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To: My dear brothers and sisters in Christ:

What is your favourite time of the year? Maybe it is easier to ask, "What is your least favourite time of the year?" I can readily answer that one. My least favourite time of year is mid to late spring and early summer. The reason is because I hate bugs! I love late summer and the fall. I like winter. I enjoy early spring until the bugs



arrive in May and then I tolerate things until August comes and the bugs are pretty well done with. That's why I always take my summer holidays in August!



Bugs!!! It starts with midges and shad flies. They don't bite but are a nuisance. Things really start to go downhill when the black flies and then mosquitoes show up. I encourage you to be faithful in observing worship during this season. Set aside Sunday morning as a time which is sacred to "attend" church with the rest of your faithful brothers and sisters in Christ. Finally, I encourage you to be faithful in giving God your offering during this season. How very easy it is to allow these disciplines to slip. In the end, we will be the ones who will miss out.
