"From Humility to Soaring Exaltation" Philippians 2: 9-11

As a boy, I liked things that moved. I doubt that I was any different that most other boys. I had trouble sitting still and I was usually on the move. As I think I've told you before, my Uncle Bill used to say, "Stephen, you've got ants in your pants!" I couldn't just stand still at the end of the dock at the cottage. No, I had to pick up stones and see how far I could throw them out into the lake. Sometimes I liked to see how high I could throw them into the air. Occasionally I would use my slingshot to make those stones go higher and further. I also had a bow and arrows. I used it for target practice, but I also liked to shoot out into a field and watch the arc of the arrow as it rose into the sky and then fell to the ground. My friends and I used to say, "Whatever goes up must come down." We weren't aware of anything that violated the law of gravity.

So I doubt I would have really understood what Paul says in Philippians 2:5-11 which provides us with a clear picture of how Jesus had to go down before he could come up. Last week I took you out onto the back deck at my parents cottage so that we could see the stages or steps Jesus took in his Incarnation – in becoming fully human. Let us run through those steps just to remind ourselves of what the descent or humility of Jesus looked like. We begin on the level of the deck itself.

Step "0": Jesus was in **the form of God**. That is he was in very nature God. He was "true God of true God".

Step 1: **He did not consider equality with God a thing to be grasped**. He was already God but he did not consider equality with God something that he had to hold onto.

Step 2; Jesus **emptied himself**. He emptied himself of the rights and privileges of Deity.

Step 3: Jesus emptied himself by taking the form of a servant.

Step 4: Jesus 7 ... emptied himself, ... being born in the likeness of men. Jesus, born in Bethlehem's manger, was born in the likeness of sinful flesh. That birth did not exclude his humanity, but only his sinfulness.

Step 5: 8 ... Jesus humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death. This is the example that Jesus set for us. This is what humility is all about. It is dying to self. It is not just being willing but actually choosing to <u>10</u> become like him in his death. (Philippians 3)

Step 6: Jesus 8 humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a




<u>cross</u>. You can't sink any lower than that, for the Bible says, "**Cursed is** everyone who is hanged on a tree."

So, Jesus, who as equal with God was higher than anyone can possibly imagine, sank lower than anyone ever has. The sinless Son of God became sin for us in order that we might become the righteousness of God. The stairs leading from the deck let us visualize six very steep steps that Jesus took as he journeyed from a place of preeminence and equality with God to the very depths of hell itself. It was an exercise in humility and it was of his own doing. No one forced him to do it. No one humbled him. Herod did not humble him. Pilate did not humble him. Caiaphas the high priest did not humble him. The Romans did not humble him. Jesus **humbled himself**. Jesus Christ, the God–man was the humblest man who ever lived. No one else has even come close.

Today we see a dramatic turnaround as we turn to Philippians 2:9-11. We begin by looking at the implications of one word – *Therefore*. This is a very important word in the New Testament. The Greek word *dio* appears over 50 times. It means "that is why", "for this reason" or "consequently". What follows this word, as John Piper points out, is one total, massive, all inclusive exaltation. Every knee in the universe will bow and every tongue in the universe will confess that Jesus Christ is Lord of all. Everything flows through this one word **therefore**.

I have only been a witness in a trial once and that was by accident. I have only ever



served on a jury once. I have watched many trials on TV but they have not impacted me nearly as much as my personal experience in a courtroom. In the first trial, there was only the judge present. There was no jury. I was not there as a witness but rather to support an elderly lady whose car had been totaled on the main street of the little town of Creemore. Her car was parked and was rammed by another vehicle in front of the manse. The young man driving the car that caused the collision

accidentally mentioned my name before the judge, calling me Rev. Dunkin. I was only a student minister so technically I was not a Reverend. However, when the judge heard my name, he called me to give testimony. I heard the crash and was the first person on the scene. At the end of the trial, the Judge summed up his reasons for his decision, one of which was that he believed my testimony over the story that the other young man presented. After his summation he said to the defendant "**Therefore** I am charging you with careless driving." The word "therefore" marks the transition from all six steps that we have already looked at. Because of his humility, his perfect obedience, his suffering and his death, **9 Therefore** (for this reason, consequently) **God has highly exalted him**. Jesus came from God and perfectly fulfilled his mission. God rewarded him with exaltation. This is confirmed in several other places.

Hebrews 13: 20 Now may the God of peace who brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, the great shepherd of the sheep, by the blood of the eternal covenant. This tells us that God brought again from the dead Jesus by the blood of the eternal covenant.

Because of his humility, his perfect obedience, his suffering and his death, the blood of Jesus is powerful. It is by that blood that God raised Jesus from the dead.

Hebrews 2: 9 But we see him who for a little while was made lower than the angels, namely Jesus, crowned with glory and honor because of the suffering of death, so that by the grace of God he might taste death for everyone.

Why is Jesus crowned with glory and honour? Because of the suffering of death.

The last verse is from the lips of Jesus himself.

John 17: <u>17</u> For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life that I may take it up again.

We need to remember that the point of this whole passage is not just theological but also practical.

Philippians 2: <u>3</u> Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility count others more significant than yourselves. <u>4</u> Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others.

In this call to humility and putting the interests of others above our own, we are to look to Jesus. He is our example. Jesus says to those of us who would follow him in Luke 18: $\underline{14}$... For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but the one who humbles himself will be exalted.


R. Kent Hughes describes what brought about the supreme exaltation of Jesus in this way.

Though Christ's exaltation was a once-for-all event, it was the culmination of a process that began with the resurrection. He had gone down, down, down through his incarnation, passion and death (which wrought such spiritual

compression), but then in a final explosive upsurge the grave could no longer hold him. Thus, we have that brilliant moment on Sunday morning when Jesus came right through his grave clothes in the sacred body of his humiliation, glorious and radiant. And in the following moments, says Matthew, 2

... there was a great earthquake, for an angel of the Lord descended from heaven and came and rolled back the stone and sat on it. (Chapter 28).

We are told that Jesus spent 40 days on earth following his resurrection at which time he ascended into heaven. His resurrection and



ascension were capped by his exaltation to the right hand of God the Father (Acts 2:33) where he now rules (Hebrews 1:3). The great message of the exaltation of Christ is not that he gets a well deserved rest, but that he reigns!

I want you to notice that Paul does not just say that Jesus was exalted. Most translations read like this: **9** Therefore God has highly exalted him. What we need to realize is that there is a word used here that is found nowhere else in the New Testament. It is *hyperypsoo*. You don't have to know any Greek to pick up on the



first part of this word – hyper! Jesus was *hyper-exalted*. He was super-exalted or we could say that his was a soaring exaltation. The NIV translates this passage puts it best. <u>9</u> Therefore God exalted him to the highest place.

The take home for us here is that Jesus Christ reigns supreme


forever. His was a soaring exaltation. God the Father exhibited his great power when he 20 ... raised (Jesus) from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly places, 21 far above all rule and authority and power and dominion

(Ephesians 1). As Christians who stand firmly on the truth and validity of God's Word, this is not just a theological fact. It is a historical one!


Along with the soaring exaltation of Jesus following his Resurrection and Ascension, Jesus receives a new name. **9** Therefore God ... bestowed on him the name that **is above every name.** Now Jesus has many names with which we are familiar – Immanuel, Wonderful Counsellor, Prince of Peace, Ancient of Days, the Door, the Good Shepherd, the Word, the Light, the Bread of Life, and the Alpha and Omega to point out a few. We need to ask, "What is the special name referred to in verse 9?" The clue to this lies in that this is **the name that is above every name**. It is greater than any other name that has been conferred on Jesus. In fact, it is God's own name – *kyrios* or Lord. In the Greek translation of the Old Testament, it was used to represent Yahweh, the God of Israel. In verse 11 we read, "and every tongue **confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.**" Jesus is Lord (*kyrios*) Yahweh. Giving Jesus the name "Lord" (Yahweh) is the ultimate of all honours. In Isaiah 42 God says, **8** I am the LORD; that is my name. No one else bears this name. This is the awesome name of the covenant God of Israel. It is **the name that is above every name**. What an event that must have been when Jesus

entered heaven to soaring exaltation and a new name.

However, our passage takes us beyond Christ's past and present exaltation to a future exaltation that God has ordained. God has already exalted Jesus Christ to the highest place at his right hand and given him the name that is above every name, so that at some time in the future <u>10</u> ... at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in



heaven and on earth and under the earth, <u>11</u> and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. These words are an echo of Isaiah 45. <u>23</u> By myself I have sworn; from my mouth has gone out in righteousness a word that shall not return: 'To me every knee shall bow, every tongue shall swear allegiance. This is a declaration of God's absolute sovereign rule in history and salvation. I now want to clarify what is being said here when Paul declares that "every knee shall bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth". The reference is to rational beings in the universe. "In heaven" is a reference to angelic beings. "On



earth" refers to human beings. "Under the earth" refers to human beings who have died and to fallen spiritual beings. No knee in the universe will be excluded. That means that every angelic being, every human being and every demonic being will bow the knee before the Lordship of Jesus Christ. Some will do so willingly and gladly but some will do so grudgingly. This is a certainty and it is sealed with Yahweh's oath in Isaiah 45 as we have seen. 23 By myself I have sworn; from my mouth has gone out in righteousness a word that shall not return: 'To me every knee shall bow, every tongue shall swear allegiance.

This tells us that regardless of our spiritual state, regardless of what you believe, regardless of whether you are sympathetic to Jesus or diametrically opposed to him and his teaching – there is coming a day when you will fall on your knees before him. The only question is: "Will you choose to submit your life to him now in full freedom; or will you wait until you have no choice and are forced to submit to him by the sheer power of his glory, power and Deity? I would suggest that it is much better to do it now. It is a little bit like having a scrap with another kid when you are young. Say you have a falling out with your best friend that ended up with a fight in the school yard. What is the best course of action: to willingly settle your difference with your friend? Or would you prefer to have a teacher force you to shake hands and say you are sorry against your will?

Confession with the tongue is the spoken counterpart to bending the knee. Every knee will bow <u>11</u> and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. What does it mean when someone says that "Jesus Christ is Lord"? Jesus means "the Lord saves" and it is the name given to the Son of God at his birth. No wonder the aged Simeon, as he held Jesus in the temple on the day of his circumcision said: <u>29</u> "Lord, now you are letting



your servant depart in peace, according to your word; <u>30</u> for my eyes have seen your salvation". (Luke 2)

Christ means "the Anointed One" or "Messiah" and speaks to us of the fact that this one to whom we are confessing is a fulfillment of Old Testament prophecy. In 1 Corinthians 15 we read: <u>3</u> For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, <u>4</u> that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures...

Lord here represents the divine name Yahweh which is a public declaration of his sovereignty. In Isaiah 45, the greatest chapter on the sovereignty of God in all of Scripture, Yahweh declares through the prophet:

5 I am the LORD, and there is no other ..."

6 ... I am the LORD, and there is no other."

18 For thus says the LORD ... "I am the LORD, and there is no other."

14 "Surely God is in you, and there is no other, no god besides him."

22 "Turn to me and be saved, all the ends of the earth! For I am God, and there is no other."

This is our confession when we gather for worship, that "Jesus Christ is Lord." Ultimately it will be the confession that is offered by every believing heart and by every unbelieving heart as well. The first will cry these words out of joy and thanksgiving; in worship, honour, adoration and praise. The later will confess it in dismissal submission and despair. Every fallen spirit will confess it. Caiaphas will confess that Jesus Messiah is Yahweh. Herod will confess it. Pilate will confess it. Nero will confess that Jesus Christ is Lord. Hitler and Stalin and Mao-Tse-tung will

confess it. Every soul from every age will confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

My years at St. Andrew's, Perth have been good years. I am thankful for the over four years that God has permitted me to serve you. However, as this pandemic carries on into its second year, I have wondered at why God called me to serve St. Andrew's at this time. This is a job for a younger man, not one who has gone beyond his "best before" date. I am a preacher by calling and nature. I do best if I have a congregation in front of me when I proclaim the Word of God. I find it hard turning out written sermons and services only. There is no feedback - no response from the congregation and this deeply affects me. Then there are the things that concern me. Will people return to church once this pandemic is over, or have we lost some who came before forever? The pandemic has dried up minister's looking for a call to a new congregation. What will the availability of ministers be like once it is over? Will St. Andrew's be so weakened by this downturn that we will not be in a position to be able to call a new minister?

These questions and many others make it difficult to carry on the work of ministry. Yet, the message of this passage, which clearly proclaims God's sovereignty, gives me courage to continue. God does not call us to produce results. He calls us to faithfully and humbly serve him and others. 1 Peter 5 tells us: 5 ... Clothe yourselves, all of you, with humility toward one another, for "God opposes the proud but gives grace to the humble." 6 Humble yourselves, therefore, under the mighty hand of God so that at the proper time he may exalt you, 7 casting all your anxieties on him, because he cares for you. The race set before us is not to the swift, nor the battle to the strong. Those that endure will be those who put their trust in Christ alone and wait for God's appointed time to lift them up. And even if everything fails in this life, then we have learned today that there is a day coming when at the name of Jesus every knee will bow in heaven and on earth and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord to the glory of God the Father. I can say "Amen!" to that. Let us continue to walk forward in these difficult times utterly convinced of the supremacy of Jesus Christ. He who willingly experienced the ultimate humiliation has now experienced a soaring exaltation and sits at the right hand of God the Father on high.

As they do sometimes difficult, sometimes joyful, but always holy work, may they sense your anointing.

Be in the words they speak, the cards they send, the calls they make;

be in the meetings they attend and the committees they work on.

Make each worker in this place a bearer of Pentecost's flame,

warming hearts, providing hope, lending comfort,

and so, in all these ways contributing to your glory in this congregation.

Be with all of us as we continue to worship you now

and as we prepare ourselves for the week ahead.

For children who climb aboard buses and study at school,

be with them and keep them safe

even as they day by day deepen their awareness

of the world of wonders you have made, Creator God.

Protect them from COVID-19 as they are back in the classroom.

For college students, taking on-line classes, writing papers and taking exams,

give them fresh recall of what they have labored so hard to learn.

And for any here today who face an anxious week,

grant extra measures of your Spirit's presence and balm.

For those who worry and who have much to worry about, lend peace.

For little children who have been asked to grow up too quickly

because a parent is sick or not present in the home,

deal gently with these young ones, heavenly Father.

Scoop them up in your divine arms

so that they will know your embrace on those nights

when they find themselves crying into their pillows. Be also with all the lonely people. Be with the widow and widower who has been alone for many years and who we all think has done so well, but who alone knows how much her heart still aches more days than not. Be with the one who has so long wanted marriage but who has not found such companionship, and for whom the years seem to be slipping away. Be with divorced people who still cannot believe most days that their fondest dreams have been shattered and who now live with both the regret and the loneliness of it all. Be with those who so wish they could find someone to talk to but cannot, those who wait for the phone to ring but it stays silent, those who work so hard on tasks that no one ever mentions or comments on. Be with those who are hungry for a word of gratitude that never comes, those who search crowded rooms for a familiar face but who can never seem to find a friend. Be with all the lonely people be their friend when this world's friends fail. be their companion when they feel that they walk life's journey alone, be their word of kindness and hope when the world seems able only to be gruff and brusque as it brushes past lives that don't seem to count. As we close our worship now, fill us with yourself. As we sing, lift us ever higher to yourself. Loving God, we offer these prayers,

joining our voices to the great chorus of those who sing your praise and depend on you alone. We long for that day when all your children will live in your peace and praise your name. Until that day, give us sturdy patience and enduring hope, rooted only in Jesus, in whose name we pray. **Amen.**
