"You Feed Them"

Matthew 14: 13-21 Rev. Beryl Orok

Walter Brueggemann, Old Testament scholar and theologian, was known to have said, "When you are with Jesus, you are inescapably in the bread business."

Today, this 9th Sunday after Pentecost, we have the joy and the privilege to gather as a community of believers. I miss not being able to see all of you and engage after service as we have done in the past. Whether you are participating from online or from the service outline delivered to you it is still a wonderful opportunity to focus our attention together on a very familiar gospel story: The Feeding of the Five Thousand. It's a story about Jesus and about bread!

One of the wonderful things about the gospels is that the stories within each are all about Jesus; each told in a unique way; some gospels share the same stories, while others are specific to a particular gospel.

For instance; Matthew depicts the Birth of Jesus in great detail while the Gospel of John identifies the Coming of Jesus as the Word Incarnate; only Mark relates the Sermon on the Mount, while Luke gives us the stories of the Good Samaritan and the Prodigal Son.

Interestingly enough, all four Gospels relate the story of the Feeding of the Five Thousand!

The problem with these familiar stories is not in the stories themselves, of course, which are timeless and meaningful as God's words to us always, but that we, the readers become complacent about reading or hearing them repeatedly over time.

Have you ever come to a certain section of scripture and thought- "I know this" and just breeze through it or skip it altogether? I'm sure I am not the only one who has done this. But I have learned and continue to learn that we must not neglect to read and reread; inquiring of God that He speak to us afresh by His Spirit. Otherwise; we risk missing out on an inspiration or a truth we need to be reminded of, or even a new revelation within the context of an already familiar section of God's word. Besides; it's God's word and it is forever important to secure in our hearts so that we cultivate a life based on His precepts. We have short memories and reminders; especially related to God's Word, are so important in keeping us on the path of God's choosing and way.



The story of the Feeding of the Five Thousand might be for you one of those stories you would be tempted to skip over. But today we have the opportunity to once again focus on this story and see what God will reveal to us or perhaps remind us of.

The story of the Feeding of the Five Thousand is reminiscent of a number of incidents wherein God, in His mercy, provided food for people.

In the **Book of Exodus chapter 16** we read that while the Israelite nation was wandering in exile in the desert some 40 years they complained bitterly about the lack of food. Moses petitioned God on their behalf and God provided manna and quails daily to feed them.

1 Kings 17: 1-7 tells us how God warned the prophet Elijah to flee and hide from the wrath of Ahab and Jezebel. Elijah ended up dwelling by the Brook Cherith, near Jordon. Each and every morning and each and every evening, God sent the ravens, as He promised He would do, to supply Elijah with bread and meat to eat. He drank from the brook to quench his thirst. This provision lasted until such time as God instructed him to move on to another location.

In **2 Kings 4: 42-44** the Prophet Elisha was in Gilgal during the midst of a famine. A kind man brought him twenty barley loaves. Not unlike Jesus' disciples; Elisha's servant was convinced that this meager amount of bread would never

suffice to feed the one hundred men in his company. Elisha told him "Give it to them; for thus says the Lord; they shall eat and have some leftover." So, they ate and it was just as the Lord said it would be!

Scripture so often reminds me that God is always concerned for His people's welfare; in each and every aspect of our humanity. We can depend on Him to meet our needs and we are meant to be His hands extended to others in their need.

For 38 years W.H. Lax was a Methodist pastor ministering in the East End of London. He learned that an old man was gravely ill and he called in on him. It was at once made plain that he was an unwelcome visitor, for as soon as the sick man caught sight of Lax's clerical collar he turned his head and refused to utter a word. While trying to sustain a conversation Lax noted the dreariness of the room, the pitiful inadequate fire and suspected that provisions for fuel and food had run low.

When he left, he went to a butcher shop and ordered two lamb chops to be sent to the old man's house.

He called again a few days after and although the old man was still far from talkative, he was disposed to be friendly. On the way home another order was left with the butcher. By the third visit there was a pronounced change in the man. He was congenial and even expressive in his conversation and before taking leave of him Lax read from the scripture and prayed.

A preaching engagement took Lax out of London for some days and upon his return, he was informed that the old man had passed away and had left a message for him.

Just at the last, when the old man could barely speak, he had signaled that he wanted to say something to those in attendance.

"Tell Mr. Lax" he gasped, "It's alright... I'm going to God...but to be sure ...that it wasn't his preaching that changed me... it was... those lamb chops!!!"
It seems perhaps like a strange grace but God used it! The power of even a cup of cold water given in the prompting of the Spirit is not to be underestimated.

Now in thinking about our gospel today I believe a bit of historical context is helpful before we explore the familiar story of the Feeding of the Five Thousand.

In the chapter preceding this event much had taken place. Jesus had been travelling the countryside, speaking to large crowds in the form of parables and explaining the meaning to all who would listen. He had developed quite a following; much to the chagrin of the religious hierarchy of the day.

While he was out and about preaching and teaching word came to Jesus that his cousin, John the Baptist, had been beheaded by the evil Herod. John had provoked Herod by calling him out on his adulterous relationship with Herodias. At a birthday celebration in Herod's honor he made a rash promise to give anything she wanted to Herodias' daughter; after she had danced seductively for his pleasure. Prompted by her mother, she asked for John's head on a platter. Her wish was granted and the deed was done. John's disciples had obtained his body for burial and sent word to Jesus concerning all that had taken place.

So, Jesus, besides being physically exhausted, was dealing with the outright rejection that had taken place in Nazareth, where he had been threatened with death and had almost been thrown off a cliff by his own hometown people. His grief over the death of John compounded his exhaustion, so He made his way to a place on the other side of the Sea of Galilee to seek some solace and rest time. But it was not to be.

The people pursued him and sought to be near Him. Whether their motivation was fascination, faith or to seek healing; they followed with no plans in place for meeting their personal needs for nourishment.

The gospel of John 6:4 tells us these even included some of those on their way to Jerusalem to attend the Passover Feast, which was at hand.

They gathered on a grassy mountainside in what was the spring of the year, near Bethsaida, northeast of the Sea of Galilee.

Matthew 14:15 tells us it was remote place.

When Jesus saw them; this being much more than just vision in the natural sense but rather;

He SAW them and their needs and He was moved with compassion toward them.

Just to be clear, **He was moved with compassion –NOT pity!** There is an important distinction that bears some consideration.

The word pity means---a strong feeling of sadness or sympathy for someone or something i.e. a sympathetic sorrow.

Pity often sees someone as being worse off than ourselves, while not necessarily taking action to alleviate the suffering or situation. It can put one in the position of feeling superior. Most often, it is not helpful or appropriate.

It can feel offensive and condescending to the one on the receiving end of another's pity.

We have all heard it said "I don't want your pity!"

Compassion, on the other hand, is an emotional response, but involves a far greater commitment to substantive help or an urging desire to help.

It is both an emotion and a virtue because it does not involve judgement of the person or their situation.

Perhaps I can better clarify the distinction related to my ministry during 18 years as a Federal Prison Chaplain.

During that time, I met a very large number of persons; offenders, their families, victims and community members.

We are talking about pity verses compassion today, so let me be very clear—I did not pity any of the offenders. These people were in prison because of a choice they made and their actions had harmed others.

That is; with the exception of two men and one woman I knew, who were exonerated by DNA and other evidence. For those who were exonerated, I was beyond sad for them. Their life had been stolen, families destroyed and nothing was going to change that or make up for the loss of their freedom and all they had endured in prison all those years.

But I did have compassion for the men and women I met in prison.

I realized that the compassion I had was a gift from God and one I cherished then and now. It was humbling to be given eyes to see the person beyond the crime.

Countless times I said "You are not your crime"; "There is so much more to your life than your crime and don't let your crime continue to define your life and your choices."

So, because of compassion, not pity, I preached God's word of repentance, forgiveness and restoration.

I counselled many individuals, met their broken family members and advocated for their care when appropriate. Compassion was a driving force.

Jesus had compassion for the people who gathered before Him that day, who were tired and hungry.

The disciples were being quite practical in expressing their concern that the people had no food. It was getting late and they had a long way to travel even to the nearest village. It was the logical thing to do, they thought, for Jesus to send them away.

After listening to His disciple's concerns Jesus without reservation throws them a ringer; "You feed them". Three simple words, but what an impact!

Can you imagine the look on the faces of the disciples and even on the faces of the people in the crowd close by who might have overheard what He said? Perhaps there might have been an exchange of some incredulous looks or even some mumbling amongst themselves---Really, is He serious!

Perhaps they thought Jesus was just so tired He wasn't thinking straight. The disciples tried to reason with Him.

But Jesus would not be influenced and simply inquired "What have you got?" "Five loaves and two fishes only," was their response.

Logically the disciples thought----not enough!

But Jesus says "Bring them to me!" He instructed the people to sit down. He took the loaves and fishes and looked up to toward heaven and asked God's blessing on the food. Jesus, in so doing, modelled a very important principle. Even when we have little, it is important to ask God's blessing on what we do have; acknowledging that God is our provider!

Let's think about God our provider!

Jehovah-Jireh is the Hebrew name meaning; the Lord our provider.

In the **Book of Genesis Chapter 22: 14** we first encounter the name **Jehovah-Jireh**.



It is a place in the land of Moriah. It was the location where God told Abraham to offer his son Isaac as a burnt offering. After the innocent inquiry of his son Isaac in Genesis 22: 7 "We have the wood and the fire; but where is the lamb for the sacrifice?" Abraham answered "God will provide a lamb, my son."

They journeyed on and after Abraham had built the altar and tied up Isaac and laid him on the altar over the wood, he raised his knife to kill his son. But the angel of the Lord called him to put down the knife and do not harm to the boy.

When Abraham looked up, he saw a ram

caught in a thicket and sacrificed it as an offering to God.

Abraham named the place "Jehovah-Jireh"- The Lord Will Provide"

God, **Jehovah-Jireh**, provided for the needs of the people gathered with Jesus that day in abundance, so much so, that the disciples gathered up twelve baskets of leftovers.

Now you have heard it said "there's no such thing as a free lunch! "but the lectionary reading for today from **Isaiah 55: 1-5 says:**

"Is anyone thirsty? Come and drink---even if you have no money! Come, take your choice of wine and milk—it's all free!

Why spend your money on food that does not give you strength? Why pay for food that does you no good! Listen and I will tell you where to get food that is good for the soul.

Come to me with your ears wide open.

Listen, for the life of your soul is at stake.

I am ready to make an everlasting covenant with you. I will give you all the mercies and unfailing love I promised to David.

He displayed my Power by my witness and a leader among the nations. You also will command the nations and they will come running to obey, because I, the Lord your God, the Holy One of Israel, have made you glorious.

Isaiah spoke prophetically of Jesus, the Bread of Life. He who paid the price, so that all might be saved! Jesus is the one who gives life and nourishes our souls.


On the day following the feeding of the five thousand the people were again

seeking Jesus out.

He challenged them because they were seeking Him not because they saw signs, but that they ate the loaves and were filled.

He tells them in John 6:27 "Do not labor for the food that perishes but for the food that endures to everlasting life, which the Son of Man will give you because God the Father has set His seal on Him."

In verse 35 He declares "I am the Bread of Life. He who comes to me shall never hunger, and He who believes in Me shall never thirst."



In our story today from Matthew's gospel we see Jesus providing for the necessity of food for health and wellbeing of the human body and a short time there after He would give His life, so that we could be reconciled to God. In so doing He becomes the **Bread of Life**, because only through the sacrifice of His life, atoning for our sin, can we be reconciled to God.

Jesus said," I am the Way, the Truth and the Life. No one comes to the Father except by Me." John 14:6.

We are reminded today through this so familiar story of the significance of both Jehovah-Jireh, God as our provider and Jesus as The Bread of Life.

Not only will God provide for our needs, but He calls us to look with eyes of compassion for opportunities to bless, help, stand with, pray for, share with and give to others.

We may feel like we have nothing to offer God; that we are insignificant. We so often forget, like the disciples, that God uses everything we have if we will only bring it to Him.

Our faith demands that we be like Abraham who declared "God will provide."

What we offer to God in faith He will use. We need to stop living our lives in a sense of scarcity. We need to overcome our fears, which make us want to protect what is ours, and to control the outcome of giving.

We are in this living together with God. **Jesus, the Bread of Life,** paid the price so we could be co-creators with God in making the Kingdom of God alive in us and in the world.

God calls us, like Jesus, to be moved by compassion and to have a generous spirit.

Our faith will be stretched in the living of our lives, but what is needed is still at hand— **Jehovah-Jireh** is still our provider and in Christ we have more than enough. There are limitless possibilities before us each day to be as Jesus is, compassionate and loving, kind and helpful.

To repeat what Walter Brueggemann said," When you are with Jesus, you are inescapably in the bread business!

Give us eyes to see as You see God; faith to believe and commitment to live as You call each of us to do: in the name of Jesus Christ, the Bread of Life, we pray.
