Keep silence for 20-30 seconds before leading in the prayer

Unison Prayer:

Jesus Christ, we hate to think that we would desert you if we felt singled out, if people ever challenged us about our faith in you. On this day when we see your commitment to us cost you everything, deepen our commitment to you. Strengthen us whenever we are tempted to deny you in our words or our in actions.

Lord Jesus, Lamb of God, have mercy on us. People mock you and we do not know what to say. People curse with your name and we say nothing. We watch others carry the cross for you but we draw back at shouldering more responsibility for your sake. Lord, have mercy upon us.

Fifth Reading: Matthew 27.45-51, 54

Keep silence for 20-30 seconds before leading in the prayer

Unison Prayer

Jesus, it is hard to stand by and watch you die. The taunts pierce our hearts like the nails. We cannot imagine the pain. Today it feels as if we are there, watching, waiting, weeping. When the darkness of pain overshadows us, help us remember that you know our pain better than anyone else. Amen

Sixth Reading Matthew 27.55-61

Words of Reflection:

Mary Magdalene and Mary the mother of James and Joseph saw where the body was laid. The women watched from a distance, concerned about their friend, distressed by his death, yet hesitant. What could they do?

Joseph of Arimathea was a member of the temple council and a follower of Jesus. He sought Jesus' body from Pontius Pilate – because he wanted to give Jesus a decent burial? Or did he want to be finished with Jesus once and for all? He rolled the stone in front of the tomb. Then what did he do?

Pilate, the politician. Trying to satisfy everyone. If only Jesus had been more reasonable. If only his enemies had been less vindictive. Release the body? Why not? What harm can it do? What harm can I do now?

We watch. We wonder. We wait. What will we do next?

Unison Prayer:

Jesus, to be God's Son is to carry the weight of God's world on your shoulders. No wonder it felt like you were alone in the world. You carry the weight of our sin and sorrow, our failure and frailty. Whenever our eyes take in the cross, help us remember your great love at the heart of our loneliness. May the arms of the Cross, your arms, embrace us and keep us steadfast.
