. While the Israeli-Palestinian conflict has harmed children on both sides, harm has fallen disproportionately on Palestinian children. Palestinian children living under occupation face the additional fear of being automatically tried in an Israeli military court if they are arrested—a reality in breach of international law.

As a signatory to the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child, the State of Israel has a responsibility to end the human rights abuses that Palestinian children are subjected to. We know from studies into childhood trauma that trauma leaves deep, lasting scars on both body and mind. Addressing the trauma Palestinian children face would not simply improve the lives of children today—a worthy enough goal on its own—it would also help ensure futures where well-being is possible. To pursue peace and build a future where peace is possible, we must work for justice today.

In October 2019, a devastating fire destroyed much of St. Matthew's Presbyterian Church in Grand Falls-Windsor, Newfoundland.

hospital, and also supported the local Food Bank and Salvation Army. Now that the church building has been fully restored and the congregation is able to gather again, they continue to show love to their neighbours by exploring new opportunities for using and sharing their restored space. Monday, February 7 We pray for the staff and volunteers of Boarding Homes Ministry in Toronto, Ontario, who share God's deep love and acceptance for people struggling with isolation, addiction and mental health.

Tuesday, February 8 We pray for Mphatso Nguluwe-Chikhwaza, Livingstonia Synod Health Director. May God give her wisdom and strength as she provides leadership to three mission hospitals in northern Malawi.

Wednesday, February 9 We thank God for 125 years of Presbyterian mission in India and pray that Jesus' truth and love continue to bless those who serve.

Thursday, February 10 We pray for theological students who graduate this spring and begin the process of seeking a call to a congregation.

Friday, February 11 We pray for the people who gather and serve at Mistawasis Memorial Presbyterian Church in Northern Saskatchewan, and we give thanks for their mission and ministry.

Saturday, February 12 We pray for people struggling with food security and living amid civil unrest in Yemen, and we give thanks for the food assistance that Presbyterian World Service & Development partners are providing them with support from the PCC.

In Malawi, the Mulanje Mission Hospital provides care and support to orphans through its community-based program. **Vocational skills, such as livestock farming, are taught to out-of-school children as a means for achieving economic empowerment.** Brian lives with his grandmother. Through the program, he started goat farming, which has allowed his family to pay for food and other necessities and has also helped him establish a sustainable livelihood. "After the mother of the children died, things have been difficult. We had nothing to depend on during hard times, but now things are becoming smooth as we can sell goats and buy grain and other basic needs," his grandmother expressed. This project is supported by Presbyterian World Service & Development.

Wednesday, February 16 We pray for Living Waters Mission, an inner-city mission of the Presbytery of Lindsay-Peterborough in Ontario, which brings hope and comfort to people struggling with addiction and mental health.

Friday, February 18 We give thanks for the programs of Saskatoon Native Circle Ministry in Saskatchewan that provide a sense of belonging, care and inclusion for people of all nations while upholding Indigenous cultural practices.

ARISE Ministry is a Toronto-based ministry that offers outreach, case management and spiritual care to individuals involved in the sex trade.

In response to the explosion of the online sex trade in recent years, the staff and volunteers at ARISE have expanded their outreach ministry online through an app

called "Freedom Signal," which has allowed them to communicate and establish relationships with victims of online sex trafficking and exploitation. This type of virtual outreach has meant that staff and volunteers have been able to connect people to resources and support in a way that is not always possible in street-level outreach. ARISE Ministry receives support from Presbyterians Sharing.

Addressing Climate Change

The earth's ecosystems are dynamic, diverse and awe-inspiring. All creatures rely on them for our lives and well-being. But the delicate balance that maintains a climate comfortable for humans and other creatures is changing. Greenhouse gases, such as carbon dioxide, emitted by human beings through the combustion of fossil fuels, are warming the earth's surface and the oceans. The impacts of climate change are being felt all over the world.

The church acknowledges that:

- global warming represents one of the most serious global environmental challenges to the health, security and stability of human life and natural ecosystems (Acts & Proceedings, 1990).
- our climate is a public good and all humanity is responsible for taking care of it, especially those who live in countries that produce a disproportionate share of greenhouse gases (Acts & Proceedings, 2010).

How can we build sustainable societies while respecting and effectively caring for creation? Each individual action we take will either help or hinder maintenance of the climate that God created. The way we travel, the foods we eat and the way we heat our homes will all determine how we act to protect God's creation.

What can you do?

- Earth Day is April 22. Your congregation can host a community conversation on climate change, lead an intergenerational Earth Day worship service, or invite an Indigenous Elder to share and reflect on the relationship between human beings, the earth and the Creator (presbyterian.ca/healing).
- Reduce travel. This is the single biggest step one person can take to reduce their greenhouse gas emissions.
- Host a community garden. Eat less meat.
- Discontinue use of disposable products when alternatives exist.
- Learn about your ecological footprint (footprintnetwork.org) or conduct an energy audit on your church or home. See faithcommongood.org/guides for resources.

Binda Devi lives in Karbola, India, with her husband and four kids. A year ago, the family was living a comfortable life, relying on the income from her husband's job as a labourer in a cement factory. However, one day, there was an accident that left him unable to work. With no income, the family was very worried. **Presbyterian World Service & Development (PWS&D) partner staff met with the family and, together, they came up with a plan for Binda to start a small cosmetics business.** With support from the program, she is now selling cosmetic items from village to village. The business is going well, and Binda provides for her family. This livelihood initiative is supported by PWS&D.

Thursday, March 3 We pray for courage and grace to help establish politics that reflect God's reign in our life and the world.

Friday, March 4 (World Day of Prayer) We pray for all those who work for peace and unity in the world.

Saturday, March 5 We pray for the people, ministries and mission of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island.

The Reformed Church in Transcarpathia, Ukraine, has been struggling to recruit and retain pastors to serve in poor, rural churches. To encourage seminary students to return after studying abroad, the church started the Nest Program, which offers pastors a safe place to live.

Bishop Zán-Fábián was overjoyed when The Presbyterian Church in Canada offered financial support to renovate a vacant parish house for the Rev. Sándor and his wife Noémi, who have agreed to serve in the small village of

Tiszaújhely. With financial assistance from Presbyterians Sharing, Sándor and Noémi have furnished their house with basic appliances and furniture and can now concentrate on their ministry in Tiszaújhely and give thanks to God.

In Afghanistan, Fatima had always dreamed of attending school.

However, most schools were far from her home and, as a girl, it was unsafe for her to travel to them. At the age of 10, Fatima's dreams finally came true. She learned about a school near her village and persuaded her father to enroll her. "After completing my studies, I will become a teacher and



become a role model for other girls and women in our village," Fatima shared. Though the current political situation in Afghanistan has left many children uncertain about their futures, Fatima prays that she will be able to continue her education beyond primary school. This education project is supported by Presbyterian World Service & Development.

In Nepal, Pallu Oli knew something wasn't right when he felt a burning sensation on his leg. After seeing the doctor, Pallu was prescribed medicine but did not feel better after taking it. As his health worsened, Pallu wondered why he hadn't healed yet. **His son suggested that he visit the Shining Hospital. At the hospital, Pallu was diagnosed with leprosy and entered a treatment program** (which he has since completed). Sharing his experience, Pallu expressed, "I am very happy that my disease is diagnosed and is treated accordingly." The Shining Hospital is supported by Presbyterian World Service & Development.

Tuesday, March 29 We pray for the Canadian Armed Forces and all military chaplains who bring guidance and support to our troops and their families at home and abroad.

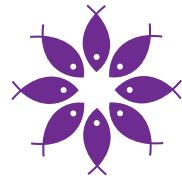
Wednesday, March 30 We pray for the people who gather and serve at Winnipeg Inner City Missions in Manitoba, and we give thanks for their mission and ministry.
