#### **Sermon: Stumbling block for God**

A German philosopher, Friedrich Nietzsche said that "God is dead."

Many people take this as an attack for Christianity. But, when we continue to listen to him, we might nod. "God is dead. God remains dead. And we have killed him. How shall we comfort ourselves, the murderers of all murders? What was holiest and mightiest of all that the world had yet owned had bled to death under our knives: who will wipe this blood off us? What water is there for us to clean ourselves?"

Regardless Nietzsche's intention or his belief, just looking at this thought, as Christ followers, we get that. God is dead and we have killed him. One said, the church becomes the grave for God.

The average churches spend 10% of their annual budget for mission and evangelism. 90% is spent for maintaining buildings and supporting ministers. 90% of the time, Church survives to survive. This is how church uses money, which shows where we focus the most.

What about our time? How much time do we spend for God?

When I was in my high school, I fully focused on studying from Monday to Friday afternoon. And, from Friday evening, when we had youth group gathering to Sunday evening, I was at church except the time I slept at home. Now, we do not have the opportunities to spend our time at church like that. If someone might say, that was for friends or for fun, okay. Yes, but, for me, that was the time with God and with God's people. How are we spending our time with God?

This is many pastors' dream to preach the whole Bible by book by book. So, I planned to preach Genesis from January. But, in order to do so, there should be many changes. There is a certain value in following church calendar, just like we are doing right now, so I decided to go through the Bible with Wednesday Life Connect Group. I asked the participants to read the Bible 1 chapter a day from Genesis. Sometimes, they tell me where they are and they are doing great.

Reading one chapter of the Bible takes around 5 minutes. Praying to God in the morning as soon as we get up takes about less than 20 seconds. "Good morning God, be with me today." "Good morning God, I want to glorify you today." "Good morning God, help me get through this day." Or we can make some specific requests such as, "God I have an important meeting today. Be with me. Give me courage."

When you leave home for work, meeting, school, grocery shopping, or anything, imagine this. God the Father is sending you off with a blessing, with full of love and care for all the things happening to you.

If we lose our focus from God, then we are killing God and we are making God remain dead like the claim of Nietzsche.

# As church, what would you say the most important thing we should never stop? If you have to choose only one thing, then what would this be?

The Christ-followers of the first century, they were scattered because of the persecution. When they were scattered, they displayed love and kindness and diligence in their daily lives. They proclaimed the love of God and they showed the love of God through their lives. Their words and their lives are the same.

# Acts 11:26, "... they associated with the church and taught a great many people, and it was in Antioch that the disciples were first called 'Christians."

They didn't call themselves Christians, but they were called Christians by the people in Antioch. The people in Antioch stands for non-believes, just people in the city.

WHY? What did people see in them? What did they display? <u>As the followers of Christ, what did they have in their lives?</u> What did they show to their surroundings through their daily lives?

In Aurora, thankfully, we have Welcoming Arms. This is an ecumenical and evangelical church association to help out the community of Aurora. There are six different churches. Welcoming Arms provides meals and supplies to the people in need. For example, there is Wednesday dinner, called Welcome Table. We do not teach the gospel through Bible studies or having a teaching session before meal or make them memorize a Bible verse before providing meals. We just share food and smile. This is how God's love is displayed. Our church has Martha's Table. Every Thursday lunch, people come to our church building and enjoy hot meal. This is sharing and spreading the love of God to the community. Even though I have not been showing up to the

Martha's Table too much, I am deeply grateful for our church's involvement of sharing and showing the love of God right in the heart of Aurora.

Also, I have to mention this when speaking about our church's ministry. Our rental committee is very very generous that we do NOT consider renting as our main source of income, like running a business. Instead, we are helping numerous groups by letting them inside our building providing their meeting space and safe environment. We could have charged them much more than what we are charging right now. Whenever I see some renters, I feel very proud of our church, for our renting ministry.

Through today's passage, I want to encourage you. Although the number is not growing every week, although we have piled up some fatigue making everything running smoothly. But, still we are not making God dead. We are showing God's life and love through our ministries, through our kindness, through our generosity, through our good intentions for the renting groups, and for the people in the community.

What today's passage is saying is clear. The people in Antioch ate meat after they gave offering to foreign gods. <u>If you are a Christian</u>, <u>would you eat that meat which was offered to foreign gods</u> or would you reject eating something offered to other gods?

This was a very important issue for the first century Christians. They didn't want to defile themselves by eating something from foreign gods. It was considered as participating worshipping foreign gods or accepting them as gods. So, if a pastor eats that meat, then others would think that the pastor is accepting the authority of the foreign gods. If an elder enjoys the meat, then who just came to faith in our God might wonder if they could serve two gods. But, Paul is clearly claiming that **any food cannot make anyone less sacred.** Anything we do is acceptable if you do that in the love of God.

St. Augustine said, "Love God and do what you will."

This is what we are permitted to do. We have our freedom to do what we want to do. But, here, Paul is saying that if we eat the meat that was offered to some foreign gods and if that makes anyone stumble, then he would stop eating that meat even if it is totally fine before the eyes of God. For the sake of the people who have weak faith, Paul didn't hesitate to give up his right. Paul sacrificed the delicious meat. If here are meat eaters, we know how difficult to give up delicious meat. But, in order to build up the faith of others, Paul was able to give up that much.

How are we doing? Through Martha's Table, what do we sacrifice? What do we give up? Many of us here give up time. There are people come to church early in the morning and prepare food, set up the tables and chairs. They give up the sweetest morning sleep. Their Thursday morning equals to Martha's Table.

Also, through giving renters low rates, we are helping them build their communities. Especially for churches in the morning and afternoon, we are building the kingdom of God together with them. We are helping them build their churches and do their ministries without worrying about rent too much. We try to remove some stumbling blocks for other people.

There are very remarkable things our church is doing for many communities, removing some stumbling blocks for them.

I will finish today's message with a question.

Then, in our personal life, how are we removing the stumbling blocks for God or for God's people?

Like the examples of Paul, giving up meat, like the examples of St. Andrew's Aurora, providing Thursday lunch and providing good rates to renters, giving up our time and our money, we are serving God. Then, how can we in our person life?

This is the message of the Lord for us today.

Fill her heart with your overflowing love, so that she may bless her surroundings through her overflowing love and joy. Bless her especially this week, so she may celebrate her birthday with many people, with love.

We pray for <u>niece of our member</u>. She's only in her 20's and she was diagnosed with thyroid cancer. Merciful God, help her. Hold her in your loving arms. How would she feel! God, pour out your love upon her. Pour out your peace and encouragement upon her and her family and extended family. Heal her and through this event, teach them how you are powerful and how you are merciful and how you are amazing. Glorious God, heal her and show your love we pray. God, we could pray for many more, but week by week, we will pray for emergent prayer needs. There are others who are struggling with their physical illnesses. Place your hands upon their bodies. With your aching heart, with your love, help them. Heal them. Be with them in the process of recovering. Comfort them and embrace them in your arms.

God, there could be some sensitivity in praying with names. Help us discern which names we can say in public and help us discern and understand the need and the intention of praying with names. May this encourage people and may this opportunity be received as blessing.

Give life to your church. All the churches are purchased by your precious blood. You are the Lord and you are the Owner of church. Be praised and be worshipped through our daily lives, so people may call us Christians and the world may see the LIGHT through us.
